Thank you Shane

Touching tributes are flowing throughout the Gladstone community after the passing of Shane Brodie.

The loving man was at the heart of many sporting clubs across the region with hockey, rugby league, cricket and softball all missing Mr Brodie's presence.

Mr Brodie passed away peacefully surrounded by his loving family on Saturday 24 April, 2021, aged 66 years.

His love and compassion for sport, particularly hockey, created memorable moments with junior and senior players alike.

Mr Brodie started playing hockey at the ripe old age of 10, as a goalie for the Gladstone Under 12s representative team.

While heavily involved in Wallaby's Football and Softball, his first sporting passion shone through when he joined Souths Hockey Club, and eventually connected with Meteors Hockey Club.

Mr Brodie and his good friend Michael O'Halloran were important keys to creating the first men's hockey side for the Meteors club.

The Gladstone Hockey Association life member's name is now permanently synonymous with the Meteors after the club named their hall the 'Shane Brodie Community Sports Hall'

And on the weekend just gone, his beloved Meteors struck up an impressive 13-0 victory, a perfect tribute to a man who helped create that same side.

Before that, a couple of days after his passing, Mr Brodie's NRL side, the Brisbane Broncos, took down the Gold Coast Titans in an upset victory.

Mr Brodie's wife, Julie Brodie, said her beloved husband would have been cheering his sides on all the way.

"I think he gave them a push for the win,"
Mrs Brodie said.

"All of the tributes are pretty overwhelming - it's a tribute to him for all the time and effort that he has put into cricket because he coached a lot of junior cricket and junior hockey.

"It was just so lovely to see and he would be so humbled by it.

"Because he just did it for the love of it, he just wanted to give back.

"It's really lovely with all the flowers, the tributes, the food, the cards. It just means so much because we are people who give, we don't take."

Young voice for region

It's been a busy year for Toolooa High School student Brooke Stone, who's juggling her Year 12 studies with her role as Youth Member for

But she wouldn't have it any other way.

Brooke said her role in the Queensland Youth Parliament had been a natural extension of her interests and her love of the Glad-

"I had a good friend who worked for the Member for Gladstone last year who saw my ambitions towards law, economics and politics and encouraged me to apply," she said.

'I thought it would be a really cool, once-ina-lifetime opportunity before I graduated high school to be involved in the political sector with really like-minded people, where I could express my views and develop skills in media, reading, writing and the legal field.

"We had a launch weekend on the school holidays where all 92 members of Youth Parliament travelled to Brisbane for a weekend of recreational activities, listening to guest speakers and sessions on subjects including media, parliament, attire, the legal system and arguing your case.

"After that weekend, the Youth Parliament really went to work."

Brooke is part of the Committee of Justice, Legal Affairs and Corrections, who are currently working on policy to be presented to

"We're working on a bill to raise the age of criminal responsibility from 10 to 14 and upgrading the resources and management of the DV/sexual assault departments in Queensland

"I actually came up with the idea for our policy, which came from QUT criminology research into women's only police stations.

"We decided to expand that and legislate to give the domestic violence and sex crimes departments of police stations a bit of a revamp, especially in rural areas where it's not applicable to put in a whole new police station, although we might look at doing it in the

Brooke said it was incredible to work on actual policy to be presented to the Queensland parliament

"We have to write the policy and talk to the stakeholders and then it has to be passed through the 92 members of Youth Parliament,"

"After that it will be delivered to Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk in the 'real' parliament.

"Your argument has to be really, really strong and the policy has to be realistic.

"Not many people know that our revenge porn laws came from Youth Parliament."

Brooke said she had made many friendships with her fellow Youth Parliamentarians. "There's so many people there who are like

minded," she said. "In high school, as you'd imagine with a

bunch of 17-year-olds, not everyone is super driven and passionate about politics. "Being in that environment where every-

one has that same sort of interests and you can talk to them and argue with them about it, I found was absolutely amazing and rewarding.' Brooke is also planning a Ladies Day in June

for members of her graduating class to raise funds for domestic violence charity Rize Up Australia, was well as helping plan a CQ youth summit in Rockhampton in July.

Outside of Youth Parliament, Brooke is keeping busy with school, Interact and other extracurricular activities.

"I like being busy, it comes down to time management, prioritising and really liking what you're doing," she said.

"I'm doing doing six ATAR subjects at school - I really like all my subjects and my teachers, I really like Youth Parliament and spending hours researching.

"I think being an advocate for my own mental health and taking that self care and checking myself has really been the best thing in maintaining a busy lifestyle that I love and will take with me to adulthood."

Next year Brooke plans on studying Law and Phycology at university.

"I did a summer course in Law and Psychology, mainly focused on child protection, through Harvard University's online university," she said.

"It was challenging but I got a lot out of it and I loved every minute of it."

After university, she's considering her options

"I'm passionate about ligation and clientele advocacy and enjoy research. I'm driven to the criminal and business side of law.

"I like the idea of working with the client in a one on one situation and then going out to a court and using your knowledge and your qualifications to empower, advocate and argue for them.

"I definitely find that really special and re-

Helem Yumba CQ Healing Centre counsellor Bernadette Anderson has seen first-hand the impact of domestic and family violence.

While the team at Helem Yumba work with victims and preparators to promote healing, Ms Anderson said their referral rate was consistently high.

'For Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, there are multiple layers of dysfunction that have built up over a long period of time," she said.

"This is an important issue, it means the survival of our people."

Eulogy for Shane Brodie

Going by Shaney, Brodes and Big Fella, Shane was a big part of all of us, on and off the sporting field, at his workplace out at Callemondah and South Gladstone, and at home with family and friends

Born into a big family of 12 in a small house in Toolooa Street as the 'big April Fool' in 1955 - sisters Joan and Wendy, brothers Jim, Bill and Larry are here in the room with us today.

Shane's understanding of family support started at an early age, discovering the definition of a family network with older brothers and sisters and then a new sister arriving. At a young age experiencing grief with the departure of some of his siblings, and the loss of close relatives. Learning how to love and be loved, all this giving him the stepping stones to his own enriched life.

And an enriched life that certainly was.

After leaving school Shane worked at Barry and Roberts to help his mother pay the bills. He went to Saraji Coal mine to work construction, this allowed him to proudly purchase his first car for cash. On returning to Gladstone he started as a cleaner in the railway and worked his way up over the years to tutor driver. Shane retired from the railway after 36 years in August 2012.

