Industry school

An advanced manufacturing education hub to be built in Gladstone will attract students to the region and inject millions of dollars into the local economy.

Member for Flynn Ken O'Dowd said work on the \$13.5 million site would begin in January 2021, and the centre was expected to be operational by February 2022.

"Thousands of Flynn residents work in the manufacturing sector or in jobs that support the sector, so we know how important manufacturing jobs are to the region. The new school will support Queenslanders to get an education that leads to a career in the manufacturing industry," Mr O'Dowd said.

Associate Vice-President (Gladstone and Wide Bay Burnett Regions) Global Development Division for Central Queensland University Mr Luke Sinclair said the region's manufacturing sector continued to grow.

"Manufacturing employs over 5000 people in Central Queensland and is growing all the time," he said.

'Setting up this facility in Gladstone allows us to build the region's future manufacturing workforce, enhance our manufacturing research expertise, and support the local sector to continue thriving into the future.

"Gladstone, in particular, is a hub for gas and coal export and we are building our capacity to service industry, in areas such as advanced instrumentation and process manufacturing training, advanced welding and manufacturing, and the emerging hydrogen industry," said Mr Sinclair.

CQUniversity engaged with industry, community and government across all of regions, including Gladstone. The funding for the School of Manufacturing in Gladstone (and School of Mining in Rockhampton) came because of this engagement.

Through the university's work with industry and government, it developed a deep understanding of the region's needs for industry development, skills training, and regional

Using this evidence, they worked with government to secure the required funding to develop these facilities.

The school will be a complementary facility to the existing Trades Training Centre.

Tragically, every day hundreds of animals get killed on the road.

For a Targinnie wallaby carer, it's a heartbreaking thing, but caring for sick and injured wildlife is filled with so much enjoyment.

Janet Irvine has been looking after wallabies for years on her property and is known around town as the go to lady if an animal is sick, injured or too small to survive on its own in the wild

When you arrive at Ms Irvine's farm, you are struck by just how many wallabies are grazing in the front yard and paddocks nearby. They aren't bothered by visitors, giving nothing much more than a passing glance.

"This is the way we like it," Ms Irvine said.

"During the dry season when there's not as much feed around, the wallabies will come and visit for a while but when things green up again, they'll go their own way.

"We only care for wallabies as long as they need us, and they are free to come and go as they please once they are fully recuperated

from injury or old enough to look after themselves. When they are ready, they just go," Ms Irvine said.

Having done this job for some time, Ms Irvine has all the permits and experience necessary for someone to be a wild animal carer. She and several others form a tight-knit community of people who give of their land and resources to help distressed animals.

"We get a lot of animals brought to us that have been hit by cars and need help or, the motorist has stopped to check if there is a joey

"It's important to put your own safety first before you check animals found on the road," Ms Irvine reiterated.

"Do not stop on or near a road to check an animal unless it is safe to do so. Human safety must always come first.

"Determine the sex of the animal and, if female, check the pouch for a joey. If they find no pouch young, check the surrounding area for young that may have been thrown from the pouch on impact.'



State budget wins for CQ

After the Queensland Budget announcement on Tuesday, December 1, it looks as if many of Labor's election promises are on the cards.

Rockhampton MP Barry O'Rourke supports the 2020-21 state budget, saying it pumps hundreds of millions of dollars into the regional economy.

"Building on the Palaszczuk government's initial \$1.2 billion Queensland Health Covid-19 response plan established earlier this year, the \$360.5 million allocation for 2020-21 will support a range of critical services to ensure Queensland remains Covid-safe, as we manage people returning to our state."

The funding was in addition to standard operational funding for health and emergency services.

"At the recent state election I committed to deliver the Stage 1 redevelopment of Browne Park Stadium and am pleased that this budget provides \$25 million to achieve this," Mr O'Rourke said.

"I'm proud to be part of a Palaszczuk Labor government which will invest \$31 million to expand the Rockhampton Hospital and support 90 local construction jobs.

"Funds of \$1.6 million to continue replacement of the auxiliary fire and rescue station at Gracemere, worth \$2.21 million, will see this work progress in 2021," said Mr O'Rourke.

Film arts extravaganza set to highlight CQ region

The year 2020 proved to be a miserable one for cinema, with productions and theatres across Australia and the world shuttered due to the pandemic.

January 2021, however, promises a new dawn for lovers of cinema across the CQ region with the innovative Capricorn Film Festival set to dazzle Yeppoon from January 13 to January 17.

Across five days, tourists and locals alike will be treated to a vast array of carefully curated cinematic experiences. Though films, both features and shorts, are the centrepiece of the festival program, what is unique about the festival is that it has been designed to encompass and showcase so much more than simply film.

"It's expanding and growing," Luke Graham, the director and founder of the Capricorn Film Festival, said.

"It's kind of stepped away a little bit from just a film festival per se, to a film arts festival. We're screening films, but we're also doing many other cinema art activities," he said.

