Seventy-five Gladstone region businesses and organisations have reported returning to pre-Covid levels of trading.

Gladstone Chamber of Commerce and Industry judge Joe Smith said many businesses told him they were performing better than before Covid restrictions were put in place.

"This is really encouraging for the Gladstone region," he said.

"Obviously, there are some industries that

have been more affected than others, but quite a lot of businesses have returned to normal."

Mr Smith said there are a few things that led

"Gladstone has quite a number of large industries operating in the area and most of those guys have managed to keep their operations running pretty close to normal," he said.

"What comes of that is the small engineering and manufacturing businesses actually get quite a bit of work from the larger industries as well so that has a flow on effect.

"Gladstone's property market is also going quite well, houses haven't been staying on the market very long, they have been selling quite quickly.

"All of that works together to show that Gladstone has performed quite well over the past six or eight months."

Anything relating to tourism has suffered a

"Tourism is doing it really tough because they've missed out on international travel, but local tourism businesses had little bit of help

due to travel restrictions," he said.

"Retail businesses are finding it a little tough, but they already were finding it a little tough before Covid. I think this is a global issue, not so much a local issue.'

Mr Smith said if Queensland don't have any more restrictions put in place and things continue to go to plan, the Gladstone region has quite a positive outlook for next ve

## **Doctor path**

An Australian-first university and hospital partnership will see local doctors trained in their own backyard for the first time.

Under the new Regional Medical Pathway, formalised last week between CQUniversity, The University of Queensland and the Central Queensland and Wide Bay Hospital and Health Services, up to 40 doctors will receive training in regional Queensland each year.

The Central Queensland and Wide Bay regions will receive their first student intake in 2022.

Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher said the partnership was a great opportunity to retain regionally based students where shortages already exist and offer them a medical future within their own region.

"The partnership through Regional Medical Pathways will allow for our school leavers to train within their own communities without having to go further afield to train in large cities like Brisbane and Melbourne," he said.

"This full medical program model will provide a future workforce to our hospitals and general practice surgeries helping address the retention issues in regional areas by focusing on locals to provide a stable and self-motivated workforce supporting their own communities."

Central Queensland Hospital and Health Service chief executive Steve Williamson said the partnership meant regional communities could be confident future health workforces would be better equipped to deal with community growth and changing healthcare needs.

"The Central Queensland and Wide Bay regions are growing areas and the communities have an expectation that healthcare delivery will meet future demand," Mr Williamson said.

"The Regional Medical Pathway has been specifically designed to secure long-term, locally trained workforces for the regions."

The Hospital and Health Services will provide student placements, internship opportunities and postgraduate training places at major hospitals in Gladstone, Rockhampton and Emerald (CQHHS) and Bundaberg, Hervey Bay and Maryborough (WBHHS) as well as rural hospitals and multipurpose health services.

Students will complete a three-year Bachelor of Medical Science (Pathway to Medicine) course with CQUniversity, before moving into UQ's four-year MD program - both offered in the local area.

CQUniversity Vice-Chancellor Nick Klomp said the formalisation of the partnership was a significant milestone for regional healthcare delivery.

"CQUniversity exists to meet the education, training, and research needs of the communities we serve," he said.

UQ Vice-Chancellor and President Professor Deborah Terry said the pathway would help address the difficulties in attracting and retaining doctors in regional, remote and rural areas.

"Medical workforce shortages exist in regional areas across Australia and around the globe and I am confident that together we can achieve a positive, sustained improvement in health outcomes in Central Queensland and Wide Bay," Professor Terry said.

"The regional delivery of the UQ MD program will build on our current Rural Clinical School footprint in Rockhampton, Bundaberg and Hervey Bay, as well as smaller rural hospitals and general practices in the regions."

The first intake of students to the CQUniversity Bachelor of Medical Science (Pathway to Medicine) course will commence in Term 1, 2022, with students progressing to the UQ MD program from 2025.

Applications for entry into the CQUniversity Bachelor of Medical Science (Pathway to Medicine) course will open in 2021.

### Rookwood Weir welcomed

Regional leaders have welcomed progress on the \$352.2 million Rookwood Weir project following the signing of a government co-funding agreement last week.

The federal government has agreed to invest \$176.1 million towards building the weir which will provide about 200 jobs during construction, increase water security and expand irrigated agricultural production in the Lower Fitzroy River region.

Major construction works are expected to start in 2021 on the weir, with early works on track to start this month.

Gladstone Mayor Matt Burnett said while the harbour city had a safe and reliable water supply at Lake Awoonga, the weir would provide water security for all of Central Oueensland.

"Water is what builds communities. Having that huge water security right nearby is good for us, but it's also good for our neighbours it's good for the Central Highlands, it's good for Rockhampton, Livingstone and even Woorabinda. All of CQ will see the benefits from this," he said.

"Also, we've obviously we've got major industry here that uses a lot of water and if we

don't get a wet season and the dam levels go down that puts a huge impact on the production of aluminium and aluminium from Gladstone."

Mr Burnett said the Gladstone Regional Council had always supported the Rookwood Weir provided ratepayers didn't shoulder all the costs.

"It needs to be funded by the state and federal governments, which it now has been, and the ongoing costs need to be funded by the users of the facility," he said.

He also called for the construction of the Gladstone-Fitzroy Pipeline as part of the project.

"The Rookwood Weir project for us standing alone doesn't provide water security until you connect the Gladstone-Fitzroy Pipeline, which has been designed and I think part of the project for me needs to be building that pipeline," he said.

The proposed 115 kilometre pipeline would enable the transfer of 30,000 megalitres of water per annum from the lower Fitzroy River to Cladstone

Mr Burnett said it the project would directly benefit employment in the harbour city, with Gladstone business McCosker Contracting awarded one of the major contracts to deliver the weir.

"We have a strong construction workforce in Gladstone, we built three LNG plants, two alumina refineries, smelters and cement plants, so building a Rookwood Weir won't be hard," he said.

"Even more exciting for Central Queensland is the fact that Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher has just been named the Minister for Water."

Livingstone Shire Mayor Andy Ireland said when it came to the weir CQ councils needed to think regionally rather than focusing on their 'own patch' entirely.

"Rookwood Weir is something we should all be supporting due to the water security it brings to the region as a whole," he said.