Shane started playing hockey at the ripe old age of 10, as the Singing Goalie for the Gladstone Under 12s Rep team. From there, his love of team sports grew like bougainvillaea - wild, spikey and absolutely EVERYWHERE.

While heavily involved in Wallaby's Football, and Softball he joined Souths Hockey Club in his formative years, and eventually connected with Meteors Hockey Club and a group of dedicated colleagues, in particular Ann Penny, Dot Lacey. Shane and his good friend Michael O'Halloran were very prominent in the forming of the first Meteors men's team. A group of young enthusiastic blokes coupled with a couple of wiser older players.

This connection with Meteors matured and grew creating the basis of what would become a significant portion of Shane's life and the beginning of his Hockey Family. Over time with Meteors he experienced major wins and devastating losses. In the name of sport, he shaved his head multiple times, got tattoos over his body, started grand final traditions such as the 'Smarty Bus' and found a love for

hosting and performing as a Master of Ceremonies.

His first real love, though, was Julie.

In his green XY Ford panel van 'the frog' is where Julie first noticed Shane while watching a movie at The Glen Drive-In with her friends

Julie and Shane actually met for the first time at Cities Hockey Carnival in Bundaberg. Shane first asked Julie out on a date to Paul and Sharen Feehely's wedding. Reportedly he sheepishly asked Julie out and qualified it with "you don't have to come if you don't want to". And up to Shane's normal standard he was late picking her up, had to borrow Ian Smith's car because his car had run out of fuel and then Ian's car ran out of fuel as well. So they went to the wedding in Julie's 'Molly' Mazda. All Julie could say was "I thought you men normally run out of fuel on your way home not when you're picking up your date" and laughed.

Invariably hockey trips away with Shane would be a course of losing wallets, losing car keys or locking the keys in the car. There was always the old coat hanger in my car in the event that Shane had locked his car with the keys in it.

The relationship between Julie and Shane blossomed through their love of sport, 70s rock pop music, VW Beetles and each other. Camping and fishing trips to Facing Island ensued, and eventually a wedding was on the cards. Bringing all the sports disciplines together, and meshing competing teams into one wedding

party, the true Shane Brodie mantra was born - no matter your differences and abilities, there was always an abnormally large Shaney shoulder to lean on. And this mantra followed through wholeheartedly as he got older, gifting him with life memberships of the Meteors Hockey Club, Meteors Sports Club, Gladstone Hockey Association, Hockey Queensland Distinguished Service Award and rounded out by an Australia Day Award for Sports Administration in 2014

But he would say his greatest achievements were his children - Stephen, Jessica, Mason and D2 Christine - who have all grown into their own lives and have their own individual families. He lived for his grandchildren and embraced their unique abilities. The Brodie extended family has also played an integral part in the growth of his and Julie's children and grandchildren - the Ramm, Smith and Knight families were a significant part of his life - from the early years, right through to his illness and passing. These are friends that he would happily call forever family.

Like a mid-shelf bottle of blended scotch, he had a full bodied, complex taste: he'd cheer you up when you needed it; gave you a shoulder to cry on when you were down; celebrated your wins and supported your losses.

He was the true definition of a people person.

Rest in Peace Big Fella you will be missed by many.

New safety investment delivers a boost for VMR

Local boating and marine enthusiasts will be safer on the water following the announcement of a \$10,000 grant to Volunteer Marine Rescue Gladstone.

Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher said the new investment would complement the state government's commitment to establish an integrated single marine rescue service following the recommendations of the Blue Water Review.

"These \$10,000 grants can be used to fund facility maintenance and enhancement or to purchase necessary equipment and services to support marine rescue operations," he said.

"Our dedicated marine rescue volunteers in Gladstone have long provided a vital service keeping us safe and we want to ensure they are supported in the work they do.

"Individual squadrons and flotillas will be empowered to consider their local needs and priorities as a part of the new funding."

Minister for Fire and Emergency Services Mark Ryan said the \$470,000 statewide grant program would directly support frontline units. The funds will be administered by the Australian Volunteer Coast Guard Association and Volunteer Marine Rescue Association Queensland via agreements with Queensland Fire and Emergency Services in the forthcoming financial year, he said.

Nathan Walton started his business, Muddys Off-Road 4x4 Accessories, in January alongside his wife and two brothers and in a telephone call with CQ Today acknowledged that the initial months had been challenging.

"I thought I knew a lot about business but it turns out I wasn't as knowledgeable as I thought it was," Mr Walton said.

But as Mr Walton makes his journey into commerce, he is being actively supported by Here for Business, a 12-month mentoring program supported by Rio Tinto Yarwun, Queensland Alumina Limited and Boyne Smelters limited. The program is designed to guide small business owners across the Gladstone region through the myriad complexities that can be part of any business venture.

Introducing Muddys

Muddys distributes and installs any part or component a four-wheel driver might need to pursue his or her passion for off-road adventure. Whether it's a VRS utility winch with synthetic rope, double row light bars or cutlery for camp cooking, the team at Muddys can source and install everything required to secure a safe and memorable adventure across Queensland's vast and beautiful landscapes.

"The way we work, we're an independent, we're not affiliated with any of the big guys,"

Mr Walton explained.

"So we only really want to sell products that we would use ourselves, and we trust and we know. We don't want to just sell stuff because our supplier supplies it to us. We want to stand behind our products. If there's an issue with the product, I've let the customer know myself. If we don't trust the product, we simply won't sell it."

A core component of the Muddys service is the transfer of expertise. Mr Walton and his team are avid four-wheel drivers themselves and their business centres on openly transmitting their own knowledge and experience to customers, so that anyone can secure the sense of freedom and excitement that comes with an off-road adventure.

Muddys, in effect, is a bespoke service, with a store and workshop located together. Its competitive advantage comes from combining expertise and personal advice with a distribution and installation function.

"We go four-wheel driving constantly. That's what we do, that's our passion, and we try to make sure that runs through in the business," Mr Walton said.

But navigating the myriad complexities that come with any small business venture is always a challenge, even if you've got the basic things right, and a little guidance from friends can mean the difference between success and failure

"It's definitely helped," Mr Walton said.

"It's more making our point of difference come across to people," Mr Walton explained.

"We are a small family business, it's the missus, two brothers and me. Everybody talks about us, they call us the Muddy boys. Looking at branding ourselves as the Muddy boys. Try to get a bit of a social media following along those lines, or videos involving us, rather than just our cars and what we sell. Working on going out and meeting people at their businesses, going and knocking on doors instead of making people come to us."

