A Christmas roar

If you hear the unsettling rumble of large motorcycles down your street, there's no need to fear.

MACE is on a mission this Saturday night.

Motorcyclists Advocating Child Empowerment, that is.

Every year a group of volunteers on motorbikes thunder around neighbourhood streets raising awareness and funds for children in need.

The Central Queensland club president Alex Wilson is passionate about what the club does. It has its own special way of empowering children. By simply existing, talking to children and taking them on empowerment rides, they are helping to minimise young people's fear and anxiety in the struggle for survival and recognition.

At Christmas time, this is especially important.

"This year we'll have record numbers of kids with us, so we'll be coming to a street near you in a bus, car or motorcycle checking out the community's Christmas lights and making it into a competition," Mr Wilson said.

Starting out with just 12 bikes four years ago, they have the unexpected problem of causing traffic jams because they've become so popular.

"There'll be around 40 bikes, seven cars and two buses. We tour around the streets, noting houses that have gone overboard with their Christmas lights, then we all get together at the end and vote."

"The surprise on people's faces is priceless when bikies turn up with a bunch of kids to tell them they've won the best decorations prize. At first, they don't believe it, but it's hard to argue with empowered kids and guys on motorbikes," Mr Wilson said.

MACE is a social motorcycle club known around Australia for its work in helping kids with emotional problems from mental, physical or sexual trauma.

Each club works by adopting children into club and making them part of a larger family.

"We listen to children and tell them they are important, and we value their point of view," Mr Wilson said.

"By having a larger family to identify with, it helps kids feel like they belong to a bigger community that respects them. The Christmas lights ride is just one of many things our volunteers do.

"Empowerment rides where we work with the kids and the parents against bullying make a massive difference. We collect the child from home before school and group of us will take them on a trip around the area, culminating with a very noisy drop off," Mr Wilson added.

Turning up to school on loud motorbikes sends a message to others that the child matters, that all children matter, and there are people out there willing to help them stand up to bullies and abusers.

Helping children to feel safe again is vital. MACE assigns experienced members to be part of a child's support team and work in conjunction with a parent or guardian to provide

support, safety and advocacy.

The clubs are open to male and female riders and pillions and are like-minded responsible community members who want to minimise fear and anxieties for unsupported children in the struggle for recognition and survival.

Examples of MACE support include attending police interviews, solicitors appointments, attending court cases, supervised custody visits, encourage empowerment and offer protection and the protection of rights.

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Gladstone getting ready to reel in the tourists

It went ahead this year without a line being wet, but a few creative tweaks will ensure Australia's biggest family fishing competition is future proofed in 2021 and beyond.

The Boyne Tannum HookUp will celebrate its 26th year in 2021 and despite the event going virtual in 2020, the HookUp committee have worked hard to ensure the competition can go ahead next year should Covid-19 return.

Gladstone Region Mayor Matt Burnett said Gladstone Regional Council was proud to support such a long-standing and well-run event via its Community Investment Program.

Exploration is the necessary firststep to a prosperous and sustainable mining industry, and if drilling companies across the state hit upon commercially viable deposits next year, there is considerable hope that Queensland's resources sector will continue to power the lives and aspirations of Central Queenslanders well into the future, regardless of whatever transitory external pressures emanating from geopolitics bear down on the region.

There are other reasons for optimism.

The mines that proliferate across Central Queensland are world-class operations, technically sophisticated, committed to stringent safety and environmental standards and run by highly-skilled labour.

Quality matters, and we have some of the best mining companies in the world.

What's more, our policymakers recognise the importance of export market diversification, and are working assiduously to expand existing export markets and open up new opportunities for Australian companies.

Diversification means less risk, and less need for panic when political disagreements morph into trade disputes.

So let's wait and see if the reports are true.

If they are, we'll take a hit but, given our strengths, it's unlikely to be a crippling blow.

Exploration future bright

Mining is high risk, high reward enterprise and it all begins with the exploration phase of the mining cycle.

Minerals exploration involves drilling companies intersecting target zones at multiple points through sophisticated drilling techniques to map out potential mineral wealth within a particular area. Mineral core samples are extracted from the drill holes and analysed to determine the zone's commercial value.

With Queensland's economy largely propelled by the resources sector, exploration for new resource wealth is a key indicator of the state's economic potential and, according to Kim Wainwright, the chair of the Queensland Exploration Council (QEC), exploration activity across coal, petroleum, gold and copper deposits in Queensland has continued despite the onslaught of the pandemic and a recent fall in coal and petroleum prices.

The QEC's 10th annual exploration 'scorecard' released last week showed that council members invested more than \$640 million in the exploration sector throughout 2019-2020, with more than half expected to increase or maintain activity or expenditure in Queensland over the next 12 months.

Ms Wainwright said the figures revealed growing optimism in the state's exploration industry.

"Prices for base and precious metals have recovered well since the onset of Covid in March, gold is trading at historically high prices despite a mid-year price slide and copper has remained stable throughout the pandemic," Ms Wainwright said.

"Coal and gas exploration spending grew by 61 per cent and 22 per cent respectively in 2019-20 - totalling almost \$460 million - despite price falls in both commodities so there is definitely a feeling of growth and optimism in the sector.

"More than \$181 million was also invested in exploration for base metals like copper, zinc and lead and on prospecting for critical minerals such as cobalt, gold, vanadium, lithium and rare earth minerals, some of which are used in batteries and other new technologies and defence systems."

The positive trend in the exploration sector belies the escalating geopolitical risks bearing down on Australia's mining industry. At present, more than 80 ships carrying Australian coal have been blocked from entering Chinese ports, part of a wider diplomatic dispute between the two nations. Coal mines from Central Queensland are among those affected by the blockade.

Yet despite this gathering storm, Ms Wainwright has seen indications which suggest the positive trends in exploration will continue well into 2021.

"The exploration scorecard is a point-intime survey, and we ended that in June 30. And then in the third quarter this year, there was almost \$2 billion dollars raised on the Australian Stock Exchange for junior resources companies, so that's where a lot of the optimism is coming from, all the money that's flowing into this space. It's smaller ASX companies going out and conducting those programs. We saw a mass influx of capital raising across the board, and that's a predictor. The benefits of all that capital that flowed in to the ASX during that period will start to come on around March 2021," Ms Wainwright said.

Other indications point to a banner year in 2021. The Australian Drilling Industry Association recently provided a report on the dwindling availability of drilling equipment such as drill rigs across all regions throughout Queensland, which suggests demand is strong for exploration activities.

"It's looking promising. I think 2021 is going to be a very good year for exploration right through CQ," Ms Wainwright said.

The state government is a keen supporter of resources exploration. The 2020-2021 budget announced on December 1 allocated some \$29 million in exploration grants and according to the QEC's scorecard, members experienced no major regulatory barriers to growth over the preceding 12 months.

What's more, the pandemic has dramatically altered the global investment landscape and according to Ms Wainwright, Queensland's comparative success in suppressing the virus positions the state's exploration sector to thrive well into the future.

"Because of the prospectivity and the safety of the jurisdiction, I feel like Queensland is uniquely placed to really surge in terms of investment and people looking at us as not only a world class coal exploration and producing place, but also for critical minerals as well. The Queensland Exploration Council is really gearing up to push Queensland internationally over the next year," Ms Wainwright said.

Rocky dentist launches world first health cover plan

Frustrated at the lack of value in extras heath cover, Dr Abraham Zacharia decided to launch a world-first extras health cover plan.