The festival kicks off on the night of

Wednesday January 13, at the Yeppoon Town Hall with a special screening of the critically acclaimed Australian film Moon Rock for Monday. Filmed in Winton, the trailer suggests a story about an unlikely friendship flourishing across the desolate beauty of outback Queensland. The director, producer and lead actor in the film will travel to Yeppoon for the screening.

Alongside Moon Rock for Monday, Days of the Bagnold Summer, Wild Things, Delfin and Rosie are some of the other feature films planned for screening.

What's more, Central Queenslanders with Irish roots are in for a treat with the screening of a Crock of Gold, a documentary feature centred on legendary Irish singer Shane MacGowan and his band the Pogues, the progenitors of modern-day ballads Dirty Old Town and Fairytale of New York.

Local filmmakers, musicians and video artists from the CQ region will feature prominently across the program. On Friday night, January 15, the Capricornia Silver Band will serenade attendees with popular moviescores in their extended tribute to cinema.

The Rocky Improv Group will put on a spe-

cial show packed with film-themed games.

Across the entire festival, Sensory CO: What Do U Sea? will embed a visually stimulating and eclectic collection of pop-up video art projections along the Yeppoon esplanade and James Street.

The Caps Short Film Competition, scheduled for the final day of the festival, will showcase a selection of short films split into two categories, one dedicated solely to films from Central Queensland, and one for films from the rest of Australia and abroad.

"We're adding performances, adding musical theatre, providing different versions of cinema art. It's really important not just to provide film because sometimes you may not want to watch a film, but there's going to be something else that we can provide that you as a local, or someone coming here as a tourist, can really take and experience," Mr

Alongside the entertainment and immersive cinematic experiences, networking and workshop events will offer aspiring and established filmmakers across the CQ region the chance to interact will their fellow cinephiles and further develop their craft.

The principal partner for the festival is the Livingstone Shire Council, and additional assistance for the event has been sourced from an impressive collection of interested parties, including Tourism and Events Queensland, Screen Queensland, Bishopp and the Capri-

Altogether, the eclectic program and sincere dedication of Mr Graham and the various event partners means that the vast and varied landscape of Central Queensland looks set to get its moment on screen.

Mr Graham understands how important this is. He founded the Capricorn Film Festival in 2015 to provide film arts education and exhibitions to the region.

"I'm a feature filmmaker myself and I live locally and created content locally, and I found that there was really no skilled education or organisational body that could support the region, so myself and a few other people put it together we've been happily growing ever since," he said.

Lightning strike scare

Clinton State School had an alarmingly close call on Tuesday afternoon after a lightning strike hit close to the school's oval.

Students were being ushered off the oval by teachers when the lightning struck near the Gladstone school.

Thirteen young children and two teachers were taken to Gladstone Hospital as a precaution after feeling a "tingling sensation" in their legs and a strong sense of anxiety after the

These details were confirmed by Queensland Ambulance Service Acting Senior Operations Supervisor Greg Christensen.

"The initial scene was a little chaotic, children were obviously distraught at what had just happened but it calmed very quickly once we assured them everything was OK," he said.

"The main complaints were anxiety - the kids were pretty wound up after the incident.

"But they were also complaining about tingling to the lower limbs, that was a very common complaint among all of the patients actually.

"It could have turned out very differently.
"We expected to see burns."

There had been reports that students were participating in water-based activities, howev-

er Clinton State School president Leanne Ibell rejected such claims in a statement.

A statement posted on the Clinton State School Facebook page on Tuesday night read:

"As you may be aware, a weather-related incident has occurred at our school during today's storm. Teachers were in the process of moving students off the oval due to weather concerns when lightning struck nearby.

"There was no rain on the oval at the time of the strike. Students were returned to class early from lunch break and Queensland Ambulance Service was contacted immediately.

"Thirteen students and two staff members with mild physical complaints have been transported to hospital as a precaution.

"There were no water activities in operation on the oval when the lightning strike occurred.

"I want to reassure you that we treat the safety and welfare of your children, our students, as our highest priority.

"Please rest assured that the school has followed all the appropriate protocols for this type of incident.

"Guidance counselling and support is being offered to any students or staff who may require assistance.

"Thank you for continuing support of Clinton State School."

"As a journalist I had the chance to interview some fantastic authors, many I now call friends. I love that I still get to work alongside these authors now."

"I have many fond memories of visiting my grandparents at their Emu Park beach house, going for daring 4wding adventures on the sandy bush tracks to Five Rocks, and whiling away the hours with Grandpa sharing stories. Even when he lost his sight in his later years, Don was still an avid storyteller and had all his humour and pilot's navigational wits about him. This, undoubtedly, has inspired my passion for stories and spark for adventure.

Check Christmas lights

Queensland Fire and Emergency Services has a timely fire safety message for residents putting up Christmas lights.

Acting inspector Barry Thompson said while "99 per cent of the time" Christmas lights were quite safe, there was still a chance a fault could occur depending on the standard of manufacture.

"QFES doesn't tend to get called out to fires caused by Christmas lights too often but there's definitely that possibility," he said.

