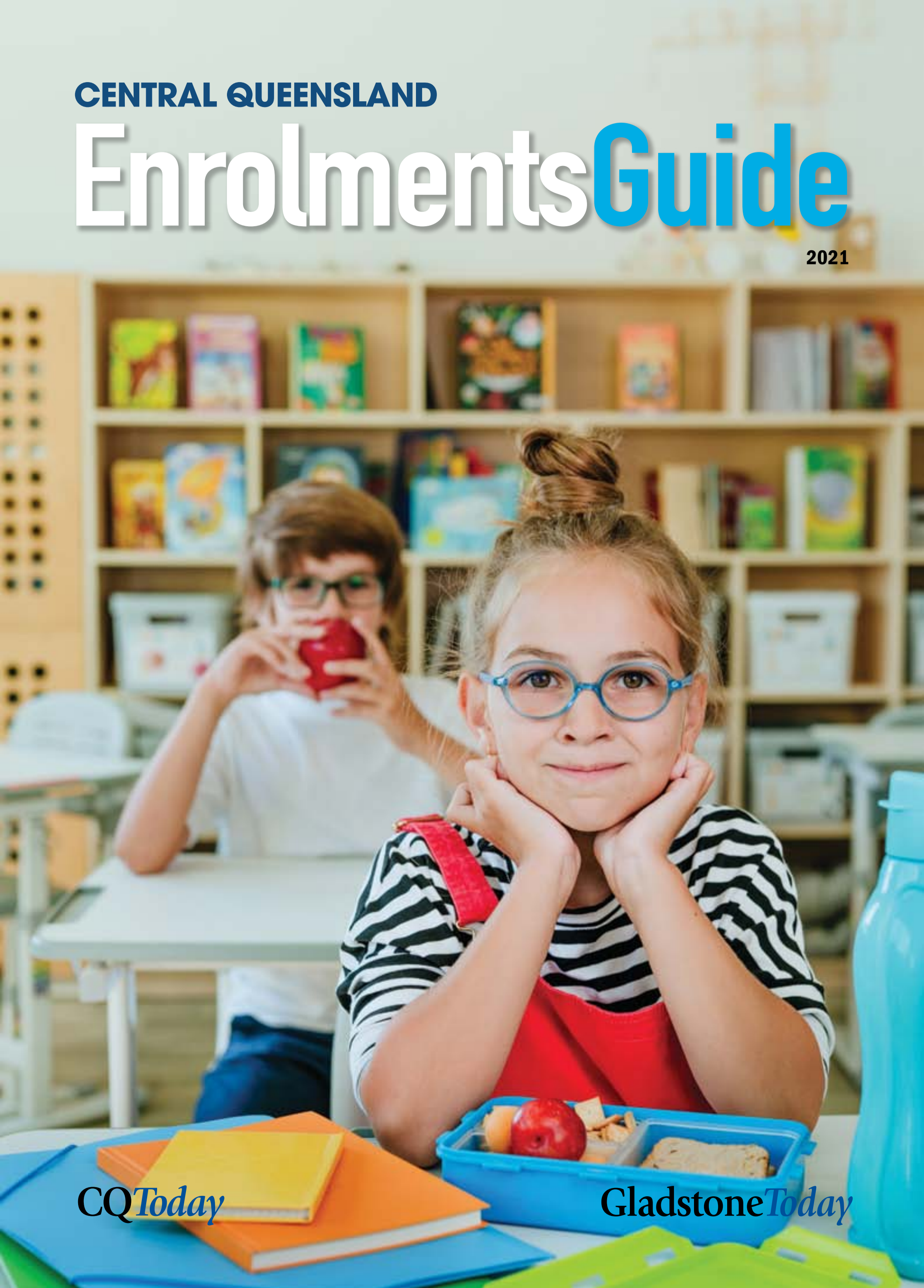

Teaching Students

What sets Blackwater State High School apart from the crowd is that the teachers there do not teach only English, Maths or any other subjects. Instead, there is a shared understanding that the core business of schools isn't about teaching a curriculum, but teaching students.