Mr Walton acknowledges that he had not thought extensively about this aspect of business before launching in January.

"Not enough to actually go out and do it," he said.

Mr Walton said this more active approach to business would push his enterprise into a more prosperous direction. "It will help spread our name out there more in the Gladstone area," he said.

"We find Gladstone really likes to look after the local small businesses, just letting people know we're there in the first place will definitely make it a lot easier."

Mr Walton's experience with Here for Business is one of many compelling stories reshaping and fortifying the small business landscape across the Gladstone region.

Vegans protest big beef

Activists with Animal Liberation Queensland (ALQ) gathered outside the exhibition road entrance of Beef Australia 2021 last Thursday to protest the beef industry's alleged abuse of animals and negative contribution to climate change.

Led by ALQ Executive Director Chay Neal, the protest offered a striking contrast to the celebratory industry showcase and presented attendees with an alternative and much darker view of the industry's practices and effects.

Standing in front of a large banner that read: 'Born to Die', Mr Chay spoke at length about the reasons he and his fellow ALQ members had descended into Rockhampton.

"We're here today to expose the harmful realities of the beef industry," he said.

"Both the environmental destruction as well as the harm to animals.

"At any one time, there are some 25 million cattle in Australia. Over a million of these are confined to intensive feedlots, where they are unable to graze and fulfil much of their natural behaviours. And each year, hundreds of thousands of cattle will die from starvation, mismanagement, disease and injury, before making it to export or slaughter. They're also routinely subjected to painful procedures. You know, castrated, de-horned and fire-branding."

"Each of these animals is an individual, an intelligent, sentient animal, that has suffered through much of their life and death. They're valued only for their financial value, by the industry and the government. Sold by the kilo, they are literally born to die, and we think they deserve better."

In a separate interview with CQ Today, Mr Neal said he had begun to move towards veganism the age of 10.

"I had a dog, we adopted a Labrador, and I realised, there's no way I would kill my dog, my best friend, why would I kill a pig, which is arguably even more intelligent, and its ability to feel, it just didn't make sense. So pretty quickly I went vegetarian from there."

At the age of 18, Mr Neal shifted from vegetarianism to veganism.

The protestors spent only a part of the morning outside the showgrounds. After talking with media, the protestors wrapped up the banners and dispersed into the city.

"We're not here to really disrupt anything or try to cause any trouble in there, more to just get our message out there to consumers and to government," Mr Neal said.

The protest was civilised. Police officers hovered nearby, but there was no hint of violence or rudeness, from either the protestors or the crowds shuffling by and entering the showgrounds.

According to its website, ALQ seeks a rational and compassionate discussion about the negative effects of meat consumption in Australia.

ALQ seeks to work within the democratic process and adheres to a policy of non-violence.

Though its methods are rational, democratic and decent, its vision is radical. Ultimately, ALQ wants to see Australia's beef industry phased out.

ALQ was founded in 1979. Australian philosopher Peter Singer's Animal Liberation, first published in 1975, served as one of the core texts that inspired the organisation's establishment.

The protest coincided with an advertising

and educational campaign launched by ALQ, which has seen billboards put up in the Rockhampton CBD and Brisbane's Fortitude Valley, the registration of the web domain beef.org.au and the release of a 40-page report outlining the key concerns of the group.

The newly registered website features videos documenting what ALQ sees as animal abuse, including one in which a cow has fallen down in a truck and its leg is struck in an opening slit. The cow is trampled on by the other cows. The cow is then prodded with an electric prod to try and get it to stand again.

Speaking with CQ Today, ALQ Campaign Manager Amanda Holly said the footage obtained by ALQ was collected in a legal manner, for example through the use of long-lens cameras or drones.

"We visit saleyards, visit feedlots, abattoirs and we film, we photograph and we document, and we get that out there to the public, so the public have more awareness of the realities," she said.

"We are usually doing that from public ground."

When asked whether ALQ would ever consider trespassing on private property in order to obtain footage, Ms Holly replied: 'No.'

"Quite often there is visibility from fence lines," she said.

MasterChef Beef cook-off pits France against England

"I'm going classic French with this," Ms

"I'm going to go English. Fillet steak with horseradish cream and buttered cabbage," Mr Weldon replied.

Farmers fascinated by 3D printing technology

Farmers at Beef Australia 2021 took a keen interest in the 3D printing display at the Ken Coombe Tech Yards, entranced by the manifold benefits that the new technology could deliver to their businesses.

A 3D printer creates objects from a three-dimensional digital file, often using thermoplastic material as filament. The machine layers the filament into shape and a range of objects, from pliers to pipe fittings, can be quickly and cheaply manufactured.

Darryl Clare, a lecturer at Central Queensland University, manned the display stall and told CQ Today the interest he had received throughout the week was substantial enough that he could have sold hundreds of the printers on site.

"I've just directed people to where to buy the cheap printers," he said.

A printer can be secured with a \$300 investment and a single filament roll can cost as little as \$30.

"The sort of things that are of real interest to the guys on a farm are things like pipe fittings, and this has been one of the most popular things, or electric fence insulators. If they need to buy them, especially at a time when it's closed, they're not available, this here shows that you can actually print them, straight off the printer, ready to

In effect, 3D printing offers farmers the opportunity to develop a small-scale manufacturing capacity to support their agricultural practices. Instead of sourcing tools and bolts and all the myriad little things needed to keep a property humming from a store in town, a farmer can purchase a printer and print them all from home.

What's more, the printers are easy to operate. Mr Clare said he bought his own printer and learned how to use it by 'playing' around with it and sourcing information from the internet.

When CQ Today visited the stall, the printer was engaged in creating a model cow to celebrate the final day of Beef Week.

Get a taste of farm life

Mark and Annika Anderson from Barmoya are just some of many farmers who've made the leap to agritourism.

State Minister for Agricultural Industry Development and Fisheries Mark Furner launched the \$2 million 'Taste Farm Life' agritourism campaign last week at Henderson Park Farm Retreat at Barmoya to help other farmers follow the Andersons' example.

'If you look at the surroundings out here, you can feel the serenity," he said.

"These folks here, they've got that hospitality, that warmth you don't get in some of those regional centres on the coast.