"It's similar to when people use small candles in bedrooms, the majority of times everyone thinks, yes it's safe but all you need is something like a big curtain blown across to cause a fire. Christmas lights are the same.

"Our message is for people to just make sure that their equipment is in good condition with no exposed wires and that it's not being overheated because it's been in storage for 12 months."

He said it was vital to check equipment like double adaptors, power points, extension leads and the lights themselves.

"If the lights are turning on and off or becoming quite warm or overheated, that equipment should be discarded or checked by a qualified electrician.

"Section leads might end up under matts or under carpets and get coiled up and they can actually overheat and cause a fire as well."

Inspector Thompson said the deterioration of the coating on Christmas lights could cause them to give off toxic smoke.

"A lot of times people store lights in the shed, up in the ceiling, so not a really cool spot, and the condition of those lights will easily deteriorate without you actually knowing it," he said.

"People tend to put up quite a number of lights and, especially at night, they might go out and leave the lights on, so that initial test to make sure they are working correctly gives you a little bit of peace of mind."


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Toy run for Salvos appeal

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
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Cupcakes a bestseller



The Splash Zone is a major attraction in Gladstone as it caters for a variety of ages with different water bodies, allowing families to fully utilise the facility during the hot summer.


Most of the upgrades are due to be completed by June 2021, with building renewal work that will continue up until the end of 2021.

Questions on China trade

China buys so much of Australia's exports that it is hard to remember a time when our economy was not so connected with it. But it has not been this way for long.

Just 20 years ago Australia exported \$10 billion of goods to China, making up just five per cent of Australia's exports.

Over the past year, we have exported \$146 billion of goods to China, making up 40 per cent of our goods exports.

This rapid increase has delivered enormous benefits to Australia in terms of jobs and new business opportunities. Yet as important as this relationship is, our country was a pretty good place 20 years ago with barely any trade with China. If our trading relationship to China were to decline, I am confident that Australia would remain a pretty good place.

That is not the outcome that any wish for. It would be better if we could continue to increase trade with all countries, especially with a country as large as China. But trade is a business deal and if the deal is not good for you, it is best to walk away rather than do a deal at any price.

China has sought to increase the "price" of trading with them through a range of threats. In April, China's ambassador to Australia suggested that Chinese consumers would buy less beef and wine if Australia pursued an independent review of the coronavirus. China later slapped tariffs on Australian barley and wine and has restricted the import of beef and coal.

A fortnight ago, the Chinese embassy published a list of 14 grievances they had with the Australian government. The implication is that unless the Australian government corrects these issues then China will continue to restrict Australian trade.

The list of 14 issues include not allowing a Chinese government owned telecommunications company build our 5G network, banning

foreign interference in our political system and criticisms of China by Members of Parliament.

Some, like the leader of the Labor party Anthony Albanese, claim that Australia's actions are in part to blame for the breakdown in relations. But which of the 14 grievances would he give up to China in exchange for selling them more stuff? Would it be our foreign investment controls? Would it be the right for democratically elected MPs to speak their minds? Our fundamental freedoms and values are worth more than whatever China would like to buy from us.

China's bullying tactics only serves to highlight what a mistake it has been to allow China to reap the benefits of a free trade world while it ignores all of the obligations to be a member of that club.

When China joined the World Trade Organisation in 2001 it promised to fully disclose the subsidies it provides to industry. China refused to do that until 2016, 15 years late, and even then it only provided the subsidies provided by its local governments. Twenty years later China is yet to fully disclose the subsidies it provides to its industry.

Independent analysis suggests that in 2014, 80 per cent of China's steel industry profits came from government subsidies. Today, China accounts for half of the world's steel production. It is not healthy for a country that is bullying others to control so much of the production of a key commodity.

There is one Australian export that China has yet to impose restrictions on and that is iron ore. China needs our iron ore to maintain its dominance of steel production. As the major supplier of a key input to make steel, Australia should work with other countries to build up their steel industries so we have more balanced production across the world. And, we should build another steel mill ourselves which could help offset any loss in China trade.

Beef event gives insights

BeefTech 2020 saw 86 people gather in Emerald to hear from five specialist speakers on the latest technological developments in the Australian beef industry.

Part of the Central Highland Development Corporation's (CHDC) Agfrontier: Regional Agtech Catalyst Program, the half-day event late last month featured a combination of speeches, demonstrations and trade-stands, and offered farmers across the region insights into the promising developments transforming the industry.

CHDC Agtech program manager Sonya Comiskey expressed her excitement about the new developments highlighted at the event.

'It was all about agtech in the beef industry context, and Darryl Heidke, our keynote speaker from MLA (Meat and Livestock

Australia), talked specifically about off-farm technology, which is mainly centred around processing. He particularly talked about the introduction of robotic boning into beef," she said.

"There has been an announcement between MLA and Teys Australia out of Rockhampton that they'll be implementing robotic boning next year, which is really exciting. We've been waiting a long time for that to hit the beef industry."

Robotic processing of lamb has been well established, but until now the process has struggled to gain traction in beef.