The Rockhampton dentist said XHP, which officially launched this year after years of development and licensing by ASIC, allowed members to rollover their unused funds every year.

"With traditional extras health insurance, which includes services such as dental, physiotherapy and chiropractic, if you don't use it by the 31 December, you lose it," he said.

"Say, you pay \$1000 that year and only use \$300. At the end of the year that \$700 is just wasted and never to be seen again resulting in loss of value of the investments being made."

With XHP, Dr Zacharia said those leftover funds are rolled over and were yours to use in future years.

"Say, you're like our member Peter, who's been with health insurance for 54 years. With traditional health insurance the maximum he can get out is his annual limit, but imagine if he just saved \$1000 a year, he'd now have \$54,000 to cover his extras health needs before he has a Gap to worry about," he said.

"If you pay premiums to your insurance company it's dead money, but with XHP your money is earning interest, when the banks pay interest."

Dr Zacharia, who's been a dentist for 30 years, said XHP was an Australian owned and operated company, standing up for Australians.

"As a dentist, I'm frustrated to hear people who have extras cover saying they can't afford optimal care even with health fund preferred providers due to the Gap," he said.

"Here is a situation of a child having orthodontic treatment, cost of treatment being \$7000 with the treatment being done over a two-year period for which they got \$1400 back as rebates from their health fund, leaving the parents out of pocket by \$5600, even though they had been in a health fund for over 10 years. Imagine if the parent could have accumulated all of the unused benefits," he said

He said health care is something everyone needs, especially as they got older, but it wasn't something everyone could afford.

"You hear it all the time on the news, people living in pain because they don't have access to healthcare," he said.

"Some people go overseas because they can't afford the cost here, but the standard of health care overseas and here are two totally different things. What happens if something goes wrong?"

Dr Zacharia said he saw XHP as a simple way of making health care affordable, with the biggest benefits coming as the service grew.

"With member numbers increasing every day, our aim at XHP is to become one of the biggest health services buyer group and will contract health providers and practitioners

on a fixed fee arrangement, giving our members absolute clarity of costs to eliminate bill shock," he said

"As a dedicated health savings account, the money that you've saved can be put toward medication or x-rays or used to pay gap fees at the hospital or at the GP."

XHP members also get 80 per cent of their money back if they cancel their cover, as opposed to none in a traditional health fund, and savings can be transferred to others as a gift, if they're in need of health support.

"Just \$199 every year or 55c a day is a small investment for long term peace of mind."

No regrets on turning 100

Maisie Hammond says she never thought she'd make it to age 100 but, now that she has, she certainly has no regrets.

Together, the couple went on to have four children, Brian, Kay, Gail and Rodney (now deceased), as well as 12 grandchildren, 25 great-grandchildren and eight great-great grandchildren.

During the Second World War, Maisie worked at the meatworks at Lakes Creek, packing meat and bacon into cans that went on to be sent to the soldiers.

In later years, she fondly remembers holidaying with Ron and their friends at the Gold Coast, Ballina, north to Townsville and the islands

"It was lovely, but I didn't like the sea, I got seasick," she said.

She played netball and vigoro in her younger years and still has an active social life today

In the early 1980s after her retirement, Maisie was the first woman to join the North Rockhampton Seniors Club at Bauhinia House, North Rockhampton.

When Maisie turned 50 she joined the Bauhinia House Pensioners Club, where she and her late husband played bowls, hoy and enjoyed concerts plus other activities with their friends.

Maisie has served as vice-president of the Pensioners Club for the past five years.

Even more impressive, she only just turned in her car licence earlier this year.

And what's her secret to reaching 100?

tension to the art gallery would be a fantastic addition to the offerings in the Yeppoon CBD.

"We know that the local art is really the beating heart of Yeppoon and having this ex-

panded space where local artists can come together and run workshops for local people and tourists will be fantastic for our growing art community," she said.

"There's a huge opportunity in arts tourism and people will be coming from all over Queensland and Australia to experience and be part of workshops here with our local artists who are so incredibly talented."

Brian Griffin, managing director of Griffin Builders said it was great to see investment from the state government and the Livingstone Shire Council into the local arts scene.

"My children have spent a lot of time in the arts through school and they worked in this project as well. The arts play a big part in the community as do sport and other activities."

Design+Archicture director Colin Strydom said beyond simply being an art gallery and an exhibition building, the gallery's design reflected elements of the town's history including the old beach huts and Morse code.

The expansion and upgrades to the former Mill Gallery were made possible after Livingstone Shire Council received \$250,000 in funding through Round 4 of the Queensland Government's Building our Regions (BoR) programme.

The project is also supported by \$850,000 from Livingstone Shire Council, bringing the total funding to \$1.1 million.

The gallery is expected to support up to 50 local artists by providing a contemporary display space for exhibitions and the opportunity to commercialise their work.



New study in the pipeline

A new pipeline feasibility study announced by the state government could potentially transform Central Queensland's Bowen Basin into a major gas-producing region.

Already renowned as one of the world's richest sources of coal, new gas infrastructure could unlock the basin's significant gas reserves and add a new source of economic growth and development to power the region well into the future.

Natural gas is a potent energy source used across a range of sectors, including electricity generation for residential consumers and manufacturing and industrial production.

The study, which will take some 12 months to complete, will analyse the feasibility of connecting the basin's gas reserves to East Coast consumers and exporters via a 500km pipeline.

Resources Minister Scott Stewart said the \$5 million gas infrastructure study could lead to the opening up of the Bowen Basin as Queensland's next gas frontier.

"Just like we opened up the Surat Basin 10 years ago and developed a \$70 billion onshore gas industry, the Bowen Basin has the potential to be a source of future gas projects and jobs for Queenslanders." Mr Stewart said.

"My department has been on the ground engaging with the gas sector to scope the study and ensure it will meet their needs to help them with their future investment decisions."

If the pipeline goes ahead, some 1000 construction jobs could be required to build the new infrastructure, and Mr Stewart said countless other opportunities would flow on in gas production and other industries which rely on affordable sources of gas.

"Like all resource projects in Queensland, the study will look at the feasibility of the gas infrastructure stacking up financially and provide a high-level guide on technical, environmental and other challenges which may

"My department has been on the ground impact timelines and construction costs," he gaging with the gas sector to scope the study said.

The group tasked with conducting the study has not yet been announced.

The pipeline study comes amid a broader push by the government to ramp up resources exploration across the state. The 2020-2021 budget announced on December 1 allocated some \$29 million to exploration grants.

"The resources sector played a key role in keeping the Queensland economy running throughout the Covid-19 pandemic, and with the Queensland government's support it will continue to lead the way as we embark on our road to recovery," Mr Stewart said.

Depot Hill State School is in Marilyn Tynan's blood

For Marilyn Tynan, Depot Hill State School is more than just a place to work, it's an important part of her life.

On Wednesday, December 9, the last day of school for 2020, Marilyn was named the first life member of the school's P&C.

Marilyn worked as a cleaner at the school before retiring earlier this year and still runs the school's Lunchbox Club.

But her history with the school goes back in a lot longer than that.

Born in Campbell Street, Depot Hill, Marilyn started at the school as a student in 1952, following in the footsteps of her parents who both went to school there.

She remembers having a great time at Depot Hill, playing crico (women's cricket), hockey and basketball.

"Things have changed a lot over the years, a lot of the families that were originally here are no longer here, and there was only one building back then, with an open verandah at the front," she said.