Having transferred to the school in Term 2, Year 10 student Mia M. remarked that what's different about Blackwater from her previous schools is that "teachers here aren't just teaching for a job, but actually connect with students and care about them." Relationships are fundamental to how the school operates, underpinned by the Positive Behaviour for Learning ethos and the genuine belief that every student can succeed. Students at Blackwater State High are more than a face in the crowd or number in a ledger: they are each unique facets of our school community, respected and valued for who they are and how that diversity enriches us all.

That is not to say that Blackwater doesn't offer a rich - and continually expanding - curriculum. In fact, Principal Rebecca Godfrey just this year received a national award for her development of QSMART, a senior maths and science subject tailored to applications in the mining industry. Technologies teacher Locklan Hall has received the Peter Doherty Award for Excellence in STEM Education. 2022 is set to offer the most diverse opportunities for students yet, drawing from not only the expertise of staff but using invaluable industry partnerships to open new doors. Blackwater students are able to gain Certificate qualifications; gain entry to and begin studying Bachelor degrees; undertake work experience or school-based apprenticeships and traineeships in a wide range of fields; explore clubs like Art and STEM; engage in classroom



learning with real-world experts, such as BMA's Cameron Cocks; and, at the end of it all, become part of the school's impressive legacy of 100 per cent Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) attainment.

Small school feeling

Established in 1907, Bluff State School has been an integral part of the Central Highlands' cluster of Small Schools. It is located between Dingo and Blackwater on the Capricorn Highway. We are a small school that focuses on teaching and learning through an Inquiry process using the P-6 Curriculum Planning model which is tailored to a multi-age setting.

Our smaller classes and lower teacher-student ratios promote a more personalised level of learning opportunity for each and every child. Our teachers have a greater capacity to tailor differentiated learning to each child's unique needs, strengths, challenges and motivations.

School-Parent-Community Partnerships embrace our motto 'Learning Together' and promotes positive partnerships within our school environment and the broader community. We have a close connection with our local Ghungalu people who guide us with the inclusion of Indigenous Perspectives in our curriculum.

Our partnerships with cluster schools from Duinga to Comet ensures the children also have opportunities to form friendship groups with students from other schools. We join together each term for science days, sports carnivals, year 5/6 transition to high school days and various commemorative occasions such as Anzac Day and NAIDOC week.

We offer our students a wide range of extracurricular programs to cater to their interests. We have a Tuckshop program that involves students cooking the menu items with ingredients harvested from our school garden and sourced from local produce. Our Digital Technologies and Arts program is held every Thursday for all students. Our Techie Club is held after school for students who

want to delve into the world of electronics, gaming and coding. Our students also learn Japanese online with the support of the School of Distance Education.

We offer an Early Year's Transition to School program through our Bluff Playgroup. It is a very popular program where children and parents gather every Tuesday from 9-11 am during each school term. The Playgroup is open to all children aged 0-5.