"We're not asking people to stay away from the coastal areas but to consider taking some time to visit places like Henderson Park because they are unique, they are special and they've got something real to offer.

While Covid-19 had decimated the international market, Mr Furner said the funding would assist farms like Henderson Park to promote their businesses nationally.

"Many agribusinesses offer a variety of food and farm experiences including farm gate sales, food and wine sampling, farmer's markets, pick-your-own fruit and veggie experiences, farm stays, and food and farm festivals and events," he said.

"We're seeing a real surge in people who are wanting to explore their backyard in Queensland and Australia cost-Covid."

Staged over two years, Mr Furner said fur-

ther stages of the program would be rolled out in conjunction with agritourism businesses.

Ryan Anderson, who owns and operates Henderson Park with his wife Annika, said the farm had diversified into agritourism more than 20 years ago and never looked back.

"We're not a large scale cattle enterprise and the farm retreat business provides a buffer from things like seasonal conditions, low cattle prices - those peaks and throughs that you expect," he said.

"For businesses that are pondering whether to diversify into tourism, funding opportunities like this (Taste Farm Life) will allow them to essentially take that first step."

For Henderson Park, the move into agritourism started as a sideline with just one cabin and grew from there.

"We were getting a lot of groups that wanted to come out here and we just couldn't accommodate them in the cabins, so we built the

"Since then it's switched around a bit in terms of the workload, there's a lot more of a workload at the retreat than there is in the cattle property.

Like all businesses, Mr Anderson said Henderson Park was hit hard by Covid.

"Our international market just stopped and our weddings were postponed," he said.

"We've actually got this really busy calendar now with a lot of weddings that were postponed from last year.

We've been really fortunate in Queensland, which has allowed us to bounce back really well and we're at full stride now.

"We've always had really great support locally and we've seen that straight after Covid everyone's really keen to get out the house and go and have a look around.'

Annika Anderson said her parents had made the decision to branch out into agritourism after drought impacted the family cattle

"They've loved seeing Henderson Park go from strength to strength over the years," she

"Providing a secluded retreat for people to have an intimate wedding with their family and friends is a big part of our business, as well as people looking for an Australian experience or those who just get off the beaten track and spend some quality time with family in par-

Recently retired Emu Park Post Office licensee Kerry Kay saw many changes in his 52 years with Australia Post but his dedication to customer service never wavered.

The Emu Park resident of 24 years had his last shift on Saturday, May 7 with the official handover of the business the following Mon-

Kerry's long association with Australia Post started in 1969 when he was employed as a

From there, he progressed through the ranks, taking on roles as postal officer, postal clerk, postal manager and more while moving around the country.

"My favourite place to work would have to be Berri, South Australia. That was an absolute treat, I love South Australia," he said.

"In the North-West, my favourite spot was

In 1997, he purchased the Emu Park Post Office and he's been a fixture in the Capricorn Coast town ever since.

Kerry said one of the things he would miss most was the interaction with customers.

"I've made some lifelong friends, not only with staff but with customers as well - there's a lot of customers that I've stayed in contact with," he said.

"I've got to know a lot of people in town simply because I was working at a post office

"Despite what people say, customer service can be a very interesting sphere, there's fewer irate customers than people make out."

Kerry said his career had provided him with plenty of opportunities.

"Wherever there was a challenge, whether it was relief work or a promotion, I'd lap it up," he said.

"I said to my boss in Brisbane the other day, if there was a message that I could give to anyone that was working as an LPA (Licensed Post Office) licensee or with Post, it would be stop the negativity, just tackle things for they are and embrace it because it makes life so much easier.

"And you also manage your stress better that way.

One of the defining moments of his was working in Melbourne on a project called ECS (Electronic Counter System).

"Up until then, everything was manual,

we'd take a phone bill off you, we'd tear the bottom off and we'd book it up at the end of the day... and then we'd send it away in the mail," he said.

'The ECS was the first model of an electronic counter system. That was really interesting for me and when I got back to Queensland, I went on the road to implement the ECS, which took a few months.

There's been a whole heap of challenges that Post has thrown at us over the years and think that's why I've enjoyed the whole time that I've worked for them, because of those challenges.'

While things have changed a lot over the years, Kerry said the basics of Australia Post's role remained the same.

'We've still got to deliver letters and we've still got to deliver parcels, that can't change

"What's changed is how we deal with those parcels once we get them in our system.

"There's ways we've made things more efficient, such as sending people texts and messages to tell them their parcel has arrived.

"And because everything's electronic we can do things like identity and verification work and passports and tax file number applications now.

"Australia Post has got a very good reputation from the likes of the ATO and Passports Office in terms of how we handle our information and confidentiality

That's why we've been able to get more and more identity verification agencies to come on board all the time.'

While he'll miss the interaction with customers and workmates, Kerry said he'd still have plenty to do.

I'm into Little Theatre so I can concentrate on that a bit more and there's a lot of work to do at home, including the garden. That's six months of work for a start," he said.

'My wife and I will be staying in Emu Park, we have family and friends here and we're a part of the community.'

Post Office Network acting state general manager Jason Cahill said Kerry was a fantastic example of the many hard-working licensees across the country who were truly valued by their communities.

'We thank Kerry for his work in various roles over the past 52 years and wish him all the very best in his retirement," he said.

Frydenberg's big spending budget

Treasurer Josh Frydenberg delivered a bigspending budget on Tuesday evening designed to propel Australia's economy through the ruptures of the pandemic.

Nearly \$8 billion in tax cuts for low and middle-income earners, or up to \$1080 for individuals or \$2160 for dual income couples, were unveiled.

The income tax cuts run alongside some \$20 billion in tax relief for small businesses.

The tax cuts are part of a broader stimulus program. Most sectors of the Australian economy are set to receive a generous dose of funding.

The aviation and tourism industries, women's health and economic security, construction, aged care and infrastructure will receive billions in new funding.

Queensland's resources sector also looks set to benefit from the budget's largesse.

The government has allocated \$100 million for exploration grants to encourage explorers to scour the state for the next significant mineral deposit and \$58.6 million to increase the supply of gas with field trials in the North Bowen and Galilee Basins.

Despite the rain of cash, there are some troubling lacunas in the budget related to Central Queensland's infrastructure prospects.

There are no allocations for an extension of Inland Rail to Gladstone, for example.

In a statement released to CQ Today, Gladstone mayor and Labor's candidate for the division of Flynn Matt Burnett decried the absence of any funding for the rail link.