She returned to the school as a cleaner after working for 20 years at Glenmore State School, but had to retire in October after having a new pacemaker put in.

But she's still active with the Lunchbox Club and Smith Family as well as as a member of the P&C.

"Depot Hill State School is a part of me, I've been here so long," she said.

"It's a wonderful school with wonderful teachers and (principal) Elizabeth works so

Marilyn's niece is now also a cleaner at the school and both of her children were students there.

Depot Hill State School principal Elizabeth Jacobson said Marilyn had played an integral role in the life of Depot Hill for many years as a student, parent, P&C committee member and employee.

Smell going

QAL has commissioned a new \$3.3 million thermal oxidiser that will boost the plant's odour reduction capabilities.

The new thermal oxidiser, which is a large burner that destroys odorous gases, can process four times more gas than the previous 15-vear-old unit. It travelled from Melbourne broken up on to three trucks and weighs a total of 21 tonnes

What makes it more efficient than the old burner is that it can burn at up to 950 degrees and has four times the capacity of the previous unit. QAL (Queensland Alumina Limited) general manager Pine Pienaar said thermal oxidisers are one of the few readily available technologies for alumina refineries to combat

"The beauty of this project is that it is proven technology, and now we have a bigger and better version," Mr Pienaar said.

"To put it in simple terms, you could compare the thermal oxidiser to a giant Bunsen

We capture and send odorous gases into the gas burning chamber and the flame burns it, effectively destroying the smell.'

On top of the thermal oxidiser, QAL is investing millions of dollars and a dedicated research and development team with specialist skills into never-before-done studies and projects to reduce other sources of plant odour.

In one example last year, QAL completed a plant trial with non-thermal plasma technology, which delivered 90 per cent odour destruction from the odorous bad wash water tank. QAL's owners have now approved fitout of the bad wash water tank with this technology, at an estimated cost of \$1.5 million, with expected completion by the end of 2021.

The research and development team are now working on projects to use the thermal oxidiser to destroy more of the plant's odours.

"At the digestion relief tanks, where roughly one third of the plant's odour comes from, we are trialling two separate technologies that will allow more odorous gases to be sent to the thermal oxidiser for destruction," Mr

When the organics within the bauxite meet the high temperatures of 250 degrees Celsius and are mixed with caustic soda, an odour is formed. While not harmful, this odour is not pleasant and can often impact the neighbouring community.

The old thermal oxidiser will remain available for when the new unit is being main-

What do the rich and famous do when they don't want to sail their own boat across the other side of the world?

Well, they hitch a ride with Big Lift.

Seen here at Gladstone Harbour, Big Lift is globally renowned as the company you call when you must get something excessively big, across the ocean in one piece.

Yachts and lavish luxury cruisers have been gently lifted out of the water aboard the mammoth ship for safe passage to other harbours across the globe.

When the Volvo Ocean Race had to be shipped with minimum delay, they were handled and shipped with their masts up, which made them very fragile and extremely high - their total height was 37 metres.

When a 52 metre and 640mt minesweeper had to be transported from Italy to the Baltic Sea, Big Lift got the call to come to the aid of this fibreglass navy vessel.

Tied up in Gladstone Harbour, it was a floating home for large sailing craft masts intact, motor yachts and live aboard cruising yachts that only a few in the world could call their pleasure craft.

RFDS to invest in Central Queensland aerodromes

The Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS) will invest \$325,000 to enhance the capability of 36 regional aerodromes across the state, including several airstrips in Central Queensland.

The funding has been made possible by the RFDS Foundation, which was established 18 months ago to manage invested funds and bequests received by the service.

Clermont, Dysart, Moura and Aramac are some of the CQ towns marked out for aerodrome upgrades.

"The initial allocation of funding towards aerodrome upgrades forms part of a long-term strategy to upgrade aviation capability at regional aerodromes to better support rural, regional and remote communities," RFDS (Queensland Section) Chairman Russell Postle said.

Altogether, the \$325,000 will be split across 36 aerodromes spread throughout the state.

The funding streams are broken into three categories, namely registration, safety, and registration and safety.

Aerodromes marked out for registration will receive \$10,000 in funding, while those

marked out for safety will receive \$5000. Those listed for both registration and safety upgrades will receive \$15,000.

Before an aerodrome is registered, a survey must first be completed. An airport reporting officer is appointed to perform runway checks for animals, ensure that there are no obstacles within the limits of the airstrip, and make sure that an airstrip is properly maintained.

Safety proposals are made to the Civil Aviation Safety Authority (CASA), and based on CASA assessments, only certain aircraft can land at certain airstrips.

The RFDS currently has two types of aircraft in operation, the B200 and the B350. With safety upgrades and CASA approval, it is hoped that both of these aircraft can land at specified aerodromes throughout the state.

Mr Postle said the RFDS was investing in this work to better service the communities which the aerodromes support.

"The upgraded aerodromes will also deliver flow on benefits, allowing for broader tourism, business and trade opportunities. We are happy to help both council and government improve regional airstrips in Oueensland," he said.

Surf club gets a new look

A lot is going down at Emu Park Surf Life Saving Club - including the old equipment shed.

Last week the club saw the demolition of their outdated equipment storage facility which is adjoined to the clubhouse.

It was a long time coming for the Emu Park club which had been saving for over 10 years to complete renovations.

The money saved was boosted by a \$1 million Active Communities Infrastructure Grant from the state government and a \$20,000 grant from the federal government.

The now demolished site will take approximately five months to rebuild, meaning it is likely to be completed around May 2021.

Emu Park SLSC Senior and Junior Sports Coordinator Michelle McRae said it was vital to have the renovations.

"It's in two stages, the first was just painting the part of the clubhouse which houses the canteen, floor rooms and the training rooms upstairs," she said.

"The other day was the demolition, knocking down the old gear shed and the amenities

"The money that we received for it is mainly from the state government, which was about a million dollars, and the rest of the money was saved up by us.

"When it's all finished we will have fit-forpurpose facilities, the old shed was at the end of its life.

"It's an old concrete building and the old reinforcing had all rusted away - so bits of the roof was falling down and water was getting into electrical compartments.

"By completely knocking it down and rebuilding it from scratch we're able to install the future."

purpose-built storage for the patrolling equipment and surf sports equipment.

"We've been running pretty light on in terms of the ratio of toilets and showers for the number of women we have in the club.

"And this new building means we're going to get a few extras, and on a nippers day especially there won't be such a line up for the toilets."

The clubhouse won't be the only new, shiny toy at the Emu Park SLSC. The club has been able to get a hold of a brand new surf lifesaving buggy.

The buggy helps lifesavers on patrol and this new addition will make life a little easier for our patrollers.

"That was bought through another grant the - Queensland Fire and Emergency Services Lifesaving Development Fund Sustainability and Extension of Services Grant - so we received a majority of the funding through that and had to top it up with funding of our own," Ms McRae said.

"The idea is that this (buggy) has a slightly longer tray deck, which means we should be able to take down and back up to the beach our patrolling signs.

"Whereas at the moment, we are having to manhandle from the gear shed down.

"It's a bit of a safety improvement for our patrolling people.

"And also things made of metal don't last

too long on the beachfront, so we only get about three or four years out of each one.

"We bought it from the local store Rosen-

berg Powersports in Rockhampton and we've entered a servicing agreement with those guys.

"So they're going to support us throughout the future."