The general topics of discussion at BeefT-ech 2020 straddled an interesting line between the futuristic and the present. Although many of the technologies present cutting-edge and sophisticated developments, they are ones that can be adopted in the here and now by willing producers.

'We were very conscious to make this event focused on what agtech producers can access now,' Ms Comiskey said.

'A lot of events are very strategic and futurefocused, and so for producers at the coalface or at the grassroots level, sometimes that doesn't have quite as much relevance. We deliberately tried to get speakers, demonstrations and traders that agtech people can access now that will make a difference."

Alongside Mr Heidke, Gavin Tickle from the AAM Investment Group spoke about stock live software, and how the impact of Covid has increased demand for digital tools, and for remote buying and selling.

Will Wilson talked about the use of drones in mustering. Ian McCamley offered attendees insights from a producer's perspective, and the technology he has utilised around precision water management, fat scanning and paddock weighing. Bridget Kirkwood gave attendees an update on Beef Australia.

In addition to the speakers, PLF Australia presented a demonstration on quad bike safety and precision water management tools. Optiweigh demonstrated its In-Paddock Cattle Weighing System and the Central Highlands Regional Resources Use Planning, or Chrrup, ran a focus group for the app it is developing around workplace health and safety.

Alongside the speeches and demonstrations, trade stands from a range of businesses were set up, all geared around products and services for agribusiness markets.

"And throughout it all, there was a lot of

networking," Ms Comiskey said.

Sponsored by the Local Buying Foundation in partnership with MLA Australia, the event attracted attendees as far away as Bundaberg, Brisbane and interstate.

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

A private funeral was held on November 26 in Hervey Bay as per John's request.



Call out for highway art

An innovative new arts project under the name of Wrapt in Mugul will see five artworks transform a stretch of the Bruce Highway between Miriam Vale and Bororen.

Funded by Arts Queensland, the project is accepting submissions of interest from CQ artists, who can submit either a planned work of art or one that has been recently completed for consideration

Organised by Lee McIvor, the founder of Wrapt in Mugul, the creative enterprise will also see 10 selected artworks positioned around Mt. Colosseum.

"The expression of interest form is quite detailed, they have to actually show what it is they want to put on the highway, what kind of work they want to put on. We are expecting the artworks to be quite large so that they can be seen from a distance. They could be anywhere up to 50-foot high," Ms McIvor said.

The submission window for the combined 15 artworks runs from now until the middle of January. From the middle of January until the middle of February, a curatorial panel will select which works of art are to be displayed, and then artists have until July 1 to create and install their work.

The public will have access to the artworks from July 1, and the pieces will remain in place for three months. The transitory nature of the project gives it the title of an 'ephemeral' arts exhibition.

Mugul refers to the Indigenous name for Mt Colosseum, a site of significance for the Traditional Owners of the land, the Gooreng Gooreng. Lee and her colleagues spent years in consultation with the Gooreng Gooreng on how the site might be activated to showcase Indigenous history.

Artists are encouraged to submit works of art that reflect the Indigenous history of the Miriam Vale region, though this is not an ab-

solute rule or pre-requisite for submission and consideration.

There is no limitation on the forms of art that can be submitted, but Ms McIvor said she expected to see more sculptural forms of expression.

"It's more about sculptural work or installation pieces, but it does not necessarily exclude paintings. If someone can come up with an exciting way to present a painting that will last through three months of weather, that would

be great. Anything's possible," she said.

Throughout the exhibition period, a number of satellite events are also planned to make the Wrapt in Mugul project a truly memorable one for local residents and tourists alike.

"We're working on a celebrity chef to come and do a sunset dinner. We're hoping that we can get some artists-in-residence for the two schools, in Miriam Vale and Bororen. A whole heap of stuff going on," Ms McIvor said.

Altogether, the project has the potential to

demonstrate the artistic reach and depth of the CQ region.

"I came up with this idea several years ago, thinking that the Gladstone region needed to have a different perspective for tourists coming though. Not just concentrating on the industrial side of things here in Gladstone. But also showing that there's a high level of creatives in this region. We want to showcase the work of our artists," Ms McIvor said.



Time for real leadership



Without the federal government's generous fiscal response to Covid-19, we may well have faced riots in the streets.

I am surprised though at the range of people saying that such levels of spending should continue unabated, in effect that printing money is on its own, good policy.

Printing money with few restrictions has in the past been associated with cataclysmic economic collapse, notably in Germany and South America. Relatively recently however, what is now known as Modern Monetary Theory (MMT) has gained traction.

The theory says that governments should continue to borrow or print money as long as the economy is below full employment. In doing so, there does not need to be any direct references to taxes or other means to repay the

Obviously this line of thought has some appeal, governments can keep spending and giving money away until full employment results in rising inflation.

While MMT does provide some useful insights into the role and capacity of governments to dampen and even eliminate economic shocks, we need to realise several key conditions that make it largely unfeasible. From what I can see, MMT only works if:

- All countries print money at an equal rate; or
- Any particular country becomes self-sufficient in everything; and
- Interest rates remain low forever
- Any absence of these conditions will cause a fall in living standards for the country that prints the money because:
- Printing money unilaterally causes a decline in the international value of the currency. As a result, the purchasing power of countries that do participate falls as imports become more expensive.