"There are no new water projects, big cuts in drought assistance and no backing for the Inland Rail to the Port of Gladstone," Mr Burnett said.

"This budget proves that the Morrison government continues to take our region for granted and has no vision for it's future."

Patients up at Mater emergency

Rockhampton Mater Private Hospital's emergency care centre has had a 33 per cent increase in patient numbers so far this year.

Speaking about why patient numbers were up considerably in comparison to the first four months of 2020, Mater Private Hospital Rockhampton's executive officer Sue Thurbon said more people had become aware of the centre's services.

She acknowledged that patients liked the accessibility and minimal waiting times in the facility which is open between 7am and 11pm every day of the year; allowing them to come before or after work, on weekends or public holidays.

"More than 50 per cent of patients were treated within one hour this year," she said.

Ms Thurbon said the hospital had built the facility to improve access to healthcare for those in Rockhampton and surrounding areas with no referral or appointment.

"Whether you have private health insurance or not, there's a flat consultation fee for all patients who present at the centre," she said.

Nurse Unit Manager, Joyce Jaquet had noticed the centre's rise in those who've presented to the hospital, and had treated a range of conditions from chest pain, bone fractures and wound dressings.

"It's staffed by highly trained emergency medicine doctors and nurses so people in our local community can have confidence they can receive top quality care any day of the week."

Meanwhile, Ms Thurbon recognised the hospital's long history.

"Mater has been part of the fabric of the Rockhampton community for more than a century," she said.

This week, the hospital attended Beef 2021 to raise awareness of the services health professionals provide within the emergency care centre.

They spoke to mothers and young families about their parents lounge which allowed midwives to speak with them, allowing a safe space for them to feed and change their babies.

"It's been extremely popular with more than 300 mums visiting the lounge so far this week," she said.

"Being part of Beef 2021 gives us a great opportunity to meet new members of the community and reconnect with those who may already have experienced Mater's unique healthcare offerings.

"When Mater unified all of our hospitals and health facilities under one umbrella last year, a key goal was to deliver consistent excellence in healthcare to all patients, regardless of where they lived in Queensland."

Since the emergency care centre opened in September 2018, its staff had treated more than 16,600 patients from the Rockhampton and surrounding areas.

Patient numbers have climbed steadily since it opened, with a 49 per cent rise between January and April 2019 compared with the same period this year.

A host of politicians and dignitaries celebrated the opening of the \$12.5 million Riverslea Bridge outside of Rockhampton on Thursday morning.

Federal Member for Capricornia Michelle Landry joined Senator Matt Canavan, representatives from the state government and Rockhampton councillors to welcome the completion.

The new bridge has proven to maintain more than 30 jobs for Central Queenslanders, while concrete for the structure was sourced from Rockhamptonbased contractor, Humes.

Ms Landry said the addition of this crossing started a great day for the people of Central Queensland.

The multi-million dollar investment from the federal government replaced the existing crossing which could have been inundated when the Rookwood Weir reaches its full capacity.

Regions get cash for connectivity

The federal government has revealed \$9.3 million in new investments to integrate their next stage of development for regions in northern Queensland.

On Wednesday, Member for Capricornia Michelle Landry welcomed the Our North, Our Future: 2021-2026 which will focus on creating new jobs, digital connectivity and measures to help grow business to diversify communities including from Gladstone to Cairns.

Minister for Resources, Water and Northern Australia Keith Pitt said the new plan would give improved access for connectivity in regional, rural and remote areas to help people remain connected with businesses.

"The coalition government is also investing in telecommunications projects which will improve digital connectivity across the north, including remote indigenous communities," he said.

"Communication is critical to our modern economy."

Ms Landry, the Assistant Minister for Northern Australia, outlined the budget measures which were included in a pilot Regions of Growth program to help identify and capitalise on each community's strengths.

"The Regions of Growth pilot program will provide specialists to help connect business to economic opportunities in areas such as advanced manufacturing, critical minerals development, or in agriculture," she said.

"The Regions of Growth to be piloted in the first stage are Mount Isa to Townsville; Cairns

to Gladstone; Beetaloo Basin to Darwin Port; and Broome to Kununurra to Darwin."

"This program invests \$9.3 million over five years and will provide locally-based support for business development and opportunities in the north.

"The next phase of development will set the new direction for northern Australia, ensuring it remains a great place in which to live, work and invest."

Building on economic growth in the northern part of the country, it further enhances the \$49.7 million which has already been spent to support reforms in the \$5 billion Northern Australia Infrastructure Facility; giving an extension of its investment window to June 2026.

Tradies to start work on school upgrades

Central Queensland tradies will soon be working on about \$6 million in new contracts for local schools.

Supporting 15 jobs, seven new projects have been revealed in an exciting development for the education system across the region.

Leading the pack of exciting new developments is a \$1.1 million science block at Yeppoon State High School in addition to about \$1.13 million at Emu Park State School for a new amenities block and a lift to classrooms.

It doesn't end there.

There's also a \$1.1 million grant to replace two amenities blocks and transpiration pits at Keppel Sands State School, and a \$935,000 project at Yeppoon State School. It is there classrooms will be converted for science, technology and mathematics along with an early childhood development program.

Emerald State High School students will reap the benefits of a \$1.37 million new building with two learning spaces.

Meanwhile, a new build for Crescent Lagoon State School, at a cost of \$324,500, will deliver equitable access to its amenities and Block B learning centre.

Lastly, the existing amenities at Longreach State School will be replaced for \$550,000.

Member for Keppel Brittany Lauga said the projects were confirmed in March and April as part of the Queensland government's budget action plan for the region.

"The Central Queensland Regional Action Plan includes \$52.4 million to maintain, improve and upgrade schools including signifi-

cant projects in my own electorate of Keppel," she said.

Ms Lauga confirmed the state government was committed to creating jobs during the rollout of their economic recovery plan.

"These projects are building on our record investment in building new schools, expanding existing schools in high growth areas and supporting local economies," she said.

"They also continue to deliver high-quality learning spaces and facilities for students and

staff at our region's schools."

Meanwhile, Member for Rockhampton Barry O'Rourke said the infrastructure of schools was a central element of the Queensland government's economic plan for recovery.

"These new projects are just a fraction of the projects underway as part of our \$1.9 billion education statewide infrastructure spend in the current budget, supporting 4800 jobs," he said.