This, coupled with psychology, seems to have sparked my interest in understanding the criminal mind and the structure and systems in place that try to reduce and rehabilitate or sometimes enable or promote," he said.

The 24-year-old graduated with a Bachelor of Psychological Science on December 8.

"My overall interest in psychology and by extension, criminology comes from two things. Firstly, I think the capabilities of the mind have interested me for a long time, in understanding how or why people act in certain ways and how those actions can differ based on other factors," Tyrone said.

"Once I complete the postgraduate degree, I hope to either be working with the Australian Federal Police or ASIO."





Nine in race for mayor

At least nine people have thrown their hat in the ring for the Rockhampton Regional Council mayoral by-election in January.

Those in the running include Dominic Doblo, Nyree Johnson, Chris Davies, Christian Sheppard, Donna Kirkland, Tony Williams, Miranda Broadbent, Russell Claus and Chris Hooper.

Acting mayor Neil Fisher is not running for the mayoral position, citing family and health reasons.

Mayor Margaret Strelow resigned on Mon-

day October 9 after a tribunal found she had engaged in misconduct by failing to update her register of interests to include hospitality received from mining company Adani, now Bravus. She has refuted the finding.

Under new local government rules, the mayoralty would have passed to Chris Hooper, the only other candidate from the March election

But the state government moved quickly to introduce and pass a bill to retrospectively amend the Local Government Act, allowing mayoral or councillor positions to be filled through a by-election which will be held on Saturday, January 23.

Candidate nominations opened on Friday, December 11 and close at noon on Monday, December 21.

State Keppel MP Brittany Lauga has thrown her support behind candidate Nyree Johnson.

"Nyree Johnson is a small business owner, community advocate and Rocky local who I'd be delighted to work with if she is elected Mayor of Rockhampton," she said.

Federal Member for Capricornia Michelle Landry said she would not be supporting a candidate in the Rockhampton Regional Council mayoral by-election.

"As the federal member for the area, I work with all levels of government along with a variety of stakeholders to deliver for the Central Queensland and I will work constructively with the winner of the mayoral election," she said.

"I believe mayoral elections should be free of any state government or federal government interference. I wish all of the mayoral candidates the best of luck in their campaigns."

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Firies taking to the skies

Queensland Fire and Emergency Services personnel are taking the skies through the use of sophisticated drones.

Central Region QFES personnel including representatives from the SES, Fire and Rescue and Rural Fire Service undertook their Remotely Piloted Aircraft System (RPAS) course at Yeppoon last week.

Rural Fire Service Inspector for QFES Rockhampton, Chris Spencer said drones had already been used by QFES for "a number of years" in south-east Queensland.

"RPAS systems are going to be rolled out slowly across the regions and our capability will increase the more experience that our pilots get over time," he said.

"The RPAS course is very intensive, seven days in total and what that will give us eventually is a pilot's licence to be able to fly drones commercially but also undertake safe operations for QFES as well in times of need."

Drones will be used in a variety of capacities including bushfire scenarios, reconnaissance in remote areas, land searches and eventually, swiftwater rescue.

"Drones can be used to detect any hotspots to make sure our crews are aware of where to direct water in a fire," Mr Spencer said.

"In terms of floods and cyclones, it gives us the capability to make real life damage assessments throughout the state so we know what we're dealing with and can respond with the appropriate equipment and personnel to assist those communities in need on a very short time notice.

"We've already bought our drones and one, the Mavic Enterprise, has forward looking infrared as well as searchlights and a one-way speaker."

Mr Spencer said while only seven personnel took part in the initial course, that capacity would quickly grow by the time the RPAS systems were rolled out mid next year.

"We have a number of volunteers, Fire and Rescue personnel and staff that have their pilots licence for drones that they've gotten privately and that means we can harness that licensing be able to do a QFES induction and make sure that they're flying safely and use those people to extend our capability in the future.

"Drones are just another item to use in our arsenal. And they won't just be a QFES asset, we'll also be able to assist organisations like the Queensland Police Service with things like visual inspections, scenes of crime assistance and aerial footage at high impact vehicle accidents

"We're opening that invitation to all other agencies."

Chief remote pilot for UAV Training Australia, Wayne Condon, said civil aviation safety requirements meant the seven-day RPAS course was quite extensive.

"Everyone that we've trained with QFES are great candidates that come into the training with open eyes and realise there's a lot more to it than flying a drone," he said.

"The pilots will undergo training in meteorology, human factors, navigation and a lot of avionics in relation to autonomous flight even before they get to the actual drones themselves.

"In addition to artificial intelligence, QFES members will have to understand flight planning, how to read weather patterns and how to

communicate with the air traffic control and other aircraft during emergency situations."

Mr Condon said drone technology had grown extensively in recent years.

"Some of the platforms that we had 12 months ago are now redundant because of the systems that have been upgraded," he said.

"One of the drones that our organisation currently flies for another agency has a radiometric thermal camera, 200-time zoom, optic camera and digital range finder.

"Applying it to fire operations, this means we can pick up a temperature from minus 150 degrees to 1000 degrees and using a laser we can map and chart an area out to 1.5km down to 0.2 of a centimetre of error."

Drones are now used in a variety of fields including search and rescue, public safety, environmental health, disaster management, food delivery systems, medical supplies, biomedical science, marine science and defence.

"It's a rapidly growing field and artificial intelligence which is now being built into the drones makes it a lot easier for pilots to fly these platforms," Mr Condon said.

And licensing is only the beginning for remote pilots.

"After the initial licensing you go into different categories, QFES are currently flying a 7kg platform but you can go up to a 25kg platform, a 50kg platform and 150kg platform. For perspective, a 50kg platform is the size of a motor vehicle

"And then there's night operations training and beyond line of sight flying, which allows you to fly at height levels of 10,000-feet plus."

Mr Condon said QFES was just one of several government agencies and businesses that had introduced drone technology.

"Queensland Parks and Wildlife have also introduced drones and St Brendan's College at

Yeppoon has introduced it into the curriculum next year so it's a platform that's actually growing quite rapidly," he said.

"The more the agencies like QFES embrace

drone technology, the more benefit it will be to them, from predicting the patterns and movements of the fires to determining the moisture content in the ground."

Mandatory fuel price reporting policy is now in effect

Central Queenslanders will get a sharper picture of prices at the pump with the rollout of the state government's new mandatory fuel price reporting policy.

Service stations across the state are now obligated to report prices at each half hour interval and feed the data into a centralised database

The information is then transmitted to a suite of mobile phone apps. The apps show and compare the different prices on offer at each service station, and in this way mo-

torists can see which station offers them the lowest price at any given moment and choose where to fill up accordingly.

State Energy Minister Mick de Brenni said the Palaszczuk government was delivering permanent fuel price reporting to save Queenslanders money as part of its economic recovery plan.

"At the touch of a button drivers can download an app to search for the cheapest fuel from the state's over 1550 servos reporting their prices, and it's here to stay," he said.

Some of the apps that track prices include ServoTrack, MotorMouth, Petrol Spy and FuelMap, all downloadable via GooglePlay and the Apple AppStore.

The implementation of the new policy comes after an extensive trial period conducted by Griffith University, the results of which were released in a report in August.

The report found evidence of 'a statistically significant increase in the spread of prices (price dispersion) in a majority of investigated LGAs (Local Government Areas).

A rise in the spread of prices increases the potential savings for motorists actively seek-

ing lower prices.'