Counties that do not participate become more powerful spending-wise.

Many final goods are made overseas or rely on inputs made overseas, where labour is cheaper and markets are much bigger than ours. Even if it was possible to make everything locally, it would be horrendously expensive and if the past was anything to go by the quality would be rubbish!

With the RBA cash rate effectively at 0, the costs of government borrowings are negligible.

Consider the difference when the massive transfer of baby boomer wealth starts happening and rates move to 5 per cent or more. Unbridled printing of money now is simply going to transfer today's problems to future genera-

That being the case, do we toss the ideas behind MMT out completely, or is there a role for increased fiscal intervention?

I do think that there is a strong argument for universal income support for everyone between the ages of 23 and 60 comprising a payment of up to \$40,000 per annum (much the same as Jobkeeper).

Sounds crazy perhaps, but think about this:

- The period between leaving school and 23 years of age provides for self-investment by way of further education, and time to decide on life's direction. There should be no change to current support concessions over this time.
- People would be freer to make job and career choices, the fallback being a reasonable payment that would buy time to consider realignment and next steps.
- People facing situations of family violence would know they have options and the capacity to create a safer future for themselves.
- Productivity would skyrocket because the people at work would be those that want to
- People with skills not immediately suited to a standard workplace structure (artists, musicians and entrepreneurs for example)

would be free to test and hone their skills and pursue their goals over time.

- The career of homemaking would be financially rewarded. Society would benefit from increased parental investment in families (and consequently less delinquency). Partners could take time out to study, make a career move, or spend time at home. There would be a massive reduction in labourmarket friction.
- Wages would increase because employers would be competing against a workforce with real options, based on personal prefer-

Interestingly, a significant component of the initiative would be self-funding.

Outside of the aged pension, government spending on welfare (Newstart, childcare payments) is already about \$100 billion a year. Much of this is distinctly wasteful and would be better directed to universal income support, resulting in people being better off through choice.

Some of the money would be taxed upon receipt but most would be spent, returning a ship.

significant portion to the government by way of GST, income tax and corporate tax. Productivity gains would support higher wages and further increases in tax collection, with the economic multipliers enhancing these recov-

Spending on ineffective social support initiatives would collapse because people facing difficulties could consider their options and fund a new life. So would payments for personal and workplace related insurance claims (and hence premiums) because all those eligible would effectively be underwritten for the first \$40,000 of income.

The number of workplace tribunal hearings would also collapse because in many cases there would be little to no economic loss.

From any perspective, printing and distributing money for the sake of it is bad policy. Combined with other measures including labour market and welfare reform, it is an immensely valuable tool.

That is an opportunity for genuine leader-



Stately avenues on coast

Some of Australia's most picturesque beaches in Australia are framed by avenues of Australian Pines

It was hard not admire the beauty of the mass plantings Norfolk Island Pines of Byron Bay. Many coastal communities have to battle to keep these stately avenues in place but it is worth the effort

The four most recognised Australian species are the Bunya Pine, the Hoop Pine, Norfolk Island Pine and Kauri Pine. These have the distinction of being among the first Australian plants to be exported around the world. It is a pleasant surprise, when touring overseas, to come upon a stately avenue of, for example, Norfolk Island Pines. Even within Australia, our forefathers had the foresight to create large scale planting's of these tree species.

Araucaria bidwillii, or Bunya Pine, is a large tree that can reach the height of 40 metres. It is native to rainforest scrubs, but is also found from mountain tops to ravines. Their pinecones may weigh 10 kilograms or more, and produced an important food source to Aboriginal peoples. These are produced high in the dense, rounded crowns of the trees.

Bunya Pine has been widely used around the world as an ornamental tree as it will grow in almost every tropical situation, with the exception of swampy conditions. The best examples of this tree can be found in the Bunya Mountains National Park near Kingaroy.

Araucaria cunninghamii, or Hoop pine, is regarded as the tallest tree species in Queensland, and can be found native to some of the state's most picturesque national parks. These trees become a host for many of the native epiphyte orchids and other parasitic plants, which almost form natural gardens on the trees themselves. With the regal appearance of this tree it became the main feature of many of this regions early homes.

Araucaria heterophylla, or Norfolk Island Pine, is a coastal icon tree used around the world. It differs from the Hoop Pine in having a much more formal branching pattern, and the foliage is much less prickly. Like the Hoop Pine, the Norfolk Island Pine too can be found growing from almost the shoreline to the mountain ridges. The Norfolk Pine could quite easily be grouped amongst the world's most popular indoor plants.

Have you ever queried the name Araucaria when staying at the Capricorn International Resort? This is the Latin name for a family of Australian pine trees. Araucarias are trees native to only the Southern Hemisphere countries of Australia including its territory Norfolk Island, New Caledonia, New Guinea, New Hebrides, as well as South America.

