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Art for our time

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In a sign of the Covid times, Physical Distancing has come out a winner at the Rio Tinto Martin Hanson Memorial Art Awards.

The scaled back awards were held at the Gladstone Regional Art Gallery and Museum on Saturday, 17 October, but the lack of physical attendance was made up with a large online following as the event live streamed via the gallery's Facebook page.

Viewership peaked at 133, with 1041 unique viewers watching the stream within 36 hours of its airing.

Bundaberg artist Marlies Oakley took out the \$15,000 top prize for her artwork Physical Distancing.

Judge Sue Smith said Physical Distancing perfectly represented how the world had been "turned upside" in 2020.

'Our world has been turned upside down this year as Marlies suggests in her original interpretation of the impact of the global pandemic," Ms Smith said.

"It is a work with a strong visual impact and a wealth of intricate detail that invites close inspection. The individual elements - cut outs from vintage sources - have been judiciously chosen to offer both contrast with each other and yet also blend into a cohesive whole.

"The hand-cutting and assembling of this work was no doubt a time-consuming process and the theme is ultimately sobering, but the work has small touches of humour throughout and reminds us of earlier good times which we certainly hope will return.

Ms Oakley, who entered the awards for a 10th year, said she initially forgot when they were on, which drastically cut down her time to work on a piece for submission.

"Because this year has been so upside down with Covid I only started work with two weeks to go. So over four days I put my collage together - it was spur of the moment."

Her inspiration for her collage grew as the work evolved.

"I love architecture, so I started off with European-inspired cityscapes and then thought I'd turn it around and have a mirror image and just do Australia, so it's like the northern and southern hemispheres," she said.

"I collected the Australian images that happened to be in black and white from vintage books and magazines.

"I thought that it looked like the northern and southern hemispheres with different time zones, day and night, and then the black glittery area separating those hemispheres represented social distancing where we can't really get to see each other - I can't see my father in Germany because I'm stuck in Australia.

"The idea came together really well and it was so much fun to do because I got the chance to put my little quirks in there as well.

"It was fun to not be too serious, especially in the times we're living right now."

Ms Oakley said she would save her \$15,000 prize money and use it to visit her father in Germany once travel restrictions are lifted

Twelve awards were announced across four sections - Easel Paintings, Works on Paper, Three Dimensional, and Fibre Works and

Digital Works - with a further six awards in the overall category.

Gladstone Region Mayor Matt Burnett praised those who got the awards off the ground.

"There were challenges to deliver this prestigious event in 2020 due to concerns regarding Covid-19, but sincere thanks must go to all the sponsors, artists, GRAGM and council employees, and of course judge Sue Smith, for making these awards a success," Cr Burnett said.

Regional Arts Development Fund chair Glenn Churchill said all 183 entries were winners in his eyes and reminded people to vote in the QAL People's Choice Awards and 26 November.

All artworks will be on display at the gallery until 30 January.

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

State stands with regions

A re-elected Palaszczuk government is committed to standing "shoulder to shoulder" with local councils to create more jobs across the state with a new \$680 million dollar pledge.

This includes another \$400 million regional investment in the Works for Queensland program and another \$280 million for the Transport Infrastructure Development Scheme.

Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk said the funds will benefit 65 regional councils and support up to 11,800 jobs across regional Queensland including Gladstone, Rockhampton and Livingstone.

"I know that councils in Central Queensland have welcomed every single Works for Queensland round in the past and I know the massive impact this has on supporting jobs in the region," the premier said.

This year's \$200 million Covid Works for Queensland program included \$5.2 million for Gladstone Regional Council, \$6.4 million for Rockhampton City Council and \$2.6 million for Livingstone Shire Council.

"As a government, we have always backed local governments like we have through the global Covid-19 pandemic and natural disasters like fires, floods or cyclones," the premier

Gladstone Regional Council Mayor Matt Burnett welcomes this announcement by the Queensland Government.

"This is fantastic news and it's great to see further investment in the Works for Queensland program," Cr Burnett said.

"I continually say it, but in my opinion the Works for Queensland program is the greatest program I've seen delivered by any Government.

"This program sees money go directly to Councils, helping deliver projects that make a real difference to the community by improving the liveability of our region and also creating jobs.

"The Queensland Government recently allocated \$5.2 million in its Covid Works for Queensland Program which is helping deliver nine projects in the Gladstone Region this financial year.

"This includes upgrades to Gladstone Aquatic Centre, upgrades to playgrounds and a skate park, improvements to the Boyne Island Community Centre, a pump station upgrade and several other projects."

Labor Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher said Central Queensland will benefit from the ongoing funding partnership between the state and local councils.

"I know how well we've worked together and what's been achieved so far, and I know that will continue," Mr Butcher said.

Transport and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey said a re-elected Palaszczuk government would continue to deliver local jobs through the Transport Infrastructure Development Scheme.

"This is \$280 million over four years to ensure local transport projects and local jobs are supported for local councils and their communities," Mr Bailey said.

The Transport Infrastructure Development Scheme supports infrastructure projects across Queensland through a 50:50 split between state and local governments.

The commitment builds on the \$800 million already invested in Work for Queensland.

Rosslyn Bay parks drama

The Queensland Labor government has promised to invest \$2 million to upgrade Rosslyn Bay Boat Harbour with improved in-water facilities, expanded ramps and more floating pontoons if re-elected.

But Farnbrough resident Col Power, in a letter to CQ Today, said Rosslyn's Bay's problem wasn't "the ramps and pontoons".

"The problem is the parking of cars and trailers, people have to park illegally because the car park is full," he said.

"There is no room to build new car parks, so the only way forward is another ramp and pontoon away from Rosslyn Bay. None of the council or state or federal representatives are pushing for this."

Member for Keppel Brittany Lauga said the car parking issue had already been addressed.

"We recently delivered additional car-

trailer parking facilities at the boat harbour, a \$950,000 investment, which I know has made a difference," she said.

"Now we're committing to delivering the water-side infrastructure that will make this boat harbour even better.

"Extending the boat ramps and floating walkways will allow boaties to leave their boats for longer periods at busy times, while they walk up to get their car-trailer rigs.

"This investment will also make it less congested at busy times, which many locals have raised with me."

Ms Lauga said the commitment to Rosslyn Bay Boat Harbour was great news for local boaties and tourism industry businesses.

"Works like this are crucial to not only creating new local jobs during construction but delivering the facilities we need to make our region an even better place for locals and visitors," she said.

Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk and Transport Minister Mark Bailey joined Ms Lauga on 15 October to announce the new funding commitment for better facilities for local boaties and tourists accessing the southern Great Barrier Reef and the Keppels.

"Queensland's strong health response to Covid-19 has allowed us to get on with the job of delivering Queensland's plan for economic recovery," Ms Palaszczuk said.

"This adds to our other significant job-creating investment in transport and roads in the region.

"We've already delivered close to \$810 million for better roads and transport in Central Queensland, and we've been able to bring works forward as part of a \$1 billion pipeline of road works."

A tribute to beloved swimming coach Terry Fellows

Beloved Gladstone local Terry Fellows tragically passed away on Sunday, sending a shockwave through the Gladstone community.

Mr Fellows, who was 53 years old, was scuba diving waters north of Yeppoon on Sunday morning when he was found face down in the water and unable to be revived.