Motorists in Rockhampton, for example,

could save up to \$36 per annum through the new policy.

In southeast Queensland, the savings are even greater and collectively Queensland consumers are expected to save millions of dollars over time from the new reporting regime.

Mr de Brenni said the new policy delivered certainty for Queenslanders.

"In time for Christmas break, we're giving families certainty that wherever in Queensland they are planning to go this summer, they can hit the road knowing the best place to fill up." he said.

Woman over 'ruff' justice

A Frenchville woman has accused Rockhampton Regional Council of placing pets before people after putting up with nuisance dogs for almost three years.

The woman, who lives in Duthie Street, said her health had been affected by her neighbour's dogs' constant barking and fighting at all hours, which had only gotten worse over the years.

"Council says I can keep putting in complaints but they can't act until they get a second complaint," she said.

But the resident said one direct neighbour had been away for two years, and two other neighbours didn't live there full-time.

"I've supplied the council with handwritten dates and times, as well as a doctor's letter about the effect the barking, howling and dog fighting has had on me. I've sent an official letter to Evan Pardon, the CEO," she said.

"They tell me it is not enough. I have also been told to run for councillor ... I might have to, to get them to change those laws."

The Duthie Street resident said she felt the current laws about nuisance dogs were ineffective and put the barking dog before human beings.

"The cause in my case is irresponsible owners, and the lengths you have to go to get something done are ridiculous, as I do suffer chronic injuries.

"There must be laws put in place for 'excessive barking noise and nuisance dogs'. I feel like I've been thrown in the too hard basket and keep telling them they've really got to look at it as it's driving me mental."

She said she had been contacted by people living in the Houlihan Street, Frenchville Road and Musgrave Street areas with similar complaints about excessive barking, day and night.

"A number of people who try to walk their dogs have reported almost being pulled into the road and nearly being pulled flat on the ground, by trying to walk past an untrained dog," she said.

Rockhampton Regional Council Planning and Regulatory Councillor Ellen Smith said council officers had investigated all complaints and worked with the complainant.

"However after conducting surveys of the neighbourhood and reviewing video footage provided there just isn't enough evidence to suggest that these dogs are a nuisance," she said.

"Without evidence or support from another person in the neighbourhood officers really aren't able to take any action, so I would urge the complainant to encourage those who have reached out to her to get in touch with council.

"Council officers deal with many noise nuisances each year and work tirelessly ensuring the appropriate level of investigation and response is carried out after every complaint that is received."

Water and Supporting a Better Environment Councillor Donna Kirkland said she was thrilled with the results.

"The Environmental Sustainability - Water category recognises leadership and innovation in water conservation and management for the future, so it is fantastic to be recognised for the work we're doing," she said.

"The Fitzroy River estuary is a vitally important waterway that supports an abundance of aquatic wildlife and provides significant recreational value to the local community, and the upgrades Council and Fitzroy River Water have implemented have delivered more than a 20% reduction in nitrogen released to the Fitzroy

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A major boost to conservation in CQ

The Fitzroy Basin Association (FBA), a non-profit natural resources management group, has been allocated \$4 million from the federal government's Reef Trust to pursue a number of innovative conservation projects around the Central Queensland region.

The multifaceted project will run until June 2023 and will be geared towards improving the resilience of the region's high-value coastal ecosystems. Much of the funding will be directed towards preserving wetlands ecosystems, which are resource-rich and directly impact the health of the Great Barrier Reef, one of Australia's great natural wonders.

Cassandra Tracey, senior project officer at FBA, said her organisation was well-placed to coordinate the implementation of this important program with over 23 years of experience delivering projects designed to protect the region's natural assets.

"We know exactly what issues need to be addressed," she said.

The program itself will be implemented by a number of different stakeholders, pursuing a varied range of activities to improve coastal ecosystems. A specialist eight-member team from the FBA will coordinate and monitor the work of the stakeholders.

Specifically, the project will seek to reduce and roll back threats to the health and proper functioning of coastal ecosystems.

Firstly, stakeholders will engage in marine debris collection and analyse collected debris to determine the source of the waste. It is hoped that once the source is identified, stakeholders can act to stop or reduce the flow of debris into marine ecosystems.

Secondly, the FBA will work with private landholders, defence personnel and regional councils to instigate feral animal and weed control practices.

Thirdly, an erosion control project based around the lower Fitzroy catchment area will seek to reduce run-off from a private property infiltrating nearby wetlands and by extension, the Great Barrier Reef.

Fourth, the project will see the installation of six fishway passages across different waterways. The fishways will work to decrease water velocity and secure the natural migration of fish upstream.

In addition to reducing these specific threats, the FBA will use the funding to host the Shoalwater and Corio Bays Area Ramsar Management Advisory Group and engage with the Darumbal and Woppaburra people to determine what aspirations they have for their land. The Darumbal people are the traditional custodians of the Rockhampton and Capricorn Coast areas and the Woppaburra people are the traditional custodians of the Keppel Islands.

Though the project has just been announced, the work has already begun. On December 2, three volunteers with Team Turtle CQ, a volunteer enterprise that monitors turtle nests and tracks, boarded a helicopter and completed an aerial survey of the entire coastline from Farnborough Beach in Yep-

poon to Stanage Bay.

The volunteers searched for turtle tracks, which to a trained eye reveals the species of turtle, and over 140 tracks were observed during the flight.

"The survey shows which parts of the coast might be more significant in terms of marine turtle nesting than others, and we can use that data to try and reduce threats on the ground to turtle nests," Ms Tracey said.

Feral animals hunt for turtle nests, and by determining which parts of the coastline are populated by turtles, stakeholders can implement more targeted feral animal control programs, and in so doing improve conditions more effectively for turtles across the region.

Special Envoy for the Great Barrier Reef Warren Entsch praised the project.

"This is about working with people and backing local communities and the result will be cleaner beaches, thriving habitats, healthier coastal ecosystems and species, and a more resilient Great Barrier Reef," Mr Entsch said.

McEwen sets an example

There have been too many statues torn down this year.

So it was good to finish 2020 by unveiling a new statue of John 'Black Jack' McEwen in Canberra last week.

As Marc Antony said in Shakespeare's Julius Caesar, "The evil that men do lives after them. The good is oft interred with their bones."

A statue helps preserve the good that a man or a woman has done. It does not mean that they did no evil. But a statue does serve as a physical reminder of the good someone has done. It serves as an example for us all to strive to do better in an imperfect world.

The good that has been done by leaders past also helps us deal with present challenges. John McEwen's example is a tutorial for us all on how to deal with a world beset with difficulty.

John was from a poor family. He saved money to buy a soldier settler block post World War I. He survived by eating the rabbits on his new property so he could put everything else in to developing his own block.

He rose to prominence representing farmers in rural Victoria, eventually being elected to parliament to represent them as a Country Party MP. He went on to serve in the War Cabinet during World War II, served as Trade Minister for over 15 years and as leader of the

Country Party for 12 years. He became Prime Minister for a short period after the death of Harold Holt.

As veteran journalist Laurie Oakes said of McEwen a few years ago, "He is one of the few people I've met in 50 years in journalism who I think deserves the description 'great'."

What made McEwen great was his determination to build up what he called the "wealth producing industries" of farming, mining and manufacturing. To do this he bravely pursued trade deals with Asian countries and passionately fought for government assistance to help Australian farmers and industry compete in a global environment.