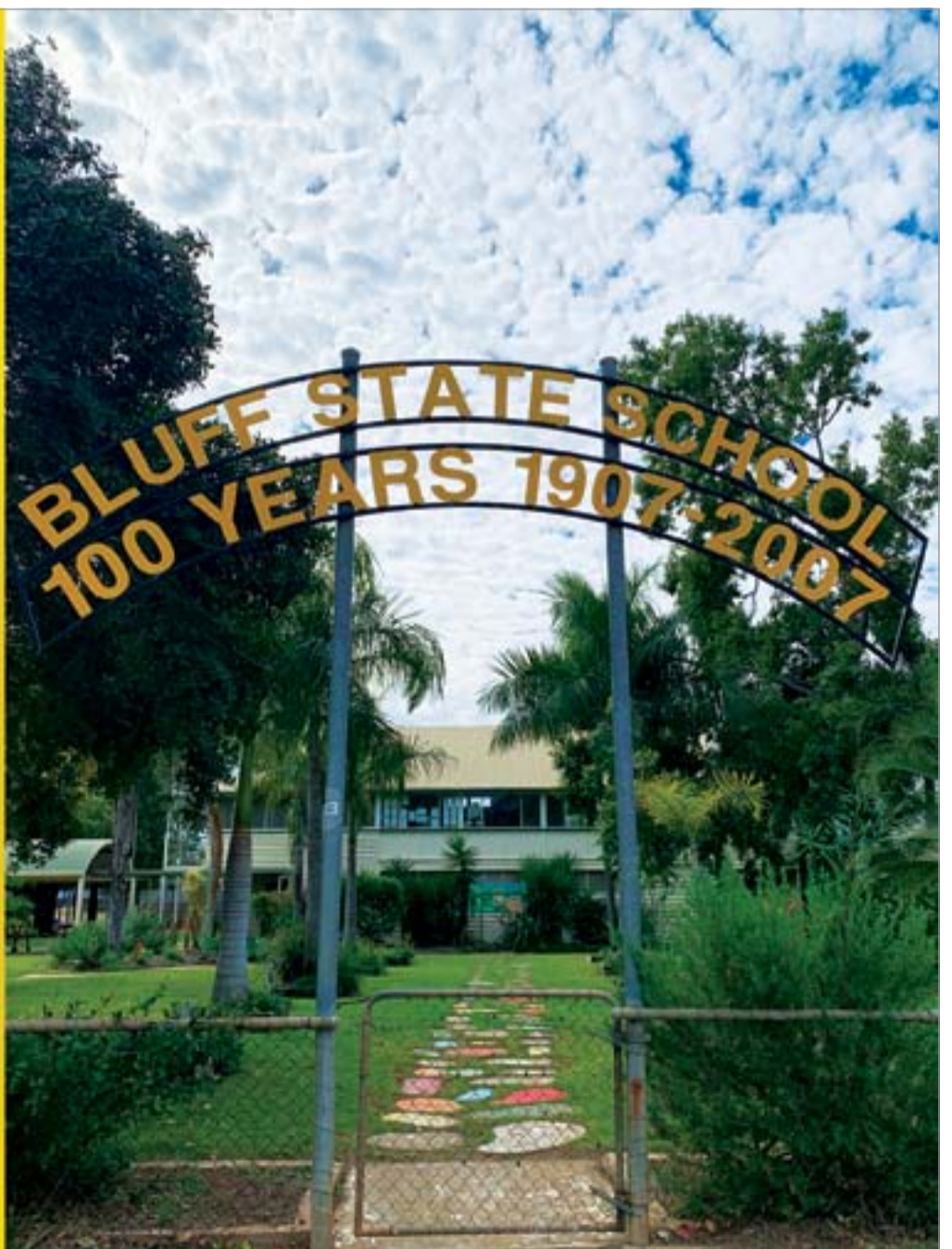

Brief history

Before it became Bouldercombe State School, the last principal of then-called Crocodile Creek Provisional School was R.D. Butler. The Bouldercombe State School that we know today was completed and opened on 27 August 1900. At the dawn of a new era, its first principal was James Cleminson who was the grandfather of Clem Jones - a former Lord Mayor of Brisbane with an enrolment of 140 students. Throughout its history of providing excellent primary education, school numbers have increased which has resulted in the expansion of infrastructure. An additional building was erected on the site in the early 1970s before another structure was built which included a classroom and library having been installed in June 1985. In May 1988, an early educational unit was opened

CALLIOPE State High School – Going From Strength to Strength in 2021

After opening in 2020 with Years 7 and 8, Gladstone’s youngest high school will be growing in more ways than one next year. Not only will Calliope State High School have Year 10 in the mix for the first time, it will also see the completion of Stage 2 of their build, opening more learning spaces for students.

Calliope State High School may be less than two years old, but it is confidently establishing itself as a provider of high-quality education, centred on evidence-based practice. Principal Pete Stansfield says, “at Calliope State High School, our core business happens in the classroom, and our students are the centre of all that we do – day in, day out. The strength in what we do here is that we do it together, with students, their families and our broader school community. This is a community school. We educate our students together.”

Indeed, the Calliope community is enjoying the fruits of the coordinated campaign for its own secondary campus. In less than 20 months, Calliope State High School has transitioned to a full BYOx program, with all students experiencing learning through modern platforms, capitalising on digital resources, hybrid learning platforms, and the development of 21st century capabilities. Outside of the classroom, the learning opportunities continue. Calliope SHS’s Rugby League Program of Excellence is gaining momentum, as is the work being completed in the STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, The Arts, and Mathematics) field, evidenced through drones, HPV, robotics and 3D printing. Closing in on handball and basketball as the most popular activities at lunchtime is chess,



enjoyed by many students across all year levels and genders. In 2022, the school plans to introduce an Ag (agriculture) program, to build upon the farming expertise in the area with a modern, STEAM-focused outlook.