The other member of the Araucariaceae family is The Queensland Kauri Pine, and like the other three Araucaria are from an ancient lineage of conifers, which were a dominant feature of the flora during the Jurassic and Cretaceous eras.

Agathis robusta, or The Queensland Kauri Pine, is typically an upright symmetrical tree growing between 30 and 50 metres high. The pinkish to copper new growth of the Queensland Kauri Pine can be a feature to the tree. This tree will prefer a deep, fertile, well-drained soil in full sun or light shade and is able to tolerate light frosts.

The Queensland Kauri Pine is found naturally in parts of Queensland, the Atherton Tablelands and around Maryborough and on the Fraser Island. The best specimens of The Queensland Kauri Pine can be found near the playgrounds at the Rockhampton Botanic Gardens.

SEEDLINGS TO PLANT NOW

We are now at a stage when seedlings planted for Christmas will not be ready in time. However, most local nurseries are selling advanced seedling packs that will provide flowers for Christmas.

Annuals: Amaranthus, balsam, celosia, coleus, cosmos, petunia, salvia, torenia, zinnia.

Vegetables: Beetroot, capsicum, cucumber, eggplant, endive, lettuce, marrow, pumpkin, radish, silverbeet, spinach, squash, snake beans, sweet corn, tomatoes, zucchini.





Agriculture recovery role

Line of storms after heat

The heat wave lasted five days in Rockhampton culminating in a maximum of 39C Sunday - the hottest day since January.

A cooler south easterly arrived on Wednesday. Biloela and Rolleston had the heat wave for 16 days.

Ahead of the change, there was a trough with a line of storms (see satellite photo).

These storms started on the Sunshine Coast with 72mm at Yandina on Monday evening. They became well spaced in the hotter air of Central Queensland.

There were reports of 24mm on Fraser Island, which may help their fire problem. The fire has been burning for seven weeks and it's only now that the authorities have got an air tanker to douse the flames.


Other significant storm totals for Monday in CQ were: Banana/Bindaree 34mm, Williamson 31mm, Biloela 30mm, Callide 22mm, Blackdown 18mm, Wowan 14mm. Marlborough/Upper Van Dyke 13mm, Besch's Hill 12mm, Raglan 11mm.

Lightning flickered west of Rocky during the late evening which is making it look promising. Then the trough sat over Rocky on Tuesday and rumbled thunder for most of the early afternoon with no rain. Very disappointing

John at Emu Park got 21mm in 30 minutes after 3pm. And Craig at Pacific Heights reported 15mm that seemed to come from nowhere. Williamson got another 18mm and Marlborough 16mm from the very isolated storms.

The cloud that caused this storm activity came from the monsoon about 2000km away, off Broome.

Now a tropical low looks like developing, with hundreds of millimetres of rain for the Kimberley in the next few days. This is the first time in eight years the monsoon has



started before Christmas.

Gladstone reported a storm with 17mm and Boyne island 8mm after 2pm on Tuesday. Lightning hit the ground and affected 13 school children and two teachers from Clinton Primary School on the oval. They took teachers and students to hospital after they complained about a tingling feeling.

About 2000 people are killed worldwide an-

nually by lightning. Most are outdoor workers, military and athletes. Around 10 per cent of people struck die. There have been numerous reports of children finishing school and being struck or affected by lightning in Australia and the USA. In 2004, at Ocoee Middle School in the US, four children were struck by lightning while getting off a school bus. Three years later, the school kept the children back until storms

were finished. In 2008, one little girl was walking home after school in south Brisbane. She took shelter under a tree during a storm. Lightning struck the tree, and the girl died. All these incidents occurred around 3pm. This is the time for maximum heating and the most frequency for storm development. What time do most schools finish? That's right, around the same time school finishes.



Reaching new heights

feature races at Eagle Farm in Brisbane on Saturday.

Leading the charge is that magnificent Graeme Green-trained sprinter Master Jamie, best known over trips from 1000 to 1200 metres.

Graeme runs Jamie in the \$250,000 The Gateway 4YO (1400m) – a distance the horse is untried at, but by reports Graeme believes won't concern him too greatly.

From 21 starts, Master Jamie has won a dozen times, as well as being placed four times for \$362,475 in prize money, which makes him the second-highest earner ever trained exclusively from Callaghan Park.

By the way, that record stands to that wonderful young grey filly of a few seasons back in Paradis Imperial, which won \$379,975.

Master Jamie is in a very hot race against horses trained by Melbourne and Sydney's Ciaron Maher and David Eustace partnership, plus Gai Waterhouse and Adrian Bot and another Sydney trainer Bjorn Baker.

At his only start beyond 1200 metres, Master Jamie won a Set Weights 2YO over 1300 me-

tres at Callaghan Park on 6 July, 2019.

Can he get the 1400 metres of The Gateway? Saturday will tell.

Green will also start Kotabharu in a 3YO (1400m) at Eagle Farm, while Adrian Coome has recent multiple Rockhampton winner Buffy nommed for two races.