Working with one of Australia's best economists, Sir John Crawford, McEwen could see that our traditional trade partner of Great Britain was becoming closer to Europe than its former colonies. So, as he put it, we needed to find another nation off the coast of a major continent hungry for natural resources. Japan fit the bill and McEwen staked his political career on finalising a trade deal with Japan just 12 years after the end of World War II.

As our now major trading partner in China threatens to cut off trade, we need McEwen's leadership again to strike new trading relationships.


John McEwen has been heavily criticised in recent years for his adoption of "protection all around" policies. He supported tariffs to protect Australian manufacturing jobs and floor prices to help Aussie farmers survive. McEwen's policies helped deliver a massive surge in Australian manufacturing of steel, cars and food products.

Much of McEwen's legacy has been dismantled in the push to free trade over the past 40 years.

But as a new book released this week by my National party colleague, Bridget McKenzie, argues we are all McEwenists now. The pandemic has highlighted the peril in relying too much on overseas manufacturing. We need to study McEwen's legacy to learn what we must do to fix this vulnerability and rebuild Australian manufacturing again.

Bridget's book and the McEwen statue have been released to mark 100 years since the Country Party (now the Nationals party) was formed. The Nationals party is the second longest serving political party (after Labor) in Australia. But its message of support for the industries that are the backbone of our great country is needed more than ever.

At the base of McEwen's new statue there is a mural representing all the industries he supported in his career. We need to once again steadfastly support these sectors so we can lay a strong foundation for an Australia that grows in strength through challenging times.

Notorious by name only

If you've been at the Gladstone Marina, you will have seen what seems the evil outlines of an ancient pirate ship that looks like it should be rigged with a skull and crossbones flag.

'Notorious', a full-size, wooden, sailing recreation of a Portuguese caravel, was researched, designed and constructed single-handedly from salvaged Monterey cypress by amateur boatbuilder Graeme Wylie at Bushfield, Victoria, Australia.

The ship travels up and down the eastern seaboard as a floating museum, visiting ports and thrilling the tourists and ship loving public wherever it ties up. In Gladstone for a couple of weeks, it's a must to go and see.

Notorious is the only sailing caravel in the

Southern Hemisphere, Australia's earliest ship construction and the country's only lateen-rigged ship.

Although it gives the impression of being an evil pirate launch, they were in fact not popular with pirates because they were small and only lightly armed caravels were a revolutionary design in ship evolution because they were small and highly manoeuvrable, perfect for exploration. These ships were rigged with the lateen sails highly versatile and easily managed sail arrangement and allowing a degree of sailing into the wind.

Easy to sail with a small crew, they were also sometimes fitted out with cannons as warship with some degree of success because they were able to manoeuvre quickly and were able to sail into the wind with some success.

5-Year Environment Strategy





For over 53 years Queensland Alumina Limited (QAL) has been producing alumina in Gladstone as one of the largest employers, generating billions of dollars of value for the Queensland economy.

While we have been steadily improving our environmental performance, we realise that to continue our legacy we need to be generating better environmental outcomes.

In 2018 we committed to a 5-Year Environment Strategy (5YES) comprised of over 60 capital improvement projects and organisational culture change initiatives. The capital projects were developed to reduce short and long-term environmental risks in the areas of:

- Air quality (dust, odour and alkali) emission and risk reduction
- Water reduce the level of impact to waterways
- Land reduce contamination to land
- · Noise engineering solutions to reduce noise.

2 years into the strategy we have completed over a third of the projects. Many are in the study or engineering phases with dozens more generating employment for locals through construction.

We initially estimated the investment to be up to \$260 million. Now that most of the 60 projects have been fully defined the program is estimated to see

Divorces and properties



You don't need to process a formal divorce through the courts before you can commence a property settlement. As a result, many people sort out their property affairs first without finalising their divorce as well.

This can have disastrous consequences as the law does not regard a marriage as ended until the divorce is formally granted.

So even though you may have affected a full property settlement and transferred assets and or cash to your spouse, you are still legally married until the divorce order is finalised.

This can have a dramatic effect where you have an old will that leaves your assets to your husband or wife even though you may have been apart for years.

Any gifts in that will to your estranged husband or wife will still be valid in the event of your death. This is the case even though you have already distributed matrimonial property in a prior settlement.

It is important to double check that you have properly processed your divorce through the court system.

In most cases, the divorce order takes effect one month and one day after the divorce is granted.

Another area where the failure to finalise your affairs can be troublesome is with subsequent marriages. Following a separation many people eventually remarry. For some it happens quickly, whilst for others it maybe years later.

The wedding plans can come to an abrupt

halt when one party finds out that their earlier divorce was never finalised, and they are still legally married.

If you're are intending to re-marry make sure as a starting point that you are actually divorced.

You should not make plans to marry on a particular date unless this fact has been established.

If you wish to make wedding plans before your divorce is finalised, you must lodge with an authorised celebrant a 'Notice of Intended Marriage' under the Marriage Act. This must

be done at least one month before the date that the marriage is to be solemnised.

The only ground for a divorce to be granted in Australia is that the marriage has broken down irretrievably and there is no reasonable likelihood of reconciliation between you and your spouse.

To apply to the Court for a divorce, you must have been separated from your spouse for at least 12 months.

Under family law, spouses are separated if at least one party has formed the intention to separate, has acted on that intention and has communicated this to the other party. This is so even if the other spouse misunderstands or ignores the communication.

The Biloela Hay Drop.

Hay delivered to farmers

Rural Aid delivered 360 bales of hay to 24 farmers in a morning hay drop at the Biloela Showgrounds on December 15.

Equivalent to five road trains in terms of volume, the hay will help to prop up the long-suffering Central Queensland farmers struggling through a protracted drought.

The hay each farmer received was determined by stock numbers.

"The more animals a farmer has, the more assistance we can give them," said Kathyrn Sloan, the administration and disaster assistant for Rural Aid.

The hay drop featured a complimentary

morning tea sponsored by Bushells, one of Rural Aid's corporate sponsors.

Along with the farmers and representatives from Rural Aid, a collection of local dignitaries were in attendance for the event, including the Mayor of Banana Shire Nev Ferrier, Show Society President Tanya Belousof and representatives from rural financial services firms.

The Biloela hay drop is just one of many such activities conducted by Rural Aid since its inception as a private, non-profit organisation in 2015. In the last few weeks, hay drops have taken place in Monto, Gayndah and Alpha. Next week, Rural Aid will conduct a hay drop in Longreach.

For the entire year, Rural Aid has delivered 22,000 bales of hay and assisted some 3300 farmers across Australia.

Rural Aid's ability to assist farmers doing it tough comes directly from the generosity of the Australian people. Rural Aid does not receive government funding and relies entirely on donations from the public and corporate sponsors to finance its various assistance programs. Alongside hay drops, Rural Aid offers farmers counselling services and financial assistance

Nearly 70 per cent of Queensland continues to suffer from drought, and the Banana Shire has been particularly hard hit.

"Farms in this pocket of Queensland have had a spot of sporadic rain here and there, but make no mistake, they're doing it tough," CEO of Rural Aid John Warlters explained.

"It's a region that has experienced prolonged drought conditions and the longer they drag on, the more devastating the impact financially, socially, psychologically," he said.

Looking to the future, Ms Sloan predicts that conditions will remain difficult for some time to come.

"I think the drought's going to keep going. People are still doing it tough out there, and without the rain, people are going to suffer," she said.