Also in 2022, the school will be educating four year levels for the first time, catering for students from Year 7 through to Year 10. As the school closes in on reaching full capacity, it will grow not only in student numbers, but also facilities. State 2 of the school build is set to commence before the end of the 2021 school year, with new classroom buildings to be erected around the school oval in preparation for its Senior school. Yes...there is no doubt that Calliope SHS is going from strength to strength, and is a school to watch in the years to come.

How to stay safe in real life and online

THE Daniel Morcombe Foundation was established in honour of Daniel Morcombe to make Australia a safer place for all children. It was founded by parents Bruce and Denise Morcombe, after the tragic abduction of their 13-year-old son Daniel in December 2003, while he was waiting for a bus on the Sunshine Coast, Queensland. The aims of the foundation are to educate children and young people about how to stay safe in physical and online environments and to support young victims of crime.

About Day for Daniel - Friday 29th October

Held annually on the last day of October, Day for Daniel is Australia's largest child safety education and awareness day, the objectives are:

1. Raise awareness about child safety and protection and to promote a safer community for children
2. Educate children regarding their personal safety and empower them to 'Recognise, React, Report'
3. Honour the memory of Daniel Morcombe
4. Raise funds to continue to produce and distribute free education resources

Register

Schools, early learning centres and businesses are encouraged to register and participate.

Schools and early learning centres, when registered, will receive the most up-to-date child safety education resources. Business and workplaces are encouraged to hold an event within their place of work to support the Foundation. These events can include, bingo, bake offs or even participating and raising money completing a My Walk as a team. Visit our website page, My Walk for Daniel, for more details.

Why do we wear red?

We ask people to wear red on Day for Daniel in remembrance of Daniel Morcombe. Daniel was wearing a red t-shirt on 7th December 2003 when he found himself in an unsafe situation.

Wearing red links Daniel's very real story to the importance of safety education. It provides a message of strength and hope that together we can make the world safer for all children as a legacy to Daniel and his family.

How can I educate?

The key child safety message on Day for Daniel encourages children to Recognise, React and Report if they ever feel unsafe. Child safety education does not need to be scary or risk- focused, but should highlight topics such as recognising body clues, understanding body

ownership, naming private body parts and identifying adults who can help if a child feels unsafe.

It's important to ensure the information you are sharing is age and developmentally appropriate.

Check out the Daniel Morcombe Foundation's Keeping Kids Safe Resources, a range of education videos, activities, and other resources to help you 'keep talking'.

For children

There are lots of things our bodies do to let us know we might not be safe. These are called body clues. It's important we can recognise our body clues. Things like feeling sick in the tummy, our hands sweating or our heart beating faster are all clues we might not be safe.

If we ever find ourselves in an unsafe situation, we need to be able to react. This means to find a way, if possible, to become safe again such as, saying 'No!', running away, or screaming 'help'. Sometimes we even need to break a rule to become safe again.

If we ever feel unsafe it is really important to report it to a safety helper. Keep telling an adult in your safety network until someone helps.

How do I answer questions about Daniel?

During Day for Daniel, many children and young people may be curious about Daniel, what happened to him, and why we have a Day for Daniel. It is important children learn about Daniel without getting overwhelmed, scared, or sad. Day for Daniel is a day to be positive about learning to be safe.

For children

Daniel was a 13-year-old boy who felt safe every day. One Sunday at the start of the school holidays he went to catch a bus. Unfortunately, the bus broke down and by the time the next bus turned up Daniel was gone. Daniel's situation went from safe to unsafe very quickly. Luckily, what happened to Daniel doesn't happen very often and there are lots of things we can talk about to help you stay safe. Daniel's family want to make sure all children know what to do if they ever feel unsafe at home, school, online or while in public. We have Day for Daniel so children all over Australia can learn what to do if they ever find themselves in an unsafe situation.

How can I donate?