It's time to play our part

Rockhampton Police and their partner organisations want the community come together to help stamp out domestic and family violence.

Acting Inspector Ben Wiltshire said the police were committed to supporting the victims of domestic violence and to holding the perpetrators to account.

"The statistics in Queensland are shocking and they aren't changing," he said.

"One woman a week in Queensland has been killed by her partner or ex-partner, and one in four women have suffered some sort of abuse from a current or ex-partner."

Raising awareness for Domestic Violence Prevention Month, Insp Wiltshire said the whole community should play their part.

"If you're a victim of domestic violence, know that if you reach out we can help, and our partners can help," he said.

"If you know of domestic violence, you play a part as well - your phone call could help save a life.

"If you're a perpetrator of domestic violence, there are no excuses, this is on you. But we can help you as well, reach out, get help and change things."

Acting Sergeant Melissa Winslade said domestic violence was everywhere and occurring all the time.

"The statistics show domestic and family violence is on the rise in Rockhampton, Queensland and Australia," she said.

"This is concerning and why, as a community, we all need to all play a part to raise awareness this month.

"As a community, we are encouraging you to report domestic and family violence that you see occurring, this can be done through Policelink on 131 444, or by calling 000 in an emergency.

"If you're scared to come forward you can call anonymously with what you have seen and we will launch an investigation into it.

"If you're in a situation where you're unable to call you can use the Policelink website or at-

tend your local police station."

Helem Yumba CQ Healing Centre counsellor Bernadette Anderson said domestic and family violence was a community issue.

"Helem Yumba supports Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families going through, or at risk of, domestic and family violence,"

"In May we get out there and we encourage members of the community to join in, research and look at ways to support their own families"

Ms Anderson said Helem Yumba's referral rate was consistently high.

"Through the pandemic our referrals increased, but I found that when you reached out by phone people were answering, which is a good thing."

She said the team at Helem Yumba worked with both victims and preparators to promote healing.

"For Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, there are multiple layers of dysfunction that have built up over a long period of time," she said.

"This is an important issue, it means the survival of our people because we are minority in a land where we we were here first.

"We have to maintain our culture, our lives, our livelihoods and help our young people while looking after our elders, it's a real family focus."

Ms Anderson said while the first step was the hardest, it was okay to reach out for help.

I wanted a change," she said.



CQ mum an ambassador

A Rockhampton mother of five has been named Australia's ambassador for the MDS Foundation based in the USA.

Fiona McWhirter was diagnosed with Myelodysplastic Syndrome (a rare form of blood cancer that particularly affects women) over the phone in May last year, in the midst of an ever-changing world which had been adjusting to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Never having been exposed to any chemicals or chemotherapy in the past, she hadn't heard of the illness before her diagnosis.

Ever since, she has been trying to learn as much as she can about it, raising awareness and educating others.

Last weekend, the 48 year-old nurse donated her hair during Shave for a Cure, which was hosted by the Leukaemia Foundation, where she raised \$8000 for the cause.

It was a family affair. Both her husband Craig and one of her sons, Lucas, shaved their heads with their hair being donated for compost and floating booms to absorb spills in the ocean.

Meanwhile, Mrs McWhirter gave her locks of hair to Sustainable Salons to make medical wigs

"I have my own cancer support coordinator and they have amazing resources and online information sessions and support groups," she

"I'm not getting any treatment at the moment which is great, I'm just being closely monitored (by health professionals)," she said.

She recently took part in a global walk to raise awareness for the illness. Marvellously her team of about 30 participants, all wearing sparkly attire, was the only group in Australia to take part.

A 5km virtual march, each of them filmed video footage and captured photos which were uploaded into an online portal to share their experiences with the rest of the world.

While she may appear to be a healthy woman, the syndrome causes her to suffer from a lot of fatigue.

"I'm very tired all of the time because of my blood counts, and get a lot of aches," she said. "Apart from that, I'm doing alright." While her diagnosis was confronting and full-on for her to handle, it was made more difficult in the way it had been delivered.

"Having a diagnosis of something quite significant over the phone was really isolating," she said.

"I didn't have the full picture at that time, we didn't know what we were looking at."

So it wasn't until she finished waiting on the results of her cytogenetics results (which were pushed back due to Covid-19), did she have a fairer idea of her condition.

It's since been a big change for her and how she goes about her life.

"It has made me more present and be in the moment, not worrying about the small stuff," she said.

"Grasp every opportunity that you're given and create memories," she urged readers.

When she does need chemotherapy and stem cell transplants, being away from her family for up to six months at a time, both her and family members can look back on happy moments they'd created together.

Originally, she had wondered how to tell her children about the diagnosis, especially her younger ones.

"There is no cure for MDS, one in three stem cell transplants work, there are no guarantees," she said.

Her next check-up will be at the start of next month.

"If I do start feeling off, I have more regular blood taken for testing," she said.

"I don't feel sick all of the time."

Around May 28 (one year since her diagnosis), she'll celebrate having no treatment so far with loved ones and friends.

It was only recently that Mrs McWhirter realised her own mortality when a friend she had made online, having spoken to every day, succumbed to the illness.

The woman had been diagnosed with a

The woman had been diagnosed with a high risk variety of the condition before she passed away in Easter. Understandably, Mrs McWhirter was devastated.

So the passionate advocate has encouraged our community to donate blood, and if they could register to be listed in the Bone Marrow

hobbyists and just enjoy the thrill of training and racing the birds."

The club will have races over a period of about five months culminating in a final race

of about 900km.

Club member Norm Milne said Rockhampton's racing enthusiasts wouldn't even let Covid-19 deter them from their favourite

"We only had five people there at a time instead of 20 to 25 but we were the first club in Australia to fly pigeons during the Covid-19 pandemic," he said.

"Ashley was Covid officer for Rockhampton and was determined to make it happen." This weekend, a driver will deliver the

club's pigeons to Liz Cunningham Park at Calliope where they will be released at 8am.

"Usually each member will have about 20 to 30 pigeons in a race, and there will probably be between 350 and 400 birds released on the weekend," Norm said.

Norm is a veteran member of the club - he started racing in 1969 and has never missed a session because 'it gets in your blood'.

"When I go on holidays I go on holidays

just to look at pigeons, it's the only thing that interests me," he said.

Fellow member Larry Pearson became a 'pigeoneer' in 1995 after owning pigeons as a child and the club's youngest member, Sunny Santhiranantha, has been a member for two years.