Deputy Mayor Adam Belot said additional water storage capacity was critical to the prosperity of our entire region, especially with an increasing population and potentially dryer conditions.

Capricorn Enterprise regional economic development manager Neil Lethlean said he was looking forward to the Central Queensland region furthering its agricultural industry position as a major 'food bowl'.

"The construction of Rookwood Weir will provide significant benefits for the area through the construction and operational phases via employment and when operational by providing water security to Gladstone," he said.

"I'd encourage our local businesses to sign up at the project's ICN supplier portal to guarantee your capability details are considered for this landmark project."

# Hooper our mayor: Doblo

Rockhampton business owner and former mayoral candidate Dominic Doblo says if he was in Chris Hooper's position he'd be at Rockhampton City Hall tomorrow to take up the top job.

Rockhampton Mayor Margaret Strelow resigned on Monday 9 October after a tribunal found she had engaged in misconduct by failing to update her register of interests to include hospitality received from mining company Adani, now Bravus. She has refuted the finding.

Under new local government rules, the mayoralty would have passed to local identity Chris Hooper, the only other candidate from the March election.

But the next day, Local Government Minister Stirling Hinchliffe said the state government would introduce and pass a bill allowing mayoral or councillor positions to be filled through a by-election.

"Under the present law, which the state government changed because they didn't like Margaret Strelow, Chris 'Pineapple' Hooper is

entitled to be mayor," Mr Doblo said.

"And they can't keep changing the law because they don't like someone."

Mr Doblo said the majority of people who come into his fruit shop agreed with him that the law shouldn't be changed.

"People are a bit worried about Chris's appearance but he's an intelligent bloke and he wouldn't run the council by himself, the rest of the council is there to support him, as well as the CEO."

Mr Doblo said if Chris Hooper was given the job as mayor, he wanted a job on the council's promotions committee to help promote the Rockhampton region across Australia.

"We would get enormous publicity with Pineapple Hooper as our mayor. We've got to turn this situation into a positive and promote Rocky."

Member for Capricornia Michelle Landry agreed that if the law said Chris Hooper was to be the next mayor of Rockhampton Regional Council, then he was entitled to be mayor.

"The Queensland government can't just choose to ignore a law or choose to not enforce a law if they don't agree with it, even if they were

the ones to change it in the first place," she said.

"The policy has always been short-sighted. It was passed by the Queensland government to prevent people like Margaret Strelow from challenging sitting state Labor members. It is up to the local state government members to explain why they supported it in the first place."

Member for Rockhampton Barry O'Rourke said once the new state parliament was sworn in, the government would introduce and pass a bill to retrospectively amend the Local Government Act.

"This is not a matter of changing a law because someone is not liked," he said.

"Margaret Strelow chose to resign as Mayor of Rockhampton Regional Council and she has placed the community in limbo because of her selfishness.

"This is about communities making a choice so that they can have a proper vote to determine the best candidate to fill the role."

Ms Strelow has asked for privacy following her decision to resign.

### **GKI commitment stands**

Altum Property Group's commitment to Great Keppel Island's revitalisation project has not wavered, despite the investor missing the lease purchase deadline on 31 October.

Altum Property Group Director Rob Mc-Cready said they were hoping to finalise the sale with Tower Holdings Pty Ltd prior to the state election, but unfortunately that didn't happen.

"The original sale agreement between Tower and Altum was signed on 17 September 2019 and varied twice earlier this year," Mr McReady said.

"We had no idea then, that the contract would still be dragging out until after the 2020 election."

Mr McCready said the delays in transfer of the lease have been entirely due to the state government.

"On 27 February Altum signed a revised agreement with Tower which gave Altum an additional due diligence period until 30 April, a settlement date of 30 August and the option of extending for a further two months if the state government had not yet finalised the lease conditions.

"On 30 April, we concluded our due diligence, effectively making the sale agreement unconditional. This was following advice from the State Government that there would be significant additional funding coming for Common User Infrastructure," he said.

"On 30 August, the lease conditions and support for public infrastructure were still not finalised, and the department encouraged us to extend the contract settlement date to give them more time, following a crisis meeting with Tourism Minister Kate Jones. "We reluctantly exercised the option to extend for a further two months, taking us to 30 October, one day prior to the election."Mr McCready said that despite their pleas, 14 months of negotiations, hundreds of thousands of dollars invested and ample community goodwill to start the redevelopment project, no agreement to transfer the leases had been signed.

"Regrettably, in the last six months we have faced constant broken promises about when documentation will be finalised and what support GKI will receive from the state government to build the massive amounts of public infrastructure up-front.

"No small or medium sized business could spend nearly two years sitting around and talking about processes like we have," he said.

Going into the election, the Labor government announced \$30 million for a list of works for the island including a breakwall that would facilitate an all weather, equitable access for everyone and reduce erosion on Putney Beach.

"The state government's announcement required a restructure of the funding we had been negotiating to commence the project," Mr McCready said.

"We are currently finalising the alternative funding strategy and hope to table this with the current member and ministers as soon as they are announced.

"We are confident the state government will transfer the leases once the new ministers are in place."



It's been a busy year for Mumma's Fish & Chips owners Michele and Tony Waine, but they wouldn't have it any other way.

Previously known as Gladstone Road Seafood, the business at 62 Gladstone Rd, Rockhampton, has had a makeover, complete with a new paint job, new fryers, new fresh produce and a new lawn seating area.

"We rebranded it as Mumma's when we bought the business because that's what they call me at home. I wanted to call it Tony's but he didn't like that," Michele said.

"We often get asked who Mumma is and I put my hand up, they probably expect someone a bit older."

Before taking on the business 14 months ago, Tony was in concreting for 20 years and Michele was in retail, although they both had a hospitality background from their younger days.

"At the end of the day it's all the same thing, dealing with customers and keeping people happy," Michele said.

"We were lucky, we started out gradually, people came in slowly and we're getting better at cooking for the masses."

The Waines believe in using only the freshest produce, sourcing seafood from the Brisbane to Mackay area.

"We don't have the standard old red emperor that's imported from overseas or the frozen fillets that have been in the freezer for the past four or six years," Michele said.

"We always have a mackerel as our background fish, most Rockhampton people love the mackerel, but we try to mix it up with the more premium fish like coral trout, snapper and reef fish."

Michele said while it took a lot of effort, sourcing Queensland fish was worth it.