Taisharn (Year 11) said “The most exciting part of the night was when the telescope aligned with the moon.” “You could see the bumps and detail on the moon which was really cool,” Lauren (Year 11) said.

Students are certainly on a high after their first night on the telescopes and are all very excited to be visiting St Joseph’s Park Avenue in a few weeks’ time.

I guess these students really love astronomy to the moon and back.

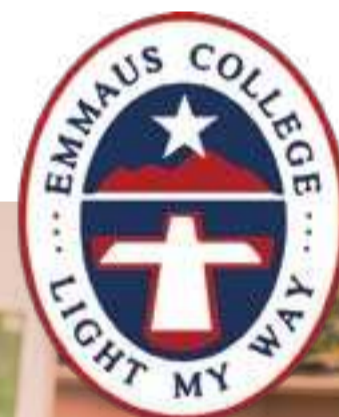

South School is the second oldest school in the Gladstone City area and lies within the traditional country of Goreng Goreng of the Central Coast District within the Fitzroy-Central West Queensland Region. Gladstone South State School is a Band 8 school with an enrolment of approximately 380 students from the preparatory year to year six. Our numbers are increasing each year. Fifteen classroom teachers operate in single classes. Diversity plays a key area in the families who are enrolled at South where a fourth of the school involves students from language backgrounds other than English and our students from the Torres Strait Islands are well represented in a third of the student population.

Our South Team consists of a Principal, Deputy Principal, HOSE, Pedagogical Coach, Learning Support Teacher, Speech Language Pathologist, Guidance Officer and Advisory Visiting Teachers who all support the educational needs of the students. The school offers a range of curriculum programs from prep to year six. Our overarching curriculum guide is ACARA, we also adopt from Queensland's C2C planning.

So, what does South offer in this modern era? South can be described as a dynamic, authentic, innovative, caring and genuine school community. Our vision and values encourage the holistic growth of all students socially, emotionally and academically by catering for differentiated learning styles through a plethora of strategies to maximise each student's potential growth. 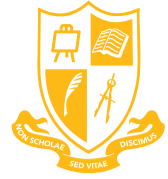

140 years of RGS

On February 1, 1881, at 11am, The Rockhampton Grammar School opened for the first time.

Through the gates that day walked 64 students – 33 boys and 31 girls. 140 years later, RGS now educates over 1350 students on the original Archer Street campus, known by many as ‘the School on the Hill’.

From its humble beginnings as a one-building school on the (then) outskirts of town, The Rockhampton Grammar School has evolved to include several ancillary campuses, including a 76-acre outdoor education site in Emu Park, a rowing club along the Fitzroy River, a demonstration farm at Port Curtis, a research and working cattle station near Glenlee and a rugby facility alongside the Botanical Gardens.

The School’s original building, School House, still stands proudly on the Archer Street campus. This building has been ‘home’ to RGS boy boarders since day one.

After 92 years of operating as a boys’ school, girls returned to the RGS classrooms in 1977 and the School has proudly been a co-educational facility since. In 1990, RGS opened its primary school, and in 2007 the Early Learning Centre opened near the main campus which has grown to enrol over 200 children from six weeks to five years of age.

School Headmaster, Dr Phillips Moulds, remarked that while the face of the School has evolved over time, the founding spirit remains unchanged.

“In 140 years, much has changed at The Rockhampton Grammar School,” commented Dr Moulds.

“Buildings have come and gone. Headmaster’s have come and

gone. But the sense of community and the ambition to provide a first-rate education to students has never wavered.”

When asked about the future of the School, the Headmaster is optimistic.

“It is impossible to imagine what RGS will look like in another 140 years,” Dr Moulds commented.

“However, I have full confidence in this school community – the trustees, the staff, the current families, the students – both past and present – that they will advance the School’s mission so that we are a place to grow in character and scholarship for decades and centuries to come.”

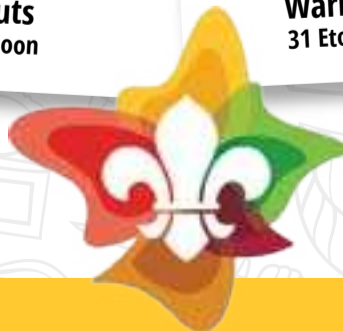