Mr Fellows was an iconic member of the Gladstone swimming community, members of which are deeply saddened by the loss.

Mr Fellows had donated his time and effort to many of the clubs in Gladstone and was a key member of the Gladstone Special Olympics crew.

Gladstone Gladiators, UQ Swim Club and the Gladstone Special Olympics were all hit hard by the news of Mr Fellows passing.

Gladstone Gladiators head coach Tom Fronek said when he moved to the region six years ago Mr Fellows was a great influence on the kids he worked with.

"He was involved with the swimming club for many years," said Mr Fronek.

"I moved here six years ago and Terry was basically helping the previous coach with some work.

"I asked him if he was willing to take over the role as a junior coach and he was very happy to do that, so he was my junior coach for six years.

"He worked pretty much every day from 3.30pm till 5, looking after the kids, preparing them to move to the higher groups and competitions.

"He was very passionate about the kids, he took them as the team. $\,$

"He always created a nice group of kids who were ready to move up with me and he always did a great job with that."

Mr Fronek said he and Mr Fellows bonded a lot over those six years and he was deeply saddened by the news.

"We were friends from day one," said Mr Fronek.

"He showed me around when I first moved here and he looked after me. $\,$

"He would help me anytime I needed and we became good friends.

"We bonded very quickly and I learnt quickly that he delivered on what he said he would do.

"We had a great team."

The club has tried to shield the kids from

the tragic news but Mr Fronek said the club will never forget Mr Fellows.

"To lose someone is always hard," he said.
"We try not to involve the kids in it because it is a hard time for them as well.

"The club is doing all we can, we're going to have a competition if we can, so that will be a nice tribute to him.

"Everyone is using their own devices to deal with it and it's still very fresh.

"You're always expecting him to just walk up to the pool deck.

"It's just going to continue bringing back memories for me."

UQ Swim Club added this statement on Facebook after learning the tragic news:

It is with a very heavy heart that we express our condolences to all of Terry Fellows' family and friends at this sad time, and extend our thoughts to the Special Olympics family, and the wider Gladstone Swimming Community.

Terry was a very dear friend to some of our swimmers/families, and was also instrumental in both MultiClass Swimming and Special Olympics throughout QLD.

Terry assisted on pool deck at our Christmas Set and loved everything about swimming and coaching, and LOVED life itself! RIP Terry.







Reef's biggest dump site

Great Keppel Island has become the largest dump site within the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park, according to Altum Property Group owner, Rob McCready.

Mr McCready said Altum can help minimise the rubbish by working in partnership with locals on the island and Livingstone Shire Council

The statement was made by Altum after winning the prestigious 2020 Green Space Urban Award at the 60th annual Australian Institute of Horticulture awards.

"We can minimise the rubbish required to be sent back to the mainland by reusing some of the materials salvaged in the rebuilding process," Mr McCready said.

"We can also duplicate the landfill reduction system that we used when we transformed a disused sand mine into what is now the stunning Parkridge Noosa.

"Although the 5.44 hectare former sand mine was almost entirely enveloped by protected natural parkland, the site had been used as an illegal dump for more than two decades.

"The dumped waste was a combination of construction materials and demolished building waste from neighbouring developments, as well as general waste and green waste

"We set up a system to separate the waste, process it on site, re-use where possible and then recycle.

"As a result, 25,000m3 of waste was either reused or recycled as part of the rehabilitation of the site.

"By the end of the rehabilitation less than two per cent of the waste went to landfill.

"Unfortunately, Great Keppel Island has become the largest dump site within the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park, but there is definitely hope to duplicate this system and rectify the problem," he said. Altum Property Group signed a sale agreement with Tower Holdings Pty Ltd to purchase leases and redevelop the GKI back in 2019.

The revitalisation project is forecast to create 1490 jobs per year for the 12 years of con-

struction and generate 1500 operational roles once completed.

The project is expected to cost an estimated \$1.5 billion and inject \$1 billion into the region Qal economy.

"The expo has caused me to look at the mining industry, it's given me a lot of stuff to think about to see what I'm interested in," she said

Eloise, who's interested in the environmental side of things, enjoyed the opportunity to try out VR headsets and the holographics tent at the expo.

She said she would definitely encourage other kids her age to come and have a look.

Rockhampton Mayor Margaret Strelow said the event had been even bigger than anticipated.

"About 200 students had booked to come through 200 but it's been a lot more than that, with well over 300 people here at 11 in the morning," she said.

Cr Strelow said it was important to remember that the goal of the expo, held by Capricorn Enterprise, was to attract students and members of the general public who might consider a career in the resources or construction sector.

"This is really important for the Rockhampton region at the moment, we know there are huge jobs in our vicinity and more to come and we want those jobs filled by locals and our own firms to be able to grow quickly enough to deliver on those projects," she said.

"We certainly welcome the projects but the value to our community is a lot less if they're built by people who take their money back home with them.

"It's very important for our economy and our young people as well that they get to explore the opportunities of a job either in the resources sector or the construction sector."

Cr Strelow said while Advanced Rockhampton, the council's economic development entity, had done great work bringing the event together, it was the businesses that gave up their time to attend the expo that deserved the biggest praise.

"The expo allows young people to speak with the CEOs and employers directly; other times you might be one of 200 or 300 applying for an apprenticeship, here's a chance to build a relationship one on one," she said.

"Certainly I encourage people to look out for this event in the calendar next year and huge kudos for those who've taken advantage of the first expo this year."

Wade Hind, from Advanced Heavy Vehicle Driver Training and Calibre Earthmoving said he was proud to join with Advanced Rockhampton to support the civil and mining in-


dustry and the current and future opportunities in the sector.

Teacher up for award

The Cathedral College's assistant principal of boarding, Ron Armstrong, has always been a hero to the school community and now he's been named as a finalist for a prestigious teaching award.

Mr Armstrong is up for the Outstanding Contribution to Teaching Award at the Queensland College of Teachers (QCT) TEACHX Awards, the only Queensland education awards that recognise teachers from all schooling sectors, all subjects and the early childhood sector.

Since starting his role in 2009, Mr Armstrong has increased TCC's boarding numbers from 120 students to full capacity at 190, with a waiting list.

During the remote learning period, Mr Armstrong reallocated TCC's boarding staff to on-campus roles to maintain their working hours, allowing day teachers to concentrate on online learning, while boarding staff supervised 110 students who were children of essential workers.

He's known around the school community as an exemplary teacher who cares about the whole person and is available for long hours every day to talk with parents.

Pre Covid-19, he travelled far and wide to meet with boarders' families, knowing how important it is to look someone in the eye and shake their hand if you are going to be responsible for their child. "Our boarding parents, like all parents, want to provide the best opportunities for their children and provide them with more than they ever had, as we all wish to do," he said.

"It is parents going out into their communities and talking about the quality of education at TCC and the level of care that their child received in boarding that keeps other parents coming to us."

Principal Rob Alexander said Mr Armstrong's leadership of his boarding team ensured the school was one of the first in the state to reopen to a full complement of students on site following Covid-19.

He's also contributed to nationwide boarding standards and professional development.