"We're just about to get a local red emperor fish which is really good because most of Rockhampton's red emperor comes from China," she said.

"We've also secured prawns for Christmas, which was a challenge because prawn trawlers tend to move toward scalloping this time of year.

"We'll be taking orders for prawns from mid-December at our regular price, not an inflated price."

The Waines believe in giving back to the

community, whether it's through fundraising or donating meals to people on the Covid frontline.

"Because we've been locals for more than

20 years, the money's not going anywhere else," Michele said.

"We're still a little shop but after 14 months people are starting to recognise who we are."

"In 'normal' years, this includes overseas trips to Vietnam or New Zealand along with other activities including sailing in the Whitsundays, hiking at Carnarvon Gorge or a canoe expedition on the Noosa River," he said.

"Each trip involves a service component back to that area's local community wherever possible. Unfortunately students were unable to complete this valued programme earlier in the year, so last week the students were building on the usual themes of the programme being Adventure, Challenge, Service, with the addition for Preparation for Year 11, but experiencing them in our own Central Queensland backyard."

Capricornia Catchments project officer Rachel said the Ritamada project involved prepping the site by removing invasive weeds, spreading a thick layer of mulch to reduce weed regrowth and planting native flora.

"It was hard work, but working as a team makes it easier, we also had a lot of support from Livingstone Shire Council," she said.

"Ritamada is situated on the coastal zone, these zones provide a lot of important ecosystem services such as storm protection, habitat/nesting for native and migratory animals, erosion and sediments control.

"It is important that we look after these environments while getting young people to participate in community service projects like this so they can see that taking care of the planet is essential to ensure its longevity."

Dusty's been around music all his life - his dad and aunty are singers and his mum's a


"I've lived in Broken Hill and there was no coverage out in the Simpson Desert for me to play around on phones so after work I'd just chill out and write music and play my guitar,"

Member for Keppel Brittany Lauga said more than 230 people have died on Queensland roads this year, which is 40 more than the same time last year.

In 2019 there were a total of 219 road deaths and 6944 victims hospitalised.

In Keppel during that period there were two deaths and 80 hospitalised casualties, and in Rockhampton there were three deaths and 122 hospitalisations. In Gladstone four people died locally.

"Road safety is everyone's responsibility and if we each lead the way, together we can make a difference."

National Road Safety Week was founded by Peter Frazer, president of the Safer Australian Roads and Highways Group (SARAH) Group, after his 23-year-old daughter Sarah was killed in a crash in 2012.

"Now in its eighth year, we are proud National Road Safety Week continues to grow across the country," Mr Frazer said.

"It is an important reminder every life is precious and everyone has the right to get home safe to their loved ones, every day, no exceptions."

The start of National Road Safety Week also coincides with the World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims on Sunday, 15

## Councillors must step up

Refusing to accept a ruling that a gift of travel is pecuniary interest is significant.

Pecuniary interest registers were a Fitzgerald Inquiry recommendation and have been religiously adhered to by all sides of politics in the Queensland Parliament.

Notable exceptions were Labor's disgraced former minister Nutttall and the LNP's Driscoll.

Both refused to accept the law applied to them, claimed innocence, in Nuttall's case expressed outrage, and were found guilty and went to jail.

So when our former mayor after having been found guilty of refusing to acknowledge a pecuniary interest resigned thereby anointing the Pineapple to replace her and claiming "principle" I had to say I've heard all this before. Mostly from Nuttall.

The reality is every other mayor who accepted the gift put it down in their pecuniary interest register.

It was no big deal, Mr Adani had every right to offer a free trip to the mayors, they were not compelled to accept it but they did and when advised it was a gift by the authorities they complied. But not Ms Strelow. She was right, every other mayor wrong and the authorities to blame.

More worryingly the Federal MP Ms Landry said the requirement was "draconian". What? No wonder the feds have dragged their feet in setting up a watchdog if that's the attitude prevailing in the LNP.

Even more concerning was the Deputy Mayor Mr Fisher's comment on the ABC that the state government should review this re-

So it's OK for the state politicians to be bound by laws requiring publication of gifts received but not local government ones.

His statement that city councillors are all there for the community rings hollow given recent jailing and other charges/scandals surrounding some local councils.

I'm not defending the idiotic law that gives the man in the thongs the keys to the city hall.

which meant that councillors and mayors had to resign to contest state seats.

### It's time to legalise e-cigs to reduce smoking rates

Smoking continues to be the drug that kills more Australians than any other.

The best estimates indicate that smoking kills around 20,000 Australians annually compared to 6000 from alcohol and 2500 from illicit drugs.

Australia probably leads the world in reducing smoking rates. We were one of the first countries to place restrictions on advertising and include prominent warnings on packaging. We are at risk of losing that mantle, unfortunately, because of a reluctance to legalise

E-cigarettes deliver nicotine through an electronic mechanism that turns liquid nicotine into a gas or 'vape'. It allows a smoker to mimic the interaction they have with a smoke and, compared to nicotine gum or patches, it delivers the nicotine 'hit' in a similar way to a cigarette.

The best health outcome would be for people to neither vape nor smoke. Nicotine is highly addictive and, like all drugs, can have bad impacts on your health. But e-cigarettes

do not contain the cancer causing carcinogens that smokes do. Lives would be saved and lives would be improved if more people quit smoking and switched to e-cigarettes.

A young mum gave evidence to a senate committee this week about her switch to vaping and how it has improved her relationship with her two young children. She no longer smells of tobacco around the kids and doesn't have to

pop outside all the time just to have a smoke.

The good news is that more Australians are mother's concentrated nicotine. giving up smokes for the alternative of e-cigarettes. Over the last three years 130,000 more that imposes proper standards on the pack-Australians are using e-cigarettes, according to the largest national survey on drug use. And, over the last three years, 127,000 Australians have given up smoking.

The bad news is that vaping remains illegal in Australia. You can sell a vaping device and there is a limited ability to import liquid nicotine with a prescription. But it is illegal to sell liquid nicotine and, in most Australian states, it is illegal to possess liquid nicotine.

In reality these laws are not enforced and many do import liquid nicotine through online shops even without a prescription. Australia is the only developed country to ban all vaping products. We risk losing the mantle of a leader in tobacco reduction efforts.