I think the most interesting entry from a Callaghan Park point of view is that of Sweet Dolly in the Calaway Gal 2YO (1000m), bobbing up in 18 entries which includes some very smart youngsters.

Kevin Hansen had said he planned to spell Sweet Dolly after her outstanding Townsville debut win a fortnight back, but obviously she has done well and Kev is going for a throw at the stumps, and why not.

We wish all the Rocky contingent well.

TOUCHING on Paradis Imperial before, I decided to make a call and find out what became of the mare.

My research revealed she had not raced since finishing an out-of-character sixth at Callaghan Park under the huge weight of 63.5 kilograms in May last year.

As well, I unravelled an often-overlooked little known fact about the brilliant Tony Mc-Mahon-trained filly that she created an Australian record in the 2016/17 season, winning seven races as a two-year-old.

It was more than any other youngster for her age in Australia that season, and a very difficult one to emulate.

When I enquired, Tony revealed Esmee (Paradis Imperial) was retired because weights were simply making it far too difficult for her and connections did not wish to risk her being injured.

Still only relatively young at age six, Paradis Imperial is a permanent resident on Neville Stewart's Oaklands Stud, Darling Downs where she is in foal to champion stallion Power.

WE ARE losing two industry stakeholders from Rockhampton in December.

Deputy chairman of stewards Tate Hudson is moving from his role with QRIC, having been based at Callaghan Park for over a year, to join the metropolitan steward's panel in Brisbane.

Jockey Sonja Wiseman had planned to move to Adelaide this week but is staying on until just after Christmas.

I'm sure all local racing stakeholders will wish them the best of luck.

LUCKY owner, Gracemere's Colin Bell is really starting up a dynasty of horses with "Ask" as part of their name.

Colin has enjoyed success at Callaghan Park with Now Ask Me, Ask Me Tomorrow and the latest is about to hit the tracks in Ask Me Again, which is a cracking physical specimen.

It is no surprise really, as Colin is carrying on the tradition first utilised by his late mother – the 'Galloping Grandmother', Iris Bell.

Who could forget the star grey sprinter Iris raced and trained from her North Rockhampton stables named Don't Ask Me?

Foaled in 1986, Don't Ask Me was by Pride of Kellina but, one thing for sure, he was the pride of Iris Bell's racing stock.

A big bold grey, Don't Ask Me won a stack of races at Callaghan Park and if I remember rightly Iris' son Billy Bell at least once won on her at Callaghan Park.

Rockhampton table tennis finishes a great seasion

For the first time, thanks to the effects of Covid-19, the Rockhampton Table Tennis Association conducted its annual Closed Championships in December when a shortened version of this tournament was staged at the Leichhardt Park playing centre.

Despite the hot conditions, the standard of play was excellent and obviously the games of some players picked up some advantages, while others suffered from the conditions.

Local organisers opted on a combined closed titles and end of year break-up after several months were lost due to the effects of Covid-19. During the year the club could only play two seasons of fixtures, instead of the usual four, but on paper the first season ran for a very long time due to the interruption.

This year's version of the closed titles consisted of men's and women's singles, and a combined consolation event as well as a doubles competition, which was arranged via a random draw on the day that saw players rated into two divisions and drawn to play with one another.

The premier men's singles event provided an abundance of great matches and Joel Coughlan made it the sixth occasion he has won this event with a sold victory over his brother Dane, who has won the title three times in the past. Joel ousted Rayden Smith in his semi-final, while Dane created what most people would call an upset when he overpowered the top-seeded Matthew Pettett over four close sets in the other semi.

The women's open singles provided

some fantastic matches from the round robins through to the final stages, and Ann-Louise Stewart made it the third time she has won the title when she overpowered nine-time winner Erica Nolan in the final. The semi-finals saw Nolan struggle to beat her mother Pam Clarke 6-11, 11-3, 11-8, 10-12, 11-8, while Stewart had to qualify by beating the consistent Monica Deeth, also by 11-8 in the deciding game of an even tighter match.

Statistics demonstrate that all four of these players have remarkable experience within the sport, and apart from the number of times Stewart and Nolan have won this event, Clarke has won the title a staggering 17 times since 1985 when the trophy was introduced, and Deeth has collected the spoils three times.

The consolation singles resulted in promising junior Nick Green having too many aces for evergreen veteran stager Linda O'Sullivan in a duel over four sets, where Green came out on top 11-6, 12-10, 7-11, 11-8.

The doubles event produced some very good matches considering the conditions on the day and the fact it was the last event on the program prior to the end of year celebrations. The outcome was that Joel Coughlan and Linda O'Sullivan were able to take advantage of being part of the same team of the fixture season that finished early last week, and defeat the combination of Pam Clarke and Ann-Louise Stewart. In the semis Coughlan and O'Sullivan edged out Rayden Smith and Emily Steffen 8-11, 11-8, 10-12, 12-10, 11-8 while Clarke and Stewart prevailed over Matthew Pettett and Patricia Green 11-9 in the decider.

Fishing

Out in the deep with Dags

Now that we are right into summer - and as we have seen this week with the storm cells, or squalls, such as the one pictured making their way through the region - at times being on the water isn't a good thing.