"The trust Mr Armstrong has built among regional and rural Queensland communities and their families, his exceptional teaching and his courageous and caring leadership are just some of the reasons he is a finalist for the Queensland College of Teachers TEACHX Outstanding Contribution to Teaching Award," Mr Alexander said.

The TEACHX award winners will ne announced at a virtual awards ceremony on Thursday, 29 October, on the eve of World Teachers' Day celebrations in Queensland.

The TEACHX Awards finalists have been chosen from a record number of almost 400 nominations across just six categories - a 60 per cent increase on last year's number of nominations, which was also a record.

Struck Oil reception boost

People living and travelling through Struck Oil now have better phone service to make calls, browse the internet and stay connected with family and friends.

A new mobile base station was switched on at Struck Oil under the Mobile Blackspot Program, as part of the federal government's commitment to improving connectivity in the regions.

Minister for Communications, Cyber Safety and the Arts Paul Fletcher said connectivity is particularly important following the recent spate of devastating bushfires across the region.

"Australians want to be confident our communications networks are as resilient as possible, the Mobile Blackspot Program is an important part of this," he said.

The new mobile base station was completed by Telstra and is the latest of 26 sites across Flynn to receive new or improved mobile coverage under the \$380 million dollar program.

Struck Oil resident Darryl Bray said he is

pleased that the phone tower was installed as it was quite frustrating having really poor service in the area.

"We now have mobile phone service at the house so we can phone out and people can phone in, it makes such a big difference," Darryl said.

"Quite often when it flooded we would lose our landline which was quite worrying particularly if we needed access to emer-

"It makes it very difficult to get a hold of anyone.

"Now that we have both landline and mobile telephone reception, the likelihood of this happening is minimal, which is another weight off our shoulders."

More than 40,000 Triple 0 calls have so far been made possible through the Mobile Blackspot Program.

He said the community might not be aware of the sheer amount of work SES does and SES Week was a good opportunity to highlight that.


"And also being October, we're into the wet season and it's a good reminder for people to start preparing their properties."

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\$6.5m promise in doubt

A \$6.5 million promise seems to have been taken away from a prestigious Rockhampton Sporting Club recently.

On Wednesday, in a live interview with One Nation Candidate for Rockhampton Torin O'Brien and Member for Rockhampton Barry O'Rourke, Mr O'Brien brought up the \$6.5 million that had been allegedly taken away from the Capras however there was no direct response from Mr O'Rourke around the issue.

The allegation follows a \$25 million pledge for stage one of upgrades to Browne Park if Labor is re-elected.

"I've met with a local sporting group who were given a verbal commitment from the Member for Rockhampton to fund and a further \$6.5 million towards a multi-sports facility at Rugby Park," Mr O'Brien said.

"Senior figures within the Rockhampton sporting community are outraged by Labor's decision to strip this promised money away from their sporting codes.

"From all accounts, this was a last-minute decision made to satisfy the old guard of the Labor Party here in Central Queensland, instead of doing what is right for the whole community.

"Locals are starting to seriously question Labor's plan to spend an estimated \$100 million on this white elephant, better known as Browne Park."

Mr O'Rourke responded to this by reinstating his election promise of the upgrade with-

out touching on the Capras Rugby League Club subject.

"As far as Browne Park is concerned it was my election commitment to provide Browne Park \$25 million dollars which I've done, if I'm re-elected," Mr O'Rourke said.

"I'm still pushing for Browne Park, it's been the home of rugby league for over 100 years.

"It is as easy as that, it was my commitment and I'm delivering on that."

Mr O'Brien stated: "If we want to continue producing a cross-section of inspirational sportspeople from Rockhampton, we need to spend government money across a variety of codes, especially those played at Jardine Park and Rugby Park."

"Barry owes the sports community a 'please explain' as to why he's backflipped on the funding commitment to the local AFL and Rugby Park organisations.

"Without a Queensland budget, there's no guarantee Labor have even put money aside for Browne Park."


"These promises and commitments are proving very false from a desperate Labor Government who's own internal polling is showing a wipeout for the premier and her party in seats north of Gympie."

There is no school in the Southern Cameroons

Shining a light on struggles in Southern Cameroons

Lilian, from the Southern Cameroons, says most people aren't aware of the ongoing struggle in her homeland.

Once a British Territory, the Southern Cameroons have been part of Africa's Republic of Cameroon since 1961, where it makes up the Northwest Region and Southwest Region.

The region is Anglophile (English-speaking) as opposed to the Francophile (French-speaking) majority of the country.

Lilian, who didn't want to use her full name, said the Southern Cameroons Association Australia aimed to bring to light the struggle of English speaking Southern Cameroons who she said were facing an ongoing genocide.

The association's ultimate aim is the unconditional restoration of the statehood of the Southern Cameroons region, also called Ambazonia.

"There is an ongoing genocide in my country that has been going on for four years now," she said.

"In 2016, lawyers, teachers and students went into the streets to protest and send a message to the government about their treatment," she said.

"The government sent in the military and they started shooting from the air; 60 young people, university students, were killed and since then the conflict has escalated.

"I've lost eight people in my family through this crisis, the youngest was 22 years old, a young man who was supposed to come to Australia but was buried alive."

Lilian said there was no school in the Southern Cameroons, and children as young as two months old had been killed by the military.

"The French language was enforced on Anglophone students, but not English on Francophones," she said.

"Schools have been burnt, 5000 houses have been erased, 700 villages have been erased and people are living on the streets.

"People have been shot, beheaded, burnt alive. The government takes the money they have been given to fight the coronavirus and spends it on weapons."

Lilian said the Southern Cameroons Association Australia wanted to create awareness, and had approached politicians and church-

es, but found "a lot of people don't even know where Cameroon is".

"Before that, he was doing everything, mowing, home-maintenance and he was still driving at age 96," his daughter Therese said.

"Mum and dad painted their own home inside and out, they used to get up really early, at five o'clock, and started painting in case we arrived so they wouldn't get in trouble with us," Det said.

Bon passed away 12 months ago and she and Ted had been married for 70 years. They have nine grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

Ted had two parties for his 100th birthday, one at Leinster Place on Friday, 9 October and a family event the following day at Col Brown Park on the riverbank, where he received his card from



Resign before campaign

The Rocky Mayor has every right to wrap herself in bubble wrap to protest the Labor Government law that says if she runs for a state seat the runner up gets to don the mayoral robes.

After all she's not the first elected person to perform a stunt like that. Personally I disagree with this law, I prefer the one we brought in that meant a wanna be pollie could not ride two horses in the one race.

Neil Fisher and Mary Carroll both had the guts to forgo their council careers and seek higher office. Neither were successful but both have returned to successful careers. Now before someone yells hypocrite at me for being a Rocky city Alderman when elected as MP for Rocky North in 1989 I plead guilty. My only defence is that these were the days of part time local government. My annual ratepayer funded pay packet was less than five grand. In those days it was a meeting allowance. These days they are full time with superannuation and I have no problem with that.

The only way a high school will ever be built there is if some politician overrules the government planners who say the numbers do not add up.

The pathway to jail for a minister who does that is well laid out. I have relatives who sit on buses in Brisbane for twice the time to get to high school as kids from Gracemere do to get to Rocky High but, as the patron of Rocky High and a volunteer there, I will fight to my last curse to stop any erosion of the teacher numbers and curriculum options there.