Our 'black market' creates other health risks. Many vapers import liquid nicotine in concentrated form, often in containers without childproof caps. Tragically a three-year old girl died in Victoria a few years ago after she ingested her

We should instead have a regulated market aging of products and restricts their sale and marketing just as we do for tobacco products.

A recent major review of all of the scientific evidence from around the world concluded that "e-cigarettes probably do help people to stop smoking for at least six months".

Some are concerned that if we legalise e-cigarettes, these products could create a 'gateway' for young people to start smoking. But a recent CSIRO study concluded that "the evidence for (the gateway effect) being an important route to smoking initiation in Australia does not appear strong".

We should focus on practical solutions that can improve people's lives. There is so much evidence from thousands of Australians that vaping has helped them get off the smokes and made their lives better. It is time for Australia to catch up to the rest of the world and legalise e-cigarettes.

#### **Curious finding by tribunal**

I could not let the events of the past week or so, pass without comment regarding the resignation of Mayor Margaret Strelow.

Coincidentally, Ms Strelow, at our invitation, visited our local club on Saturday, 7 November, in her capacity as mayor to present prizes at our annual Mayoral Trophy Day.

I, as chairman, sat at a table with Ms Strelow and her husband where we offered coffee or tea and a snack of some savoury and sweet treats, which our members routinely enjoy at these events. Ms Strelow was telling me about the reporting requirements in public office when public officials receive gifts or spend public funds.

In the years since Ms Strelow has been mayor of the Rockhampton Regional Council, I have had some dealings with her and her councils. I have always found her to be approachable, helpful, honest and forthright and as far as I can tell, her approach to public office seems above reproach. In past elections, the opposition usually comes from political opponents rather than from a genuine concern that Mayor Strelow was doing a poor job. I believe, Rockhampton has been fortunate to have Ms Strelow as our mayor.

This brings me to the law which was passed in recent times about replacing a retiring mayor with the second place getter in a recent election, which I guess is a bit like what happens when a senator resigns and they are traditionally replaced by the second place getter on their side of the political spectrum.

As is frequently the case, when laws are passed, it seems the current situation was not envisaged, but I do recall someone raising the possibility of Mr Hooper assuming the role of mayor, if something untoward should occur to our chosen mayor. Mr Hooper may be a most responsible, popular and well meaning person, but he did not enjoy overwhelming support during the elections and I would say his experience in public office is limited, and I would not vote for him as mayor by choice. Notwithstanding his principled view on renewables as opposed to fossil fuels, the majority of voters of the Rockhampton Regional Council area decided that he did not have the broad experience and ability to lead an important regional area.

Now, I am no expert in these matters but it seems rather a curious finding by the tribunal if, as has been opined, the trip to India was sanctioned by the state government and I can understand why Ms Strelow refused to apologise for something she does not believe she has done wrong.

What I do know is that I have spoken to many Rockhampton residents in the last few days and everyone is surprised, some even shocked, that our mayor has resigned, albeit, on a matter of principle and a by-election is now to be held, at great cost. Once again the law is to be changed and back-dated to allow for this to occur. I have to ask, does no one examine proposed legislation for possible flaws and outcomes before voting it into law?

No doubt the recent parade of local government officials being stood down or resigning because of dubious behaviour seems to have led to the capture of a person of integrity, and the people represented by that person generally do not like it.

The nankeen kestrel doesn't actually build a nest preferring to use hollows in trees like the one pictured, dug out areas in the side of a cliff, ledges of buildings or even abandoned nests of other birds.

While walking across an open piece of ground, looking for birds one day, I was fortunate enough to see a nankeen kestrel enter a hollow in the side of a high dead tree.

I guessed it was nesting when it didn't come out again immediately.

There was no way to get high enough for good photography without getting scaffolding and erecting it nearby.

I contacted a photography friend of mine who was only too pleased to join me, so we built our structure from the ground upwards.

At the top, we made a platform to sit on and enclosed this with bags and hessian as well as place a roof over our heads.

The following weekend we started.

Climbing to the top of the scaffold wasn't easy.

One of us had to climb up first, lower a rope to which one lot of photo gear could be tied and pulled up.

## Can I change the locks?



When going through a separation, it's very common for one party to reside in the matrimonial home and for the other party to leave.

If you remain in the property, it's reasonable that you would like to maintain your privacy and stop your ex-partner from accessing the property. Whether you can stop them is a different question.

The answer as to whether you can change the locks on the property you are living in can depend on who legally owns the property.

#### If the property is rented

You would need to obtain your landlord's permission before doing anything to the property.

Landlords, however, cannot unreasonably withhold their consent. You may be obligated to provide a spare key to the landlord or any other tenants if you change the locks.

#### The property is owned by one party

If you own the property you have the right to change the locks. If the property is owned by your ex-partner you would need to seek their consent before changing the locks or at least ask them to return their key.

The property is owned by both parties jointly Both owners have the right to change the locks. However, if you change the locks, your ex-partner is entitled to regain access to the property without your consent.

#### Can the court step in?

The courts have the power to decide on who is to live in the property. They will look at the reason as to why you want to change the locks



Following divorce it is reasonable that you would like to maintain your privacy and stop your ex-partner from accessing the property.

before making an order for sole occupancy. It will be important to consider whether the other party has anywhere else to live or whether they've have already moved out. Arrangements around the collection of their property from the residence will need to be addressed.

If there are safety concerns for any occu-

pant or concerns as to damage to property a court will take this seriously.

A Magistrates Court has the power to assign sole occupancy to one party during domestic violence proceedings through an ouster order.

The Family Courts also can make decisions

about who occupies the property - either in the short term or permanently.

If a court has given an order to this effect, you can change the locks regardless of whether you own the property or not. If you are renting you still need to discuss this with your land-



# Real estate is booming

The real estate marketing is booming on the Capricorn Coast, so much so that agents cannot keep up with demand.

Professionals Principal Kev Doolan said it was almost as if people have started to panic buy.

"We've had numerous people from southern states buying houses, land, units and rural properties," he said.

"Unfortunately, however, there is an acute shortage of stock due to the interest rates being so low

"We're having trouble getting listings as people are holding onto their investment properties.

"They're not selling because they have nowhere to reinvest their money to get an earn-

Mr Doolan said the rental market vacancy rate was also zero.

"If we put a property online, we'd receive at least 20 applications overnight.

"People are continually calling and emailing asking about rentals."