"What often happens is that a lot of pigeon flyers who've given it away over the years come back when they retire," Norm said. Larry said the club was welcoming of men and women of all ages, ethnicities and walks of life.

"There are a lot of great female pigeon

racers, one of the best female racers in the Australia would be Poi Weynton from Sydney, who won three cars, year after year after year."

He said there were probably more foreign-

born pigeon racers in the country than Australian-born thanks to the popularity of the sport overseas.

"Germany is probably the biggest market, followed closely by China," he said.

"One race in South Africa is worth \$1 million and a Porsche car. There are five lead up races and every one of them is worth a Mercedes Benz."

Australian races also have some impressive cash prizes, even if they're not on the same scale, with the Gold Coast race offering a \$50,000 prize.

Rockhampton Racing Pigeon Club mem-

bers meet at the clubhouse at 56 Glenmore Rd, Park Avenue, which has been their head-quarters for for more than 30 years.

"We have about 20 members at the moment from Rockhampton, the Capricorn Coast and Alton Downs," Larry said.

"New members are always welcome, just get in contact with one of our members and we'll be happy to sign you up."

Mr Murphy said the ride had a 'really good vibe' about it.

"In 2019 there were 116,000 riders world-wide going on a ride for the same cause, all on one day, give or take time differences of course," he said.

My, how Beef has grown

Full marks to Beef CEO Ian Mill, his board and his team for producing a top shelf Beef 2021.

With all the woes Covid has brought upon us, it was a remarkable aspiration to even consider running this world envied event, let alone make it the success it was.

Praise must therefore also go to all our fellow Australians who toed the line in obeying the health laws which have kept the disease caged.

My involvement in the event reaches back to 1991 when Ken Coome was the visionary behind it.

It was pleasing to see his name honoured on one of the buildings. Thirty years ago it was a humble event, cash strapped and with no facilities.

It was insular in that if you didn't have cattle there was not much to lure you there. But like all successes it was the tiny seed from which this magnificent eucalypt has sprung. Back then, my only role was to lobby both state and federal Labor governments for financial support which I did with moderate success.

During its first decade the event grew in length and breadth but seemed to always struggle to make ends meet.

He, as always, put his hand into his pocket as an example to other generous local businesses.

He created Beef Ambassadors, of which I was honoured to be one across the political, business and community spectrum as an ingenious way of getting support.

Having me in state cabinet was an added bonus and, on more than one occasion, the entire cabinet was briefed by Geoff.

He created Brisbane based events to attract donors and support to which both sides of parliament were invited and attended. I hope next time around we see a building with his name on it.

The event gave me the vision to create a 10-year plan to make Rocky Beef compliant.

The Empire and Edge were not there then but my host Grant Cassidy and his wife Rebecca were here running other businesses and similarly became involved, and it's great that these top locally built apartment hotels are brimming with action.

Grant is one of the board members and he and Pat O 'Driscoll hosted a great Sportsman's Lunch on Friday.

All the leaders were there. Not just from the agribanks, industry and those who service and supply the business that exports up to 100,000 tons of boxed beef to over 100 countries each month.

So too were our politicians local, state and federal. Mayor Tony Williams was everywhere. Prime Minister Scott Morrison was there with his relevant ministers. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk put in over five hours and when I caught up with her for breakfast at the Boatshed on Thursday morning she was busily trying to amend her diary to try to get out there again.

She described it as even bigger and better than last time. Such diversity in one place she

said, everything from top level science to hot dogs, the latest design in farm equipment safety through to handmade hats she enthused. She was particularly happy about the sausage sizzle Barry O 'Rourke put together for a youth event.

Bevan Slattery, the Rocky boy who is regarded as one of Australia's most accomplished innovators, was there - again a smart move to have him involved. I first met Bevan when he had his first job at the Rocky City Council and it was great to spend some time with him and his latest recruit former minister Kate Jones.

He truly is a great credit to his parents Barry and Thel as much as he is a walking advertisement for our city.

But back to the Sky Lounge with my new mate from the Condamine. This too is a local product. Josh Jones, son of my long-term mates of Oxford Hotel fame Ian and Helen Jones. Josh has created one of the biggest and most successful event catering businesses in Australia.

I was his guest and waiting for others to join me when this great young bloke asked if he could take a bar stool, I replied "only until my wife Judy (who was due to finish her volunteer role as gatekeeper) arrives". He readily agreed and it was only a few moments before we were in a shout and enlightening conversation.

The volunteers are a fundamental part of this event not just because they are crucial to its running but it is also a smart way of getting the word out about the event.

But I also had a great feeling of comfort that our education system is sound and our future in the hands of people like this is bright.

Reef Resilience vessel hits waters off Gladstone

The latest weapon in protecting the Great Barrier Reef was officially unveiled in Gladstone last week with the launch of a \$9.7 million state of the art Reef Resilience vessel.

The 24-metre Reef Resilience, jointly funded by the Australian and Queensland governments under the Reef Joint Field Management Program, will enter service this week and will significantly enhance the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority's capabilities in undertaking compliance patrols, field activities with Traditional Owners and Indigenous rangers, protected species management and incident response.

Minister for the Environment Sussan Ley and the Queensland Minister for the Environment and the Great Barrier Reef, Meaghan Scanlon officially launched the Reef Resilience, which will patrol the southern half of the reef, at its Gladstone home port.

"This is yet another important and practical investment in reef protection, one that will substantially increase our capacity for field operations and in protecting the reef from illegal activities including illegal fishing that can have a massive impact on ecosystems," Ms Ley caid.

"The Reef Resilience revolutionises how field activities are undertaken across a massive area that is exposed to challenging weather conditions and which can often be difficult to access in less capable vessels.

"With 16 berths, three tender support vessels, and a larger rigid-hulled inflatable boat for compliance and enforcement activities, the Reef Resilience is an impressive floating ranger base.

"It is capable of reaching the remotest locations in the southern Great Barrier Reef and delivering multiple tasks simultaneously.

"We have a similar vessel already operating in the northern part of the Reef and this means the entire World Heritage Area is benefitting."

Ms Scanlon said the Reef Resilience would greatly enhance island and protected species management and in-water surveys.

"The Queensland government is investing almost \$1 billion this year to protect the environment and create jobs, including funding this new reef vessel," she said.

"The Reef Resilience transforms our management capability for our amazing island national parks, better allowing visitors and tour-

ism operators to enjoy all the opportunities the World Heritage Area has to offer.