You can't ignore the reality of trying to setup a state high school in a place where about 30 per cent of parents send their kids to private high schools. I have no issue there, they have every right to do so.

My issue is with the mayor Ms Strelow and any other councillor who voted to spend rate-payer dollars on campaigning against the Labor state government. Sadly, under our electoral laws, there is no remedy for the ratepayer to redeem the funds that are being splurged on these sort of antics.

While I am on my high horse, I reckon every candidate should be forced to declare whether they owe money to the taxpayer and others regardless of if they are discharged of the debt or not. I'm confident that 99 per cent would comply, but I know at least one local candidate wouldn't. Thankfully the ALP has a process to weed out undesirables like this out of the process, and I think the LNP does too. How can someone who fails to pay their tax expect the taxpayer to employ them? It's unconscionable as well as unfair.

State of our roads show need to go back to basics

This past week I drove 2200 kilometres through Central Queensland. I visited five coal mines, farms and a few pubs for a drink and a meal.


Two things strike you when you drive through Central Queensland. First, so much wealth is generated in our region. Second, the state of our roads do not match the level of prosperity that we generate.

Central Queensland produces \$40 billion of wealth for Australia every year, from a population base of just over 400,000. That's an income per person of more than \$100,000, double that of Tasmania. Our higher productivity is largely thanks to the coal, cattle, cane and cotton that we produce in the region.

Yet the roads that connect our wealth-producing mines and farms are sub-standard. I spoke to people at the Moranbah Workers Club last week about some sections of the Peak Downs Highway where major accidents have recently occurred. The Fitzroy Development Road makes you go up and down more than a trampoline and the May Downs Road is a corrugated, unsafe goat track. A local Facebook group - May Downs Rd, Enough is Enough has reported six major accidents over the past year on this road.

Some of these roads do need major invest-

Over the past few years, the federal government has provided 80 per cent of the funds for major upgrades to state roads. Previously the federal government only contributed 50 per cent of the funds. There has been a new ver-

sion of the 'Beef Roads' program that is seeing the sealing of the Clermont to Alpha Road, Springsure to Tambo and parts of May Downs Road. The Walkerston Bypass upgrade is about to begin as well. All together the federal gov-

ernment is spending over \$500 million upgrading rural roads in Central Queensland and another \$800 million towards the construction of the Rockhampton Ring Road.

The state LNP has also announced further upgrades to the Peak Downs Highway if it gets in and plans to upgrade the Bruce Highway to four lanes.

Perhaps the most important change, however, could be to spend more on road maintenance. The roads in Central Queensland get a hammering.

Some loads are not just wide they are heavy and make short work of roads already built on rich black soils made for growing crops not building roads on. But that shouldn't be an excuse. Those wide loads make money for our state and more of the revenue from these investments should come back into keep the roads up to scratch.

In an answer to a question on notice in the parliament last year, the Queensland government admitted that there is a \$5.4 billion 'maintenance backlog' in road upgrades, including a \$940 million backlog in Central Oueensland.

This is not surprising when the Brisbanebased government spends money on bonuses for public servants but fails to get the basics

The economic fallout from coronavirus should encourage us to get back to basics. To back our local wealth-producing industries that have held up the country at this difficult time. Governments should focus again on the basic things that are in their control like maintaining safe and productive roads so that we can create even more wealth from our region.



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Covid and SMSF rentals



The Federal government announced a sixmonth moratorium on evictions of commercial and residential tenants during the Covid-19 health pandemic.

This moratorium, and its accompanying code of conduct leasing principles, will inevitably affect SMSFs, which are reasonably heavily invested in real property, according to statistics.

LEASING PRINCIPLES

A moratorium on evictions means that SMSF (self-managed super fund) landlords face the real prospect of tenants falling behind on their rent. However, this does not mean that the tenant is not required to pay rent during the moratorium period.

Rather, broadly speaking, parties are encouraged and indeed required to negotiate a rental reduction, deferrals, or rent-free periods if the tenant needs. In terms of commercial rents, a mandatory code has been developed and applies if a tenant or landlord is eligible for Job-Keeper payments and has a turnover of less than \$50 million. The code includes a common set of principles that must be adhered to, including:

- Landlords must not terminate leases for non-payment of rent during the Covid-19 pandemic (or reasonable recovery period)
- Tenants must stay committed to their lease terms (subject to amendments)
- Landlords must offer reductions in rent (as waivers or deferrals) based on the tenant's reduction in trade during COVID-19
- Benefits that owners receive for their properties (eg reduced charges, land tax, deferred loan payments from banks) should be passed on to the tenant proportionately

However, granting rental relief - where not carefully justified and documented - can present considerable compliance risks for SMSF landlords. This includes fines of up to \$12,600 per trustee and/or in serious instances the SMSF being deemed non-complying, in which case the value of its assets as at the commencement of the income year could be taxed at 45 per cent.

NON ARM'S LENGTH TENANTS

Where the property is held by the SMSF and the tenant is a "related party" of the SMSF trustee, unless care is taken, evidence gathered, and the arrangement is properly documented, there is a real risk that, in granting rental relief, breaches of the following provisions of the SIS Act may result.

■ The sole purpose test. In granting rental relief, the SMSF trustee may not be deemed to be acting with the sole purpose of maximising the retirement benefits of members of the fund, but rather acting to assist the related party with their rental expenses.

- The arm's length test. In granting rental relief to a related party, it may be considered that the fund is not maintaining all investments and transactions at arm's length, in the same way as they would deal with an unrelated party.
- In-house asset test. In providing rent relief, is the SMSF providing a loan to the related party tenant? In the unlikely event that this loan exceeds 5% of the value of the fund's assets, the fund can be deemed to be noncomplying.
- Prohibition against lending or providing financial assistance to a member or relative. In granting relief to the tenant member or relative, could it still be said that the arrangement is still on commercial or arm's length terms so as to avoid being deemed "financial assistance"?

It is, however, important to note that the ATO updated its auditor/actuary contravention report (ACR) instructions for the 2019-20 income year to state SMSF auditors will not be required to report in the ACR breaches of the sole purpose test and in-house provisions that may occur as a result of Covid-19 rent relief measures.

ARM'S LENGTH TENANTS

Although the risk is less acute, with potentially only the sole purpose test in play, the same careful evidence gathering and documentation is recommended where rental relief is granted to a party who is not related to the

SMSF trustee. Unless it can be demonstrated that the relief granted was actually still in the broader interests of the SMSF, then a breach of the rules is a possibility.

JUSTIFICATION

To establish a strong case for granting rental relief, SMSF trustees should obtain sufficient evidence including the following where applicable:

- The financial circumstance of the tenant. In terms of evidencing this, it may take the form of:
- Their eligibility for JobKeeper (which itself requires evidence of a downturn in turnover)
- Year-to-date financial statements
- Cashflow forecasts
- A report from the tenant's registered tax agent that the tenant is experiencing Covid-19-related financial difficulties that may impact their ability to pay the agreed rate of rent
- Government restrictions that may impact the tenant long-term, such as those imposed on large restaurants where, even when they are permitted to open, social distancing requirements in the venue may still nonetheless impact capacity and profitability
- Any comparable rental relief that is being offered by arm's length landlords to their tenants
- The difficulty in leasing out the property to a new tenant, should the current tenant default on the lease. The location of the

property, or the type of property may mean that retaining the current tenant - even with rental relief - is in the long-term best interests of the SMSF, particularly where the current tenant has an otherwise good history in terms of paying on time and looking after the property

To the above point, if the property was untenanted, it may be more difficult to obtain insurance cover. Additionally, untenanted properties are arguably more vulnerable to break-ins and natural deterioration/rundown.