Rental prices have also gone up significantly in the last 12 months.

"In Zilzie Bay, for example, rents have gone from \$260 to \$380 per week."

Mr Doolan said people from other areas are coming here because property prices have been far too low and they're situated on the coast.

"The market is very strong and there is an acute abundance of buyers."

Mr Doolan believes house prices will stabilise as there are quite a number of projects happening in the area.

"We've got Rockhampton Ring Road, Stanage Bay Road Upgrade and Great Keppel Island Redevelopment, to name a few.

"There is an abundance of work here."

Pinnacle Wealth Solutions CEO Tony Beardmore said he'd been coming up to Central Queensland for work for the past 12 years.

"We started getting more and more of our business up here, rather than on the Gold Coast, and we started to seriously consider purchasing," he said.

"We started to think about where we would go if we were to move up here and one of the areas that really stuck out was the Capricorn Coast.

"We looked at projected growth in the area, we looked at the potential opportunities available and we looked at housing prices and how they're undervalued.

"The area is a hidden gem.


"Obviously the house prices have moved up since January/February when we first made our move, but they are still very under priced in comparison to elsewhere.

"At the Gold Coast, it used to take me 15, 20, 30 minutes to get out of my apartment block just to get down the road.

"Here, there are no traffic lights, you can be in town in a few minutes, the shopping centres are close by, there are three golf courses I can choose from and there are a number of beaches just up the road.

"We have fallen in love with the place," he said.

## Remembrance Day at the

On Remembrance Day, Gracemere and District RSL Sub Branch Inc. culminated two years of a project with a ceremony involving the planting of a Gallipoli Pine Tree to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I.

All the local schools were involved, and MP Barry O'Rourke and Cr Ellen Smith were there to help the children and several other people "turn the soil".

In 2019, a plaque was made with the idea that it would eventually be mounted at the base of the tree, so the sub branch invited Mr O'Rourke back on Remembrance Day 2019 for the unveiling of the plaque - unmounted.

This year, the sub branch held a Tree Naming Competition, the winner of which was to be named on ANZAC Day, but due to Covid-19 regulations the presentation was postponed to Remembrance Day.

Jack Sheridan from Westwood State School was the overall winner with the name "Galakubra". The best entries from the other four schools were Yelayna Schmid from Stanwell State School, Isabella Armstrong from Gracemere State School, Katie Murray from Waraburra State School, and Oliver Stewart from St Paul's Primary School.

All the children were presented with a winner's certificate plus a medalet, which is a replica of one which was produced for distribution in 1919 when the peace treaty was signed.

The original medalet was in recognition for the role all children played in helping the war effort by collecting recyclable material, and knitting socks for the men at the front. Distribution of this medalet was tasked to those responsible for organising peace celebrations in their state, however these celebrations were hampered by the Spanish Flu epidemic, as well as a national seaman's strike causing insufficient coal which in turn created power shortages.

School children up to the age of 14 years old (or 16 years old if war veterans' children) were presented with their medalets by their headmaster and pre-schoolers were presented by the mayor.

As well as Jack being presented with his certificate and medalet, his name and the tree's name are displayed on a small plaque on a plinth. The beautiful sandstone plinth was most generously donated by Reece Gough of Capricorn Sandstone Quarries, Stanwell for which the sub-branch are most appreciative. They are also grateful to Tom Wyatt for his donation of the tree which is now just visible above the plinth. If you visit the site, you will see the plaque inset into the top of the plinth relating to the history of the tree.

The Rocky Photo Club's champion of champion photos have been selected with three winners in the Opens, Masters and B Grade categories.

It's been a massive work in progress with this year being a challenging year for many clubs and organisations throughout the region, but the club has maintained focus to produce some of the best work in recent memory.

The Rocky Photo Club's three winners were Gordon Worley (Opens) with Dune, Emma Baynton (B Grade) with Pier into the Distance, and Glenda Worley (Masters) with Painted Hills.

"In the end, it usually comes down to slight technical differences which can decide which is a champion photo compared to that one.

"The wow factor is number one but the technical factors come in at the end."

Also announced were the most consistent photographers throughout the year, Open - Scott Reynolds, B Grade - Emma Baynton, and Masters - Greg Tungate all winning their categories.

"We have eight monthly competitions and everyone gets a score for an individual month," said Mr Boggs.

"We used to add it up over the eight months and the person with the most points would be the winner.

"But the problem with that was that if someone missed a month due to travelling or became sick - all of a sudden seven scores are compared to eight scores and eight always won.


"So we changed it last year that you have to put photos in for at least five months and if you put it in for eight, we took the best scores.



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# Tank the first of its kind

Recently I was the invited to Nu-Tank, in the Parkhurst Industrial Estate, on the outskirts of North Rockhampton, to watch the installation of their new A' shaped overhead crane, with a rise in the middle - the first of its kind in Australia

At 30 metres in length, it is fitted with 2x5 tonne hoists and custom cooling fans.

Weighing 13 tonnes, it was a two crane job moving the overhead crane off the semitrailer and into the shed, behind Nu-Tank's

The overhead crane had to be millimetre specially engineered to move over Nu-Tanks rather unique tank making machine. Unique in that I learnt that there are only three of them in Australia and Nu-Tank was the first in Queensland to install one.

Their new tank making machine complements an existing but smaller machine, making Nu-Tank one of, if not the only, poly tank manufacturer in Australia to have both machines at the one site.

The larger machine enables Nu-Tank to 'cook' their tanks, including their big 10,200 gallon water and molasses tanks, in a computer controlled oven.

Why the big deal about cooking in an oven? To my surprise I found out most other tank manufacturers make their largest tanks over an open flame pit, a bit like camp cook-

And you know what happens with camp cooking if you don't evenly distribute the heat - the walls of your damper are either burnt or soft, something you don't want when holding 10,200 gallons (nearly 46,000 litres) of that most precious liquid asset - water.

It was not just the big 10 twos, as they are called in the trade, that can be made in the new oven, but cartage tanks, including Australia's biggest single moulded cartage tank, able to hold a massive 18,000 litres.

"This is a market we want to get a bigger slice of," said Nu-Tank managing director Stephen Trail.

Cartage tanks are used by many industries including rural, mining and civil construction. Local Councils being a major cartage

"Our challenge is to get the decisionmakers in these industries, including at the Rockhampton Regional Council, to start buying the local manufactured cartage tanks not southern ones," Steve said.