How the popularity of MGs grew in the US after the war

In my last article, the MG was somewhat covered from its inception to the period just before WWII broke out in Europe and the popularity of the Marque in England especially.

MG had produced a car containing just about every initial of the alphabet by now and in 1935, perhaps the series of models most endeared to this date, the TA Midget was introduced and was the first of series that lasted until the TF of 1954, excluding a six year break during WWII.

It was succeeded by the TB which was short lived because during WWII the Abingdon factory was commandeered by the authorities to help with the war effort.

During this time, the factory was first used to repair tanks and then aeroplane fuselages. Through all this, Cecil Kimber, the founder of the MG Car Company which was now part of the Nuffield group, had a falling out with Lord Nuffield over war contracts and so lord Nuffield sacked him.

As people like Kimber were in high demand at that time, he soon picked up another job but it meant travelling away mostly by train as severe petrol rationing was in place.

It was on one of these train trips that the train he was traveling on had an accident and 25 passengers were injured and there were also two fatalities, one of whom was Cecil

WWII was raging and it meant that there were a lot of American soldiers in England who not only loved the English girls but also

the MG TAs and the TBs, and so on the completion of their war service many took their MGs home with them.

This started a trend which meant that strong demand for MGs was invoked in America, so shortly the MG factory was again in full production introducing the TC, TD

and finally the TF Midgets mainly for the $\mbox{\sc American market}.$

The TF was the last of the so called square riggers and was produced up until 1955 when it was replaced by the MGA which basically shared many of the TD and TF mechanicals like the suspension and brakes at first but was fitted with a BMC B series 1500 engine,

(Nuffield Group became BMC in 1952) and a matching four-speed gearbox and an alloy cased differential. Around this time the Magnette was introduced, a stylish four-door sedan, using the MGA running gear.

The MGA stayed in production until 1963 having many model and mechanical changes on the way like engine upgrades to 1600,1622, 1600 twin-cam and brakes going to front disc brakes on the 1600- and 4-wheel discs on the twin cam and deluxe models, there were even coupe versions.

Initially MGA's were imported as an assembled car but soon they were bought to Australia as CKD (completely knocked down) kits and assembled by BMC Australia in Zetland Sydney.

As with most MGs, the MGA and the Magnette particularly are sought after by enthusiasts today as there are still quite few around and parts are very easy to acquire. To be continued.

Spectacular desert roses

It has been a while since gardens have had to face a heatwave like we have had over the last few weeks

With temperatures reaching in the high 30s, many plants will struggle to stay alive, many will wilt but there are some that will not even be effected.

That is the case with a plant called the desert rose or Adenium obesium. Last Friday while attending some meetings in Emerald, I could not help but notice the spectacular display of desert roses growing in the gardens of Emerald's Maraboon Tavern. The display was so good I had to drive by a second time.

Flower colours can range from pale pink to deep crimson and white with various shades of yellow in the throat. Over the last few years, dozens of double and triple flowering hybrids have become available to gardeners in many colour combinations.

The desert rose is very drought and heat tolerant and perfect to grow against a hot sunny wall. Ideal growing conditions require full sun and rich, well-drained soil.

While this plant is very waterwise, plants will still need some watering. For the best result, water either early morning or late afternoon. It is recommended to avoid watering the foliage during the cooler months to prevent fungal diseases.

In ideal growing conditions, the desert rose could grow to about two metres high but the shrub will more likely grow no more than about 1.5 metres high branching into multiple stems as the plant ages.

The desert rose or Adenium are waterwise plants native to sun-drenched rock outcrops of Africa and the Middle East, so a few hot days will never bother this plant. It is important to remember that the desert rose has a milky sap like Alamandas, Oleanders and Frangipanis, so care is always required.

If you have a desert rose that needs to be pruned, now is perfect as there is less chance of disease occurring than during the wet months. Pruning will also improve the shape and encourage more branches and flowers.

WATERING POT PLANTS

One of the most constantly asked questions at many nurseries around this time of the year is: "Why is my pot plant dying? I water it every day".

You need to remember that plants grown in pots require far more attention to their watering than the same plant species planted in the garden. The restricted amount of potting mix is an important factor in this requirement. As the roots keep growing forward, no matter where the plant is, only the tip of the roots can absorb water, not the entire root system.

Therefore, a considerable part of the root

structure in the pot is no longer absorbing water, but simply acting like a pipeline carrying the water from the tips of the roots to the stems of the leaves. You will find that it is mainly the roots at the bottom of the pot that carry the tissues active in water absorption, with a small amount near the surface and the sides of the pot also soaking up some water.

To have the water reaching the bottom of the container, it is essential that all of the potting mix be thoroughly wet. If a small amount of water is poured on top of the pots root mass will remain only in the top half of the pot, therefore not reaching the tips of the roots on the bottom.

I would recommend watering until runoff through the bottom holes of the pot is observed.

A more efficient method is soaking the pot in a large tub of water, which will ensure a full wetting of the potting mix, however, this is not always practical.

When you are watering the pot, if you notice that water seems to channel its way through the potting mix quickly without soaking in, this is a sign that it is the time to start repotting the plant. This happens because the organic matter in potting mix slowly decays over time and the water holding capacity is reduced.

As well as this, continual root growth also compresses the potting mix and eventually pushes some of the potting mix over the rim of the container. These factors all reduce the capacity of the plant to obtain enough moisture.

Lab grown meat as cruel as it comes

AgForce Cattle Board president Will Wilson

The label on the front of the packet of CSIRO developed lab grown meat says, "cruelty free, safe, healthy, environmentally friendly".

But I think it's just about the cruellest thing I've seen in a long time.

I read this in the CSIRO's magazine for kids, Double Helix, in an article in their December 2020 edition called: Cultured Meat, the Future of Food?

In it, it stated that "agriculture, especially the meat industry, is a key contributor to climate change".

This simplistic view from Australia's leading scientific research body, in a magazine - for kids. Well, if that isn't propaganda at its finest, I don't know what it is.

It sure isn't scientific. It isn't fact-based. It is a slap in the face of agriculture and puts at risk not only an industry but the lives of families, regions, entire communities that rely on agriculture as well.

The facts are that emissions from cars clog-

ging up city streets stay in the atmosphere far longer than those from cattle do. But imagine the outcry from the automobile industry if the CSIRO started telling children that we shouldn't be driving cars because they're destroying our planet. It wouldn't happen.

Some more facts: last year a study by Oxford Martin School in the UK looked at the long-term climate implications of cultured meat versus meat from cattle and concluded that "because the emissions from the lab are related to the production of energy which is almost entirely made up of carbon dioxide, which persists in the atmosphere for hundreds of years ... over the very long term, the manufacture of lab meat can result in more warming".

The findings went on to say that "... previous studies had tended to look at the various emissions from cattle and converted them all to their carbon dioxide equivalent, but this doesn't give you the full picture as methane and nitrous oxide have different impacts on the climate.

"Per tonne emitted, methane has a much

larger warming impact than carbon dioxide. However (and this is the important part), it only remains in the atmosphere for about 12 years, whereas carbon dioxide persists and accumulates for millennia."

I'm no scientist, I'm a cattle producer, but the facts are out there, in research papers, not in the opinions of blogs and social media, or the countless dotcom websites that report fiction over facts.

By all means eat lab grown food if you want to, and I'll wish you well. But please don't eat it to satisfy a guilty conscience or because you believe cows are the problem.