It is important that any rental relief that is granted is proportionate to the above, and that the new arrangement is properly documented by amending the lease agreement between the parties, including the reasons for any reductions.

In summary, where the related-party lender provides any relief to the SMSF that is not comparable to an arm's-length arrangement (that it may offer unrelated parties in these fraught economic times), then the ATO may then apply the non-arm's length rules to tax any net income or future capital gain from the property, for the entire future period of ownership, at the top individual marginal tax rate.

Whether these provisions are applied may ultimately depend on whether the SMSF can justify with documented evidence that the decision to alter repayment terms is done on a commercial basis as if the parties were unrelated

She has spent 25 years working for International Auction Houses preparing jewellery sales for London, Geneva and New York, and established her own valuation business in 2015.





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Social media in break-ups

The break-up of a relationship is usually a time of high tension, stress and often anger.

In days gone by you could have a good vent to your friends at the local pub or club about the behaviour of your partner, and that would be the end of it.

It would usually stay at the pub or club. Today however, social media with the phenomenon of Facebook, Instagram and Twitter has ensured that any venting using any of these vehicles will definitely not "stay at the pub".

Even though you may be angry, upset and humiliated, you should avoid using social media to express your feelings at all costs. You are not just talking to your friends, you are talking to the world.

There are several reasons why you must abstain.

You should be aware that any comments you make, particularly those fuelled by emotion, anger and sometimes alcohol may be used as evidence against you in future Family Court proceedings.

This could have a detrimental affect against you, particularly with parenting matters involving your children.

Another negative influence of using social media is how an emotional or angry message may affect your children, immediate family and close friends. It is almost guaranteed that these people and many more will end up reading it.

Anyone who is in the middle of family law proceedings with their ex should definitely be very cautious of what they post.

The Family Law Act prohibits the publication of any material that identifies a party or a witness in proceedings before the Family Court.

Any such publication amounts to a serious offence under the act.

It also includes any publication of the names of children who are the subject of parenting proceedings.

Prior to the advent of Facebook, the prohibition on publication mostly applied to newspapers and journalists.

With the rapid growth of social media in recent times, your Facebook updates may well amount to an offence if they publicly identify people involved in a Family Law Court case.

Social media usage can create even wider issues. A decision of a Magistrates Court in North Queensland found that a derogatory comment, posted by a man about his ex-wife on Facebook, amounted to defamation.

The post, which referred to the wife as "thieving, lying, money crazed" among other expletives, was found to be a defamation of the wife's character.

Even though the post was removed by the husband within 24 hours, the post was seen by mutual friends, and the husband was ordered to pay the wife the sum of \$10,000 in compensation for the defamation of her character.

So, it is important to think twice before posting something on social media, regardless how hurt, emotional or angry you are feeling at the time.

Perhaps on social media, as well as in life, we should live by the saying "if you don't have anything nice to say, don't say anything at all".



CQUni welcomes LNP funding promise

CQUniversity has warmly welcomed a \$49.8 million commitment from the Queensland LNP to build the Central Queensland TAFE Centre of Excellence in Rockhampton.

The funding commitment, announced by LNP leader Deb Frecklington MP, would cover the full cost of the project if the LNP is elected at this month's state ballot.

It means the project now has the support of both major parties and most minor parties.

CQUniversity Vice-Chancellor and President Professor Nick Klomp welcomed Ms Frecklington's commitment, describing it as a "game changer" for skills-based training in the Rockhampton region.

"As the public provider of TAFE in Central

Queensland, CQUniversity takes very seriously its obligation to provide world-class facilities and training to the region's apprentices, trainees and VET students," Professor Klomp said.

"Today's commitment from the LNP provides reassurance to the region, our students, and their employers, that we now have a commitment from both major parties to build this much-needed facility.

"I thank Deb Frecklington and the LNP for recognising CQUniversity's vision for the future of TAFE in Central Queensland, and for rising to the occasion via this funding commitment."

The LNP commitment follows a Labor pledge to fund the \$8.4m first stage of the TAFE Centre of Excellence, and commit-

ments from minor parties should they hold the balance of power.

Professor Klomp said the Central Queensland TAFE Centre of Excellence would employ 350 people during the construction phase, 300 people long-term, and have capacity to train an additional 2,500 apprentices and VET students a year by 2030.

"Given the current economic climate, the TAFE Centre of Excellence represents an ideal investment by government; it will create new jobs immediately, and then will keep turning out highly skilled, highly qualified Central Queenslanders for many years after," Professor Klomp said.

Once complete, the 26,000sqm TAFE Centre of Excellence will replace the existing

Canning Street TAFE. The new facility will be co-located on CQUniversity's Rockhampton North campus, with the full construction project expected to be completed within three years.







From India to Australia

It's 9.30pm on a cold winter's night, and the hustle and bustle of inner-city Melbourne life is slowly starting to fade away as patrons at the usually busy East Richmond train station head home to their families. There are a few people lingering on the platforms, waiting for their trains.

Krupali Joshi, a cleaning worker on night shift, glances around at the nearby platforms and spots a rubbish bin on the platform opposite to where she is standing, overflowing with discarded coffee cups and empty crisp packets.

As she heads over to start the clean-up, she notices a heavily intoxicated man standing by the edge of the nearest platform, swaying and muttering incoherently.

After a moment he takes an unsteady step closer to the edge of the platform and slips over the edge on to the train tracks. Ms Joshi quickly rushes over, only to find the man lying flat on his back with blood gushing from his head.

"Before I really realised what was happening, he fell from the platform onto the tracks with a loud bang," she said. "I immediately went to check on him, and that's when I saw him lying on the tracks with blood streaming from his head, cuts and bruises all over."

Ms Joshi called her colleague over for help, and the pair sprang into action.

"I panicked when I realised the next train was only eight minutes away. I knew I had to do something, or this man was going to die on the tracks," she said.

Within minutes, Ms Joshi was able to contact the station's signal operator to stop the incoming train, and together with her colleague she was able to pull the unconscious man from

the tracks and up onto the platform to safety.

The man was then taken by ambulance to the nearest hospital where he received medical treatment before later being released into police custody. Ms Joshi and her colleague both received awards for their bravery from their employer.

For the 22-year-old, who is working parttime as a cleaner while completing her Masters degree, this moment is much more than just a case of being in the right place at the right time.

Born into an underprivileged family in the city of Ahmedabad in India, where world-class education is a luxury few can afford, Ms Joshi dreamed of one day being able to travel the world, pursue a successful career and receive a university education.

A motivated, driven young girl with ambition and aspiration, Ms Joshi's parents wanted to be able to provide her with the opportunity to fulfil her dreams despite their financial limitations, so they applied for enrolment in the Adani Foundation's Vidya Mandirs, a school for gifted underprivileged children.