"We have made the significant investment to be able to supply a superior product that can hold 400 litres all the way up to 18,000 litres and they are all produced, along with our tanks, feeders and troughs, here at our Parkhurst factory.

"We deliver tanks throughout Queensland but, with the investment we have made in our latest tank making machine and overhead crane, we have the capacity to produce more tanks and create more jobs.'

To think Rockhampton has one of the biggest most modern tank manufacturing plants

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# Sandstone business is

Covid-19 may have hit many businesses hard, but Capricorn Sandstone Quarries is nearing the end of one of its most successful years.

The Stanwell company's product goes to state capitals like Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne and as far afield as Western Australia.

But general manager Reece Gough said the local market was where it's at.

"The last six months have been record months for Capricorn Sandstone Quarries, with all the subdivisions going ahead which require sandstone for retaining walls and quarry material," he said.

"I think the HomeBuilder grants have spurred land development which has been good for us as we supply the land developers."

Covid has also provided a boost to the interstate market.

"In the wealthier suburbs in Sydney they've been unable to travel so they're now spending that money on their homes, on extensions and new builds."

Capricorn Sandstone's Power Station Road quarry has been in use since the 1880s. The business itself has been there for 26 years and they're not looking at going anywhere anytime soon.

"The reserve we're on is 200 acres, and we've also got the mountain next door under a new mining lease so we'll be here for many more decades to come," Mr Gough said.

Capricorn Sandstone Quarries supplies a wide range of clients including schools, charities, landscapers, construction and excavation, streetscapes, landscaping companies, government projects and parklands.

"Everything here is custom made, from a 10mm pebble all the way up to a 10-tonne block. We have ranges from landscape quality all the way up to AAA restoration grade," Mr Gough said.

Queensland Parliament House restoration, the Australian-American memorial at Canberra, as well as Kirribilli House House and Admiralty House in New South Wales.

"My father had quarries down south and we first came up here to CQ to look at stone to supply the NSW Government to match Sydney sandstone," Mr Gough said.

"The real good quality local stone, the likes

that built the Customs House, is similar to old Sydney sandstone.

"You could say there are little bits of Rockhampton all over Sydney now."

Mr Gough said Capricorn Sandstone Quarries believed in investing in modern equipment, having a good resource and training the right people.

"The demand for quality Australian prod-

ucts and manufacturing is on the way back," he said.

"In the past it's been hard to compete with China but especially now, after Covid, people want to know they're getting a product that's been ethically sourced and environmentally responsible - that there's a face behind the stone they're getting.

"There's a real push for a quality local product."


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# Defence contracts ready

A new military training area is being constructed at Greenvale in North Queensland and Central Queensland businesses can get in on the ground floor.

CPB Contractors has been appointed to deliver the first phase of works, with hundreds of jobs expected to flow.

On successful completion of the development phase of the \$23.5 million contract, CPB Contractors will deliver \$800 million in facilities under the Australia-Singapore Military Training Initiative (ASMTI).

The project's construction workforce is expected to peak at 350 workers, as part of the Greenvale Training Area's major works.

Advance Rockhampton executive manager Greg Bowden said it was great to see an Australian company awarded such a significant defence contract.

"ASMTI is an important initiative from the Australian Defence Force and Singapore Armed Forces to further develop training grounds within regional Queensland."

He said Rockhampton businesses had been working closely with Laing O'Rourke to deliver ASMTI's \$880m Shoalwater Bay project, with 77 per cent of the contracts in the delivery stage of the project coming from the local region.

Mr Bowden encouraged CQ businesses to stay up-to-date with the progress of the ASMTI Greenvale project and register their interest on the tender portal - austender.gov.au

"Our local businesses have earned the experience by contributing to the construction at Shoalwater Bay and their learnings will be advantageous when tendering for work on the Greenvale project."

He encouraged local businesses to make contact with his team to ensure the region remained at the forefront in the delivery of significant projects such as ASMTI.

"My team at Advance Rockhampton work closely with representatives from the Australian Defence Force and Singapore Armed Forces, Laing O'Rourke and CPB Contractors," he said.

"Rockhampton is fortunate to have a diverse, quality array of businesses throughout the construction, manufacturing and engineering sectors and I personally would like to see our businesses continue to grow their own reputations plus Rockhampton's."

Defence Minister Linda Reynolds said the contract marked a significant milestone for the ASMTI.

"These advanced training areas being delivered under the ASMTI will benefit the ADF and the SAF, while enhancing our bilateral relationship and providing significant local economic opportunities for North Queensland," Senator Reynolds said.

"When this initiative reaches maturity, up to 14,000 SAF personnel will conduct training in Central and North Queensland for up to 18 weeks a year for 25 years, which will provide enduring economic benefits to the region.

"This initiative will be key to bolstering growth and supporting local jobs in North

Queensland as the economy continues to recover from the Covid-19 pandemic."

The ASMTI will see a total of about \$2.25 billion in work roll out in North Queensland and at the Shoalwater Bay Training Area.

Construction of the major project works is due to commence in mid-2022.

Additional early works packages to be delivered between 2020 and 2022 will include fencing and signage, contamination remediation, and construction of firebreaks. These packages will range in value from \$50,000 to \$4 million.





# Tips to grow hydrangeas

With their beautiful showy flower heads and tropical appearance, it has always been thought that hydrangeas really only prefer cooler climates. However, they can be quite successfully grown in Central Queensland with just a little extra care.

Many people around Central Queensland still associate hydrangeas with hospitals, as they have been used as landscape plants around many of our country hospitals and nursing homes.

I can still remember the beautiful display of hydrangeas growing at the old Eventide nursing home in Rockhampton.

Hydrangeas like a cool, moist situation, preferably on the southern side of the house out of the wind, or where they do not get too much direct sun, as hydrangeas can tend to get sunburnt when in full sun as indicated by a browning of the flowers and or foliage.

Prepare the soil with plenty of well-rotted animal manure or compost, which will break down into humus and keep the area around the roots moist and open.