There is a balance to all things in nature, animal and vegetable. The obsession by some to rid the world of all grazing animals except those that inhabit the wild is a battle to feel good about themselves - to try and undo what humans have been doing for thousands of years: eat meat because we are meat eaters.

If you do your research and listen to the science, not conscience-clearing rhetoric, you'll find plenty of information out there about that too.

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Unstable air across CQ

Last Monday's pressure chart overlaid by the satellite photo shows the affect of the Upper Cold Pool (UCP) over the southeast corner of the state last weekend.

This culminated in 953mm at Upper Springbrook (323mm in a six hour period, over 1000mm in six days). Phenomenal! The Brunswick, Tweed, Wilson, Richmond and Bellingen rivers not just rising but jumping four metres within an hour, causing floods for the local areas to the coast.

Numerous areas from the Sunshine Coast, Gold Coast to the Northern Rivers had flooding in residential areas.


Along the coast, the high tide combined with peak nine-metre waves causing severe coastal erosion. All Gold Coast beaches were closed. Dangerous surf and gale force winds with gusts recorded to 104kmh at Cape Moreton.

There were also reports of tonnes of sand that moved from Byron Bay and adjoining beaches

Last year, it was bushfires and now it's floods. There was enough information out to stop people from driving through flooded creeks and rivers. The good thing was the Fraser Island fire that burnt for eight weeks was helped by the rainfall, which brought it under control.

A spin-off from the UPC triggered a welcome storm at the South Rocky Rotary Club Xmas luncheon about 2pm Sunday. This was the first double figure rainfall since October 22. Luckily it wasn't held as a barbecue. The rain pelted down for 10-15 minutes then eased off by 2.35pm. Gordon at Lamington Street recorded 24mm, Alison at Jessie Street 20mm, Mike at Girls Grammar 18.5mm, and the airport had 11.4mm.

Ian at Laurel Bank got 4mm, Alan at Briggs Street North Rocky recorded 2mm and Rod at



Parkhurst reported 1mm.

I did hear of an unconfirmed report of 80mm near Ridgelands, plus a 40mm report with lightning west of Rocky. The lightning seemed to smoulder and caused a fire on the next day which a farmer had difficulty putting out. This was similar to what started the Dunedoo NSW fire in February 2017 when lightning hit a fence post from a storm. It smouldered for five to seven days then fell over and burnt a paddock, then spread by strong winds, It ended up burning 55,000 hectares, 35 homes and killed 6000 head of livestock, costing the region millions in damages. So farmers, check trees and out buildings after lightning strikes.

Now, sunny skies have afternoon cloud with isolated storms across CQ. On the way to Emu Park at 2pm on Tuesday afternoon, near Nankin, a heavy shower lasted for 5km. It moved to Hedlow Creek late with 14mm. Then another started north west of Rocky, near Alton Downs,

passed near the Gap and crossed the Bruce Highway on the Stanage turn-off. I assume another 10-15mm fell here. I had a reports of 191mm east of Gayndah, 75mm at Consuelo, 51mm at Mirani west of Mackay. Amazing!

FORECAST

The UCP has caused the air to be unstable across CQ. With the moisture from the NE, afternoon cloud convects (or builds) with the heat of the afternoon triggering isolated random thundery showers, like on Tuesday. We could be lucky with a 10-15mm fall and maybe a one-off 20-30mm fall in CQ. Farmers watch the lightning. On Thursday and Friday it should feel hot and sticky with a maximum around 35C, then slowly drop a degree as a ridge helps the sea breeze to reach inland.

This all depends on severe cyclone 'Yasa'. Currently, it is bearing down on Fiji. It's a Category 5 packing gusts over 250kmh, heavy rain (500mm) and a storm surge of three to four

metres. This is five times bigger than Marcia! If I was there I would be leaving and not worrying about any carry bags. It should keep the inland trough west of Emerald if Yasa behaves and travels south in coming days. Or will it take a turn towards Australia? Boaties - be out early and back by lunch. Only the experienced could take the afternoon choppy seas caused by the sea breezes.

A trough develops mid-week about the Central Highlands.

Big question: What will Christmas Day be like? In the north, the monsoon is operating near Darwin. This will advect into the Gulf by early next week, then Cairns on Tuesday with a branch south to Townsville on Wednesday. If the inland trough moves east we are a chance on Thursday/Friday of a late thundery inland. It will be more likely Boxing Day. Again, it all depends on Yasa!

Out in the deep with Dags

Ahhh... December, the month of steamy days, smoother seas (this past few days), and 'lighter' winds, but laced with black storm cells and this week the new moon lunar phase.

This week marked the highest astronomical tide of the year (4.58 metres or nearly 15' in the old scale in Gladstone, but another metre higher in Port Alma at 5.57 metres), I'm led to believe, and I'm only grateful that we weren't on the Sunny or Gold Coast copping that storm as well as the huge tides.

The outlook for this weekend maybe isn't quite as good as earlier in the week, but it certainly won't prevent too many from heading

Fishing the north of the region from Masthead Island north will certainly enjoy the trout, sweetlip and mackerel, which are hanging around the reef fringes and various 'bumps' on the bottom, and those in the south will love the lee of Lamont, and Fitzroy reefs.

Having that smallish high tide in the middle of the night will certainly make the likes of Fitzroy Lagoon very inviting.

Keppel Bay is also one of those places which will excel this weekend, with its excellent mackerel grounds and various bumps on the bottom between GKI and Johnsons Patch.

Those who love fishing Innamincka, Guthrie, and Douglas shoals will just love this weekend, and it's basically the same distance from the Cap Coast as what it is from Gladstone, although the angle of approach from Gladstone this weekend would be better given the ESE predicted wind.

As for the in-shore fishing, it's been noth-

ing short of amazing with excellent bream, flathead, mangrove jack, and summer whiting caught right across the region.

The impoundments always come into their own at this time of the year as it not illegal to target barra, unlike in the salt water system.

Don't say you weren't forewarned about Sweet Dolly's potential, and putting in my two bobs' worth she looks like being something out of the ordinary.

Sweet Dolly won despite almost throwing the race away on Saturday by shying and ducking out.

I read where her jockey Justin Stanley said that only for that he believed Sweet Dolly could have won by five lengths.

Sweet Dolly fetched \$1500 as a weanling and Master Jamie \$10,000 as a yearling - both under the hammer buys at Magic Millions.

That adds-up to \$11,500, but between them now the pair has won a total of \$612,725.

It proves that you don't have to pay six figure amounts to acquire top-class racehorses.

However, it also proves the theory that "luck's worth a fortune".

Let's be fair, programming - given the complexity of the numerous races available - is a most difficult and thankless task.

However, it is apparent that there are flaws in the current system and for the betterment of racing it is to be hoped that these can, at the very least, be addressed for the betterment of all concerned.

"You can please some of the people some of the time; you can please all of the people some of the time, but you can't please all of the people all of the time".

You would swear that was written about the officials that set race programs, and horse

Abraham Lincoln made the quote famous, so maybe he was a race programmer before becoming American President?

WE HAVE had a bit of luck finding future winners from heats of Callaghan Park barrier trials in recent weeks.

I took notice of Jared Wehlow's Sanglier and Adrian Coome's Lynn's Lane winning their 900 metres heats on the grass track last week.

Also, recently I was taken by Kerrod Smyth's Lily Of The Glen, when it finished second in a trial behind Phillip Burke's Fast Song.

Come to think of it, all of those four horses are worth following. See you over at Callaghan Park on Friday.