Ms Joshi passed the mandatory admissions exam with flying colours and was granted entry into Adani Vidya Mandir, where she completed her high school studies and discovered her exceptional sporting talents as a track and field athlete, collecting countless medals along the way.

Since 2008, the Adani Vidya Mandirs in Ahmedabad (Gujarat), Bhadreshwar (Gujarat) and Surguja (Chhattisgarh) have been providing cost-free education to over 2000 children from low income families.


It has now been over a year since Ms Joshi left her family, friends and life in India behind to chase her dreams of a bright future.

New life for historic site

Change is in the wind for the old Central Queensland Cement site on Yaamba Road, with the iconic location to become a prestige industrial estate.

JRT executive manager Brad Neven said Jason Thomasson, current owner and director of JRT, had acquired the site from Sibelco and planned to subdivide it into a premier industrial precinct, Lily Place.

"We have all our approvals in place from the relevant bodies and we're currently engaged a demolition company who are in the midst of demolishing the old cement works," he said.

"The chimney is already gone and once they've removed all of the excess material we can begin the subdivision."

Mr Neven said JRT already had contracts on two of the blocks and interest in three other sites before beginning advertising.

"We really want to make sure we get the right tenants," he said.

"It's a premier site, it's on the highway, it's on the northern entrance to Rockhampton and the Ring Road is going to be 400-500 metres down the road.

"This is a prime position for Industrial businesses to set up shop, giving them access to the west, south and north

Some buildings and a shed will be left on the land to be utilised by JRT and we'll be keeping six silos which will be decorated with murals by local artists."

Mr Neven said there would be consultation with the community as to the theme of the murals, possibly something locally themed like "barras, bull, the islands, the crocodile farm or an Indigenous theme".

"They're an iconic part of the region's his-

tory and we want to make sure they're retained and compliment the region's already impressive tourism capacity," he said.

"The silos will put us on the Australian Silo Trail, replacing Monto as the northern-most silos."

He said the redevelopment would drive significant economic benefit to the local community.

"This is a heavy industrial site that's being repurposed that's going to create jobs for the region because businesses are going to invest and build there," he said.

SMW group CEO Jack Trenaman started as an apprentice at Central Queensland Cement in 1988 and worked his way up the maintenance manager position by the end of his 14 years on the site.

"It had a good culture and good people as well as a good system for apprentices.

"All the apprentices worked through multiple disciplines, they were either fitters and turners or electricians.

"As fitters and turners we all covered the

trade of diesel fitters, motor mechanics and boiler makers. We did a lot of internal machining and would make a lot of parts ourselves.

"The electricians would spend time at the fitters' sheds and we'd spend time in the electrical shed where they'd show us voltage work and isolation, all the dos and don'ts."

This cross skilling of trades is what SMW Group does with their apprentices today, something that Mr Trennaman says makes them highly sought after.

Mr Trenaman left in the early 2000s and worked as part of the team that converted the cement kiln to a lime kiln.

"It was the only rotary kiln in the world that manufactured that variety of products from one kiln, only because of blokes like ourselves who wouldn't take no for an answer," he said.

Merv Barton was the last general manager before CQ Cement was downsized from a fully integrated cement and lime manufacturing plant to focusing on special products under

He's proud of the number of apprentices that went through the business's doors, with CQ Cement putting on a minimum of one electrical and one mechanical apprentice a year until the early '90s.

"A lot of apprentices have done really well on the international scene, managing very large corporations, it was a good grounding for them," he said.

"Quote a number of us oldies pre-Covid used to meet regularly for lunch. It's a friendly company, like all families you squabble among yourselves but at the end of the day you're still friends."

Mr Barton said he was happy to see JRT "breathe new life into the place" with their industrial estate plans.

The early history of Central Queensland Cement

The following notes have been compiled for members of the Central Queensland Speleological Society for assistance with research into the early history of Central Queensland Cement Pty Ltd. Information sources were company records, a document titled "Building a Plant - The Early History of C.Q. Cement" by W. Hoskins and the popular recollections of various present and past company staff.

$\label{lem:continuous} \textbf{Events Preceding The Formation Of Central Queensland Cement.}$

The Central Queensland region is an area rich in natural resources and in the 1890s a strong push for a separate colony based on Rockhampton almost succeeded.

In the 1950s a new organisation named the Capricornia New State Movement was formed with strong encouragement from the Rockhampton Chamber of Commerce.

Members of these groups believed the wealth of Central Queensland was being siphoned off to the south-east area of Queensland without adequate return to the central region.

Although resource rich the Rockhampton region was in crisis with significant numbers

of unemployed and it was felt by many at local and State level that a secondary industry such as a cement plant was essential.

Mineral (limestone) leases in the Mt Etna region had been held since the 1930s by a Mr Donald L . Fraser with other leases held by Mt Morgan Ltd and Mr Berserker Pilkington.


Mr Pilkington operated a quarry and lime burning operation on Limestone Ridge until closure in the mid 1960s.

It is believed that Mr Pilkington served his apprenticeship with Mt Morgan Ltd as a mechanical fitter and turner in the steam-driven powerhouse and at the outbreak of World War I joined the Royal Navy.

On discharge from the Navy at cessation of hostilities, Mr Pilkington married and returned to Australia to commence (for the times) the technically advanced lime burning operation, Pilkington and Co., at Mt Etna.

The ruins of the quarry and lime kilns are currently preserved within the Mt Etna Caves National Park as an example of lime burning operations of the era.

In 1957 a series of events occurred which forced a number actions by Central Qld Cement's parent company Qld Cement Ltd.

In this year the Nicklin Country Party/Liberal Party Coalition was voted into office and this government was enthusiastic about development in Central Queensland.

At this stage the push for a cement industry in the region commenced in earnest.

It is believed that Mr Pilkington, using locally sourced raw materials, manufactured small quantities of cement in his laboratory at Mt Etna and took the samples overseas for use during negotiations with a major international cement manufacturing company.

Mr Pilkington also made approaches to Qld Cement Ltd in a bid to form a partnership, which ultimately proved futile.

From these events two main contenders for the establishment of a cement industry in Central Qld emerged.

On 30 July, 1959, Qld Cement Ltd incorporated a private company Hartley Investment Pty Ltd with the intention to quietly acquire mining leases in the Glenmore area.

These lease applications were strongly opposed by a local family who would be affected by any mining operation and the Rockhampton City Council as the area was to be included in the future town plan.

Also formed was Limestone Leases Pty Ltd a company founded by Mr William R. Thompson who had recently acquired limestone leases on Mt Etna. Other significant shareholders were Berserker and Evelyn May Pilkington.

It was reported in the local press that this company had made application to the Qld Government for a guarantee on bank loans for the establishment of a cement plant at Camoo Siding on the south-west side of Mt Etna and that this application was favourably received by the government.

The Formation Of Central Queensland Cement

On 19 October, 1959, The Articles of Association of Hartley Investments Pty Ltd were rescinded and on 20 October, 1959, a resolution changing the company name to Central Queensland Cement Pty Ltd was passed by the board of Qld Cement.

Ownership of the company was Qld Cement Ltd 75 per cent and North Australian Cement Ltd 25 per cent (NAC L was approximately 40 per cent owned by QCL).