It can be very dangerous and good seamanship skills are required.

You need to have a plan if you see one of these coming at you, because you usually can't outrun them and the winds can be up around that 50-60 knot range with white water everywhere, scaring the living daylights out of you!

VMR Gladstone and Round Hill have sessions which are really helpful when dealing with these conditions, and if you aren't a member, I strongly advise that you become one, just in case things don't go the way that you planned. I have had to call them for help, so I should know.

Let's talk fishing!

This past week we have seen plenty of fish being caught, especially the pelagic species such as big schools of longtail tuna, mack tuna, and spotted mackerel.

There have been many pictures of spotties being landed all along the coast. This species love the calmer waters, and seem to hang around structures such as channel markers, tripod markers, big rocks like inner and outer rocks, Sable chef, Ethel, Black head, and Rundle Island.

They are here in good numbers and if you manage to latch on to a longtail tuna make sure you look after it, bleed it and chill it down, as they are delicious.

I mentioned Justin Nye form Gladstone Fly and Sportfishing had been down at Hervey bay chasing small black marlin along the sandy

shallows of Platypus Bay on the western side of Fraser Island. In the picture from left to right is Justin Nye, along with NRL players Jack Wighton, and Curtis Scott, both lads flying up for a fish this past week, not only fishing for black marlin, but slipping up to Lake Awoonga where Justin put them on to the big barra. Check his Facebook page out for all the photos.

This is something which Justin and his colleague from Hervey Bay have been marketing to increase the bang for the buck with what this amazing region offers the southern anglers. These experiences are what many thousands of fishermen dream of, and they are right here.

Partnering up with our neighbours is a great move. Well done, Justin.

I have been watching the aerial shots from Paul, who flies to Heron every day in that wee red R66 helicopter, as well as others with drones, and on boats, and there's a heap of what many are calling coral spawn on the surface, but it's actually 'Trichodesmium' - an algae bloom generated north-east of North Reef, and the north-easterly is gathering it all together and blowing it towards our shore.

With the spawning of the reef only happening this past week, we actually might get some of that along our coast too, which would be

amazing for our fringing reef systems.

This weekend will be one where many will stick to the sheltered waters of the river and harbour systems, as wind and seas build to well over 30 knots and three to four-metre seas.

There are good numbers of mangrove jack about in the Collo and Rods Bay systems, as well as in through Pancake and right up through the Baffle Creek system.

Baffle Creek will be one system which will be amazing this weekend as it's massive and very sheltered.

Another good spot is Broadwater, and the southern end of Deepwater NP.

Next week we get to have a chat with Adam Balkin, who not only owns Curtis Ferry Services but recently slipped up to join some mates on their annual pilgrimage to Groote Eylandt in the gulf, chasing big bill fish. Brace yourself! Stay safe.

It was a sizzling performance by Snake Pit Muay Thai on the weekend, returning from an inaugural Muay Thai tournament with two gold medals.

It's made more impressive by the fact that around 140 fighters made their way to the Gold Coast to compete in the inaugural Allan Bell Cup.

Despite some niggling injuries, Kam Bryan and Brad Dyer also walked away from the competition with a silver medal placing, adding to the success of the small squad.

O'Brien was full of praise for his fellow gold medal winner, saying he was incredibly proud of the junior's performance.

"We had Theo Dyer who scored gold," O'Brien said.

"It was his very first competition and he fought a guy who already had three bouts on his record.

"Out of all the fighters I've trained, professional and amature, his was probably the best debut fight I've ever seen.

"He was calm, respectful, creative and technical.

"And just easily outclassed his opponent in every round. "He's an important part of the gym - his fa-

ther Brad and his mother Ana are also fighters at the gym so it's a real family affair now.

"To come away in his first fight, and his first tournament, with a gold - it's a huge victory for

him."

CQ Today then asked O'Brien about his own performance, in which he said it was a bit un-

"I was actually intending on competing this year - I did have a pretty major surgery last year so I've got steel plates and screws every-

"They did ask if I could think about it because there was a pro division.

"So I did nominate for that and when I showed up there was nobody in my weight class

"I normally fight the 65-kilo guys but I chose to go up and fight the heavyweights who

are 91 kilos and higher.

"My first fight went through pretty cruisy, and then I was up against a bigger opponent where I won by KO in the second round."

O'Brien then talked about the success of the Snake Pit Muay Thai Gym, and how popular it has become.

"We've got about 15 people who are staying actively ready for competition now," he said.

"Most of them are amatuer fighters, four of them are juniors, (and) then we have four professionals.

"We've just booked in another pro boxing fight for one of our guys, Tom Wilkonson, who was the main event of Mackay two weeks ago where he won by third round KO.

"The gym is going very well and we're in very high demand.

"Fortunately we've taken the right path in the sport and most of the travel is paid for by the promotion.

"So every time you see these groups of adults going to compete, their travel is paid for, their accommodation is paid for, it's a great experience for all of them and it's helped a lot of people there.