The soil is of particular significance to hydrangeas because its acidity determines the colour of the flowers. If your soil is acidic, that is that it has a pH of around 4.5 to 5.0, the flowers will be light blue to electric or even peacock

However, most soils in our area are much less acidic and this is the same for just about all garden soil mixes. In this soil type your hydrangea will flower pink. If you want to change the colour of your plants, just the right amount of lime (one tablespoon per plant) will make the plants produce pink flowers, but just a dash more is likely to kill the plant.

To obtain beautiful deep blue flower heads, add aluminium sulphate. In fact, hydrangeas are one of very few plants that actually accumulate aluminium. This is released from the acidic soils and through a internal process in the plant forms to give the plant the blue flower colour. You must change the soil pH before flower buds form if you want to change their colour so treat the soil after August.

An important note is that all white cultivars remain white regardless of the soil pH.

It is important when planning a hydrangea garden that it is not positioned near any fresh concrete as merely the seepage of lime from the concrete can be hazardous to the plant.

A way of getting around this is lining the garden area with a root-guard material.

This is similar to the products that are used to prevent invasive-root trees from spreading under foundations, and can be readily sourced from most building supply firms. By using this to surround your garden, it will effectively create a large planter-tub environment. As hy-

drangeas prefer solitude and react badly to competition from other shrubs, another benefit from the root-guard is also guaranteed.

Hydrangeas don't like to dry out too much and will wilt when they need watering. A bucket of water a week should be enough to keep them going in warm weather.

Give hydrangeas growing in the ground a deep soaking once or twice a week. Plants in pots need daily watering and it's a good idea to have a saucer containing water under the pot.

Feed them in June with complete fertiliser. They have fibrous roots close to the soil surface so mulch is recommended.

It should always be noted that, while you may select a beautiful blue or pink hydrangea in a nursery, when it flowers in your garden, it is possible to be a completely shade or even

Overall, hydrangeas are really tough and will survive almost anywhere, even in a windy coastal spot. Despite the hard work required to prepare the ideal hydrangea garden, the beauty of this plant makes the effort worthwhile.

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# CQ region feels the heat

Rockhampton soared to 36.6C and temperatures climbed to 40C west of Gogango on Sunday.

It was the hottest day in eight months. Temperatures have been six degrees above average with 35.5C on Saturday, 36.6C on Sunday, 34.3C Monday and 35.5C on Tuesday.

The sudden heat surge slowed many people down. Outside workers were affected. What about the poor roofers?

After travelling the Emu Park Road to the beach, the car thermometer went from 37C in Rocky, 36C at the JBS turn-off, 35C at Nankin, 34C at Tungamull, 32C at the Cawarral turn-off, 30C Yeppoon at the turn-off and 29C on the beach. An eight degree temperature fall.

Many people on the beach enjoyed the NNE breeze and vista views of the islands. Then a plunge in the 26C water cooled to 25C about 50 metres out. Relief at last!

The choppy seas, wind gusts 50-55kmh and the fishing closure kept most boaties away.

The heat extended across the Tropic of Capricorn into Western Australia, and north into the Northern Territory recording 42-43C and the odd 45C.


Darwin recorded 10 days of 36C or more for November.

It was all due to an inland 'heat low' affecting most of Australia.

A 'Southerly Buster' hit Sydney late Monday, causing a severe storm in Newcastle with gusts 111kmh Monday evening.

It kept travelling north, hitting Brisbane late Tuesday with storms for most of the Sunshine Coast merging into the Wide Bay and Burnett.

A storm developed on Fraser Island. Let's hope it can assist in putting out the fire that



has burnt for a month. Now the surge (before going to print) is poised to hit Capricornia.

Internationally, the Philippines recorded its eighth Typhoon for the season.

After Super Typhoon 'Goni' early November, Typhoon 'Vamco' hit last weekend. It caused at least 40 deaths and floods for northern parts of the country. This is the 21st such storm for the season. Typhoons are equivalent to a Category three or four cyclone.

November is normally when cyclone season starts in Australia. There is some debate about it. If our northern neighbours have more typhoons than normal then Australia could follow suit?

#### FORECAST

The South East Trades Winds (SETW) return Wednesday with coastal showers.

The winds extend inland bringing welcome relief from the heat. The Apparent Temperature (AT) will be around 28C. There is a chance of a storm around Calliope and Mount Morgan, which could trigger activity along the Capricorn Highway to Emerald and maybe Shoalwater.As the 1025Hpa high on the Synoptic Chart ridges into the Tasman, it should keep the SETW along most of the Queensland coast for the coming four to five days. Winds tend more moderate easterly by Sunday. Then light NE early Monday. Great for the boaties! So be out early and back by

midday as the sea breeze will be rather strong after midday.

Tuesday could be the best morning but the sea breeze will gust over 25 knots (46kmh) ramping seas up to 1.5 to 2 metres inside an hour. If a low develops in the Tasman Tuesday a trough could develop from Brisbane to Longreach.

This will cause temperatures to rise over 35C (put heat stress measures in place) in Rocky ahead of storm activity to the south. Isolated storms from Bundy to Biloela and Springsure may reach Capricornia Wednesday. These storms could be dangerous, with gusts over 90kmh (boaties beware!) and will hopefully give us good rain.



# Out in the deep with Dags

Living in the Gladstone region certainly has its benefits, with having rich off-shore and inshore systems especially when its blowing hard enough to blow a dog off its chain, like recently, and the start of this week was in complete con-

Alas, many of us had to work.

This weekend we have the approaching first quarter of the lunar phase, with the tidal run reducing but unfortunately the wind isn't playing the same favourable game with it still sitting around the 15 to 20 knots from the ESE.

This will certainly prevent many from venturing too far from shore, but on Saturday, at the time of writing, the prediction was that the wind might drop off in the morning until about lunch time.

It's ideal for fishing that incoming tide.

The inshore fisheries of Pancake, Rodds Harbour, Collo, the Boyne River, the harbour and all the creeks and feeders to that system will be fishing well.

As you all know, targeting barra in the salt water system is forbidden and if you are deemed to be doing that the authorities will prosecute.

But at present there are plenty of other species to chase, like mangrove jack, finger mark, king and blue nose salmon, whiting, bream, and - if you are fortunate enough to find some reef to wet a line - the inner harbour spots of Manning Reef, Rat Island and the Oaks are producing some excellent pelagics along with solid grassy emperor and other reef species.

The poor old parrot gets a hammering as there are plenty of them caught right across the region, but they play such a crucial role in the reef's ecology.