Events Leading To The Establishment Of A Cement Plant

An announcement was made that Central Qld Cement planned to establish a distribution facility at Parkhurst, just north of Rockhampton, and to rail bulk cement from the QC L - Darra manufacturing site.

This decision was based on the company's research that the local market was too small for the economic establishment of a full cement plant and it was stated that a limited manufacturing facility (ie: a grinding plant based on clinker railed from Darra) would be built when annual sales in the local region reached 17,000 tonnes and a full plant considered when sales figures reached 25,000 tonnes.

This announcement drew considerable criticism from the local business community who had an expectation that construction of a fully integrated cement plant was imminent.

The reaction of this group of influential people was to form the Central Queensland

Cement Investigation Syndicate with Mayor Aid. RBJ Pilbeam elected chairman.

This group continued the pressure for a cement plant in Rockhampton with a vigorous media campaign and representation to the State Government.

Co-incidental with this campaign, Limestone Leases Pty Ltd placed an advertisement in the local newspaper calling for expressions of interest for the establishment of a cement plant in Rockhampton.

The building of a plant

In September 1960 Central Queensland Cement announced an immediate start on construction of a cement grinding and bagging plant at Parkhurst using clinker railed from Darra and when operational, construction of a full cement plant would begin.

It is of interest that local cement sales had not yet reached 15,000 tonnes.

Limestone Leases Pty Ltd were still attempting to establish their own operation with a new application (supported by the Rockhampton Trades and Labour Council, the Chamber of Commerce and the District Development Association) to the State Government Industries Assistance Board for a Government Guarantee.

The application was refused by Cabinet.

Due to the previously mentioned objections to the Glenmore mineral leases and technical problems associated with the limestone (ie: chemical composition) Central Queensland Cement decided to seek alternate mineral leases within economic distance of the proposed new plant.

In the early 1960s the company embarked on a purchasing program to acquire existing mineral leases and title to strategic freehold land in the Mt Etna area with the following leases



subsequently purchased.

- Mineral lease 281 (current title M L 5765) purchased from Evelyn May Pilkington.
- Mineral lease 307 (current title M L 5766) purchased from Berserker Pilkington.
- Mineral lease 236 purchased from Berserker Pilkington.
 Mineral lease 243 purchased from Berserker
- Pilkington.

 Mineral lease 326 (current title M L 5767)
- purchased from William Ross Thompson.
 Mineral lease 340 (current title M L 5768) purchased from William Ross Thompson.

Construction of the new cement plant at Parkhurst and crushing and screening plant at Mt Etna was completed during 1966. Mining operations on the eastern slopes of Mt Etna commenced mid year in preparation for commissioning of the cement plant in September 1966.

A vertical lime kiln and hydration plant was added to the Parkhurst operation in 1967.

From the outset conservationists protested against mining on Mt Etna out of concern for the maternity site of the Little Bent Wing Bat and the potential destruction of various cave systems.

In November 1973 Central Queensland Cement surrended mineral leases 236 and 243 to the Qld Government to assist with formation of the Fitzroy Caves National Park and protection of the breeding site of the vulnerable Ghost Bat on Limestone Ridge.





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

The platypus of plants

Have you noticed an orange flowering tree in bloom around the Rockhampton region at the moment?

There are numerous specimens growing along Moores Creek Road, Kerrigan Street and Frenchville Road and the hills surrounding Mount Morgan.

The tree itself is an oddity with orange pea shaped flowers, rose like thorns, seeds used in making jewellery, corky bark used for making floats for fishing nets, wood that was used as brake blocks for horse and bullock-drawn vehicles and also used in making polo balls and the leaves are totally unique, as they are shaped like the Batman symbol.

The soft timber of this tree was also highly regarded by the Aborigines, as it could be used as a base for fire-lighting by friction and a tea made from the dried leaves to be used a sedative.

The tree is the Bat's Wing Coral or Erythrina vespertilio, a semi-deciduous tree native to northern New South Wales to northern half of Queensland and across the Northern Territory to northern Western Australia.

In fact, the tree is well named as Erythrina comes from the Greek word erythros, red and vespertilio is Latin for bat. The common name for this tree refers to the bat-shaped leaves and the light-coloured cork-like bark.

Erythrina vespertilio is a small, open tree that will tolerate dry conditions and growing between six and 10 metres high. Around this time of year, while the tree is temporarily leafless, masses of 3-4cm long, orange-red peashaped flowers hang from the tree. The nectar of these flowers is like a magnet to honeyeating birds. Following the flowers are brown woody seedpods and it should noted that the seeds are toxic.

The thorns on this tree are unusual for a tree of this type and can easily catch you. I know from experience as a young boy, I gained a scar the length of my hand from grabbing hold of a tree while walking down the mountainside near my home.

The Bat's Wing Coral trees are easy to grow, provided they can be protected from frost and hungry animals in their early years but could provide an interesting conversation piece in garden.

Stunning Arctotis

I have received some enquiries about a brilliant pink flowering groundcover growing in the Lammermoor beach car park. The plant is an Arctotis or commonly known as African daisies. They are not to be confused with Osteosperma (formerly Dimeothecas).

These days, there are many spectacular flowering Arctotis hybrids that are ideal as ground covers, boarders or even as a colour-

ful cover for sloping gardens or embankments. Being hardy, sun-loving plants, they can handle just about any type of environment, though being well mulched may be required in certain well-drained soils.

The dense silver foliage and colourful blooms of the Arctotis make an eye-catching feature in any garden. The range of flower colours includes variations of red, white, yellow, pink, orange and mauve, with contrasting centres.

It should be noted that on cloudy days, or even as the afternoon shadows fall upon the plant, the flowers will close up, and sometimes they will tend to flower on the sunnier side of the garden first. Many of our country gardeners could even select this plant as a westernside feature in their gardens without fear that it will collapse after the first hot dry winds of summer.

Taming land of extremes

Dorothea McKellar was spot on when she described Australia as a land of droughts and flooding rains, of beauty and of terror.

That pretty much sums up life on the land in Queensland!

The majority of the state remains in drought, as it has for the past seven or eight years, but the recent declaration of the La Nina means that those 'flooding rains' – not to mention destructive weather like cyclones – are more than likely on their way.

We are also coming into a bushfire season that is predicted to be longer, drier and more dangerous than ever before.

But we've come a long way in terms of managing our extremes of weather in the 110 years since Dorothea penned those famous words.

We have improved the way we predict and prepare for weather extremes, how we clean up afterwards, and the support governments and the community provide to producers and their communities.

But there is so much more that can be done, and regional Queenslanders need to know that governments have their backs – especially if our agriculture industry is to continue to produce food that is clean, green and sustainable and pump \$18 billion into the economy.

As we decide who is going to lead the state



for the next four years, all parties need to commit to providing practical and appropriate support in genuine consultation with industry.

Government must be flexible and imaginative in providing this support.

For example, we have been asking the state government to implement a number of measures such as removing stamp duty on agricultural insurance and adopting the AgForce Agricultural Business Cycle.

Another thing that will really help is regulatory reform conducted in genuine collabora-

tion with people who live on the land.

Prime example: the restrictive vegetation management laws that prevent landholders from managing bushfire risk effectively and that created so much devastation over the last few fire seasons.

The ag industry and regional communities are keen to work with whichever party forms government on solutions to this country's cycle of beauty and terror.

We need them to commit to the same.

Storms are on the way

Capricornia lawns and rural grasslands have been extremely dry with almost two months of only single-figure rainfall.

Monday's 34C was the hottest day in six months.

As the wind dropped to calm on the Keppels, boaties got six hours in before the NNE sea breeze belted in - gusting over 20 knots - causing the flat seas to ramp up to a metre in quick time. The breeze arrived in Rocky taking a degree off the maximum.

In the Central Highlands, on Tuesday signs of what was to come as middle level cloud that stretched from Longreach to Blackall moved east

Luke Offed texted me a photo of the scalloping or mackerel like cloud which is almost always a forerunner for afternoon storm development for the Tropic of Capricorn.

As maximums reached 36C at Blackwater and 37C at Moranbah the storms popped up from Clermont/Woorabinda/Baralaba/Dingo and Tieri.

Rockyites who looked west during the evening could see the flicker of the early evening storms in the west - more night time flickering to come!

The extra moisture available near the Capricorn/CH border helped develop mid-evening storms at Ruined Castle and Isla Delusion with 34mm and 36mm respectively.

Then Rockhampton woke on Wednesday morning to a cloudy to overcast 22.8C minimum. The hottest in seven months. This is looking like the normal "tease" for October storms.

FORECAST

The Wednesday morning satellite photo shows the middle level cloud with the embedded storms in red on the Darling Downs. Storms will develop on the cloud band edge from Dalby north to Gayndah/Biloela and Shoalwater Bay and track to the coast We might be lucky?

Looking west on the synoptic chart, a 993Hpa low is developing in South Australia.

On the Sat Pic a line of middle level cloud from Avon Downs south to west of Birdsville has morning storms "in red" near Alice Springs.

This is a strong indication the cloud band will increase in size until it covers most of Queensland and extend south to NSW/VIC. A line of storms should hit the Central West Friday then Emerald Saturday and Capricornia Sunday and Monday.

This cloudband should cause significant rainfall for many places across eastern Australia and reach the coast from as far north as Townsville and include Mackay/Brisbane/Sydney/Bega/Canberra. We are in the mix if the fickle storm nature does not split near Gracemere.


This event may affect the AFL Grand Final in Brisbane on Saturday.

Will the older Ablett/Selwood get bogged and Dusted off with the Lynching power of the Tigers?


The cloudband should affect Sydney on Sunday and affect the NRL Grand Final.

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

A record-breaker retires

Six-time AFL Capricornia premiershipwinning coach Mark Wallin has called time on his incredible coaching career.

CQ Today learned on Tuesday that Wallin had stepped down from the head coaching role at the Yeppoon Swans, finishing on 89 consecutive wins and breaking a national record in the process.

Wallin coached for seven seasons and made the grand final in every season that he was at the helm of the Swans.

Six of those, from 2014 to 2020, earnt the club a flag and five of those seasons were won undefeated.

Wallin is arguably the most successful coach that the local AFL competition has ever seen, coaching the most consistent team to ever grace a Central Queensland field.

Wallin told CQ Today he was always thinking about hanging the whistle up this season, and there was no better time to hand the reins over to someone new.

"It was a decision I made over the course of the year," said Wallin.

"There were certain things I wanted to tick off before I did.

"The record and the premiership were all taken into consideration. "I sat back with my wife and thought about

another year, but there are so many things that we want to do as a couple next year. "And I think it's really important for the

playing group to improve and get a different voice to reignite and keep the fire burning for another five or six years."

Wallin said it was a difficult choice, but he believes now is the right time to step down.

"And even to this point now, I ask myself: 'have I done the right thing?', but I know I have.

Wallin couldn't decide on his most memorable coaching moment, but he did manage to pick some highlights.

"There's too many to have just one favourite," he said.

"This year felt very similar to 2015 because it had the 89 wins and six premierships, which built up a lot of pressure over the months.

"Those were probably the two biggest

"Obviously it's been enormous since the

time he came in," said Watkins. "We had plenty of ability, we had plenty of talent, and we needed someone to come in and guide it.

"It's what all good coaches do, and that's exactly what Mark came in and did.

"Given his knowledge of all the young talent coming through, and his relationship with them, he was an obvious candidate and he brought out the best of them over those years.

"On behalf of the club, we wish him the very best for the future and you can't retire on a better note than he did this season."

It was a race of a lifetime

The breathtaking Lake Awoonga, or 'The Dam' as it is affectionately known by locals, is the best place to be on a weekend. It is the beauty of Benaraby, the jewel of the Gladstone region and the pride of the Gladstone Area Water Board.

We've all been for a barbecue at the dam, sunk a few coldies, and enjoyed a dip or a paddle in her serene waters.

But that serenity was shattered on Saturday as the Gladstone region had the chance to experience the thrill of our very own adventure race, set in the rugged surrounds of Lake Awoonga.

More than 100 adventure racers grabbed their bikes and dusted off their shoes to compete in the Lake Awoonga Adventure Race 2020.

These adrenaline-pumping, multi-disci-64 CQ TODAY Thursday, 22 October, 2020 plinary races are held outdoors on unstructured tracks through the wilderness.

A classic adventure race involves competitors changing between mountain biking, trail running and kayaking - kind of like a 'bush triathlon'. The Lake Awoonga Adventure Race is exactly that, with both novice and competitive events being held on the day.

The competitive race, which is for over 16-year-olds, is a challenging 7.4-kilometre bike ride, 2.8km trail run, 1km kayak or 500-metre swim, 2.8km trail run and 1.25km bike ride to the finish.

There were competitors from age 11, while Bryan Horton took on the gruelling challenge this year and, at 71, is an inspiration to all. He is looking forward to next year's event and will strive to better this year's race time.

The novice race (run as teams of two for 10 years plus) consists of a more leisurely 1.25km bike ride, 1.3km kayak, 2.8km trail run and

1.25km bike ride to the finish.

Both races offered those involved a great opportunity to compete with a teammate, battle it out against other teams, or just challenge themselves in the great outdoors.

This unique event is proudly hosted by the Benaraby Progress Association. For over 65 years, the progress association has held regular Friday night dances at the local hall, and these dances are still popular today but some newbies are on the scene and they can't dance!

But they can run and they can ride, and they love our dam, so they hatched a plan. Everybody loves a great adventure, and Benaraby has got the perfect spot for it. Anybody wishing to join the team to help bring new and exciting events to the region would be greatly welcome.

This year brought some challenges and, up until mid-August, organisers were unsure if we could make it happen.

But with the amazing support of event part-

ner Gladstone Area Water Board, they were able to bring this unique event to the community for the second year running.

They were also supported by the Gladstone Regional Council's Ignite Events Funding. The continued support from the volunteers is how they can bring these events to the community, and it would not have been possible without them.

If the thrill of the race isn't enough, the whopping great multi-prize draw for competitors featured over \$5000 in prizes. Thanks to the generosity of local businesses and supporters, the competitors had a one-in-four chance of winning a prize.

Mark your calendars - 23 October, 2021 is when the Lake Awoonga Adventure Race returns once again.

Organisers are just so excited about how they can build this event to be bigger and better next year.