Often referred to as cockies or gravel trucks, these fish eat the dead coral or clean up the coral and shoot it out their "you know what", which in-turn makes sand and turning that into our coral sandy beaches.

They are also a very versatile table fish, with brilliant white flesh which can be pan fried, deep fried or cooked in the oven. Not all species

are good for everything.

At the end of the day, however, we need to treat the gravel trucks with a wee bit of respect and only take what we need, looking after the

There are many charter boats operating out of the Gladstone region, from hourly guides through to full day fishing charter to extended charters to the Southern Great Barrier Reef and

He was telling me he struggled to lift it for the photo, and young mate the decky was helping cradle the fish's head so that it wasn't harmed

They had gone to great lengths to look after this monster with irrigating its gills as soon as it was brought aboard, then carefully lifting it for the photo before returning it to the water - forgetting to weigh it. Pfft! If they didn't have the photo it'd be just another fishy tail.

Cracker fish, CT!

With only another four or so weeks until Christmas, it's time you all started to plan what the Christmas Day feast would look like in your house.

Seafood in this region is still the favourite, with whole baked trout lined with seared scallops, shucked oysters, topped with bugs and surrounded by red spot prawns.

Makes your mouth water doesn't it? We'll, it's time to plan that and go hunting and collecting.

Collect your own scallops and oysters, go and pick up a couple of crays, slip out and catch that four to five kilogram coral trout or red emperor, and put your order in for five kilograms of locally-caught prawns or a box of red spot off your favourite seafood supplier.

Have a cracker weekend, and flick me some

With as much as \$180,000 up for grabs, the club's Sunday eight-race TAB program is looking good.

Sunday's meeting is actually the first of our Christmas race meetings.

We have planned a two-course festive luncheon (\$27.50) in the air-conditioned members Lounge from 12.30pm.

The Members, as it is known, is a terrific spot to watch all the action as it overlooks the bird-cage area where the jockeys and trainers meet before the hoops are legged-up for their rides.

It gives everyone a really good chance to assess the horses as they parade pre-race.

She said some limited weekend non-race day dates were still available, as well as race day packages and mid-week non race day dates.

Who would have thought that when racing commenced at its present location at Callaghan Park on 2 June, 1898, it would become far more than just a racecourse?

Horse racing was born in Rockhampton in 1868, and the RJC commissioned a book with some wonderful pictures and stories celebrating 150 years of racing in 2018.

**HOW** game is Master Jamie? The Graeme Green Callaghan Park four-year-old ran the race of his life at Doomben last Saturday with a fighting third in the Keith Noud Handicap (1200 metres).

In a mad helter-skelter affair, Master Jamie had to be gunned out of the barriers and was always in the firing line up close in the classy field

For him to keep on fighting and only be beaten a nose for second by Deep Impact was nothing short of outstanding.

Afterall, race winner Jonker, which won by 4.5 lengths, carved out a new Doomben track record of 1 min:7.38 seconds, which amounts to low-level flying.

Graeme has done a magnificent job with Master Jamie, winning 10 races as well as recording four placings for \$362,475 in stakes.

It seems a formality that any time soon Master Jamie will overtake that memorable grey filly, Paradis Imperial (\$379,975), as Rockhampton's greatest stakes earner for a horse entirely trained from Callaghan Park.

Of course, Rockhampton's greatest stakes winning horse was Our Boy Malachi, originallytrained at Callaghan Park by John O'Sing before transferring to the Hawkes operation in Sydney.

That great horse won a staggering \$946,400. What a horse was Our Boy Malachi!

**HOPE** you had something on the grey Fly For Yulong (IRE), which was a tearaway winner at the Mackay TAB races last Saturday.

I mentioned him as a horse to earn some holiday expenses from in last week's column.

Locally owned by Central Queenslanders Mark and Lydia Withers and his trainer Jared Wehlow, Fly For Yulong is off to Townsville on 28 November for the \$50,000 final of the Coral Coast Shield Cup over 1609 metres.

# Next generation steps up

The newest generation of Tannum Sands lifesavers has officially graduated with flying

The under-14 age group has spent the past two weekends at the Tannum Sands Surf Club, participating in an intensive Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) course run by age manager and volunteer trainer/assessor, Rebecca Devine, but for some it has been up to nine years in the making

Surf Lifesaving Australia requires nippers to achieve their relevant age Surf Education Award each season to be eligible to compete at the Branch and State Championship surf sport carnivals.

Devine explained that six of the 10 nippers in this age group have been with the club since 2012/2013 as under-6 and 7s (referred to as Green Caps), with another three starting in 2014 as under-8s. The latest recruit joined in 2017 in under-11s.

"I have had the pleasure of being their age manager since 2013, but was involved with them as water safety in 2012, so I have witnessed them all grow and mature over the years," Devine said.

"To be able to deliver this final piece of training and assessment for their nipper program, as a group, is an honour."

While the glory of prowess in surf sports is alluring and great fun, the real value of the nipper program is in the Surf Education Award training, which covers a range of topics from sun safety, ecosurf, personal safety, mental health, physical health and wellbeing, first aid, resuscitation, signals, and a full range of surf rescue skills using rescue boards and rescue

"For this reason I think it is the best youth sport to be involved with – no other sport that I am aware of builds you up to achieve nation-

ally-accredited training qualifications at the age of 13 and then progress to a Certificate II in Public Safety (Aquatic Rescue), otherwise referred to as the Bronze Medallion, when they turn 15; there are so many career pathways that can open up from there," Devine added.

This season saw a re-format of the SRC content, with a greater focus on radio operation and mental health awareness as well as the core skills of CPR and defib operation and performing a rescue of a conscious and un-

conscious patient on a rescue board and rescue tube.

The graduates will maintain their skills by undertaking a proficiency assessment each

The proficiency assessment ensures that patrolling members keep their skills and knowledge current to be able to competently perform a rescue without putting themselves or the public at risk.

There are still a number of proficiency as-



recovery techniques as part of their annual skills maintenance assessment.

sessment sessions planned for the next month, so if you are at Tannum Sands Main Beach or Wild Cattle Creek and see what looks like a rescue, don't panic; it's just our local volunteer lifesavers gearing themselves up to make sure they can deliver the highest possible standard of public aquatic safety for the community.

Remember, if the lifesavers can't see you, they can't save you - always swim between the red and yellow flags.