"It allows our rangers to more efficiently and effectively maintain island campgrounds and the network of public moorings, and enhance our management of protected species like marine turtles and seabirds.

"Supporting rangers, Traditional Owners, Indigenous Rangers, and researchers to deliver a range of activities at the same time is exactly what this amazing vessel is designed to do."

Federal Member for Flynn Ken O'Dowd said the new vessel would service the Great Barrier Reef from its home port in Gladstone.

"Gladstone has a proud boating history and is the gateway to the Great Barrier Reef so it is only fitting that it acts as the home of the Reef's newest patrol vessel," he said.

State Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher said Reef Resilience can cruise at 20 knots, can cover more than 2000 nautical miles, and uses solar panels mounted on the roof to maximize the use of available renewable energy and reduce environmental impact.

"It accommodates up to 16 people for overnight voyages and can carry additional sup-

port vessels and up to six tonnes of cargo on the upper deck," he said.

For more than 40 years, the Australian and Queensland governments' Reef Joint Field Management Program has planned and executed field operations in the Great Barrier Reef World Heritage Area.



Oh, what a show it was!

where it is budget week, which is always a wonderful time of expectation.

But right now, my thoughts are of the week before in my home turf of Capricornia. I speak of course of Beef Week 2021.

When I think of it now, one word comes to mind: Exhilaration. Why? Because of all the wonderful announcements the federal government made that will benefit not only the beef industry but agriculture.

We began the week at the CQUniversity marquee where the Minister for Agriculture David Littleproud and myself joined Vice Chancellor Nick Klomp to announce a federal government grant of over \$200,000 to enable CQUniversity to research meat traceability more closely through the National Livestock Identification system (NLIS).

Then the prime minister arrived, and he was so impressed with what he saw.

The PM has a love for innovation and the people who have great ideas and dreams. He couldn't have been happier as he toured the Telstra Innovation Hub.

The next day, the prime minister joined the Minister for Agriculture, myself and many of

I write to you this week from Parliament House my federal colleagues to announce a \$371 million biosecurity package which will strengthen Australia's ability to keep out exotic pests and diseases that could destroy our agriculture but also to fight these diseases should there be an

The next morning, I joined boxing great Jeff Horn, and many generous Rockhampton businesses at a breakfast at the Frenchville Sports Club to launch the Salvation Army's Red Shield Appeal. It was a reminder that amongst all the celebrations of Beef Week we must never forget those who fall through the cracks of life, and the Red Shield Appeal is our way of helping the Salvos do their work.

Later that morning there was an announcement I was very proud of, something I fought very hard for and was so glad to deliver. I joined Deputy Prime Minister Michael McCormack, Rockhampton Mayor Tony Williams and councillors to announce \$25 million in federal funding to help Alliance Airlines deliver its maintenance and repair facility to Rockhampton from overseas. This project will deliver over 200 local jobs and an injection of \$30 million into the local economy each year.

At lunchtime there was another wonder-

ful announcement that I lobbied very hard for - \$3.2 million in federal funding for Stage 2 of upgrades to the Clermont Saleyards and Showgrounds.

Then it was off to officially cut the ribbon at another major milestone of the Rookwood Weir Project, the new Riverslea Bridge. This \$12.5 million bridge is the third road upgrade delivered as part of the Rookwood Weir Project. This bridge is a game-changer for so many, because before now the crossing would literally go underwater for weeks at a time during the wet season forcing residents to cross by boat.

Amongst all of that was a project that has been on my radar for a few years now - \$13 million for a much-needed upgrade of the Yeppoon Aquatic Centre.

Beef Week was a great week for the agriculture industry and a proud week for me because so many great projects I had fought for came to fruition, and there is so much more to come. But above all, I am proud of the people of Capricornia - we were on show to the world, and what a show it was.

Protecting unborn lives

We have sacrificed a lot to protect life over the past year. We shut down shops and schools, we have closed our borders and it remains illegal to leave Australia without permission.

I have been pleasantly surprised by how willing Australians have been to protect life even when the costs have been large and those who were most at risk of coronavirus, elderly Australians, only made up a small share of our overall population.

Not only did we 'flatten the curve', we have all but eliminated coronavirus as a major threat in Australia to date.

However, there are other lives that we have not offered the same protections. Unborn lives do not seem to matter as much.

In 2018, the Queensland government decriminalised abortions up to the point of birth. Since then, abortions have risen by 58 per cent. We are not flattening the curve on abortion rates.

The Queensland law now says that "a medical practitioner may perform a termination on a woman who is more than 22 weeks pregnant"

We know from the latest ultrasound technologies that at 22 weeks a baby clasps her hands, sucks her thumb, yawns, stretches, gets the hiccups, covers her ears to a loud sound and even smiles. At that age a baby can feel pain. Modern foetal surgery administers anaesthesia but there are no requirements for abortions to provide pain relief.

The decriminalisation of abortion has also given an implicit licence to practices that most would see as abhorrent. Earlier this year an IVF doctor, David Molloy, revealed that some of his patients had admitted to terminating a pregnancy when a test indicated their baby was of the 'wrong sex'.

And in some Melbourne suburbs, where abortion has also been recently decriminalised, more than 120 boys are now born for every 100 girls. The normal ratio is 105 to 100. As Dr Kristina Edvardsson from La Trobe University concluded that "some women may be terminating pregnancies after discovering they

are expecting a girl".

We should make it clear that no one should terminate a pregnancy to select the sex of their child. A few years ago, former Senator John Madigan, put forward a bill that would make it clear that no Medicare funds should be provided to anyone terminating a pregnancy or an abortion based on sex.

While such a law would be difficult to enforce, we should have a law written in black and white that outlaws such an abhorrent practice. At the March for Life rally in Brisbane on Saturday, I announced that I would re-introduce Senator John Madigan's bill to outlaw any funding for sex-selection abortions.

We do what we can to protect the lives of all Australians. To protect life is also why I argued that we should help Australians return from Covid ravaged India. I understand that many want to keep coronavirus out at all costs.

But if Australian mateship is to mean anything, it should mean that we help our mates out when they are in desperate need. Yes taking Australians from India would create a risk for us. But if you are not willing to sacrifice anything for a mate, you're not really a mate.

The government has announced that it will restart flights from India for returning Australians to return by May 15 which is welcome news. Protecting lives from the coronavirus is important but they are not the only lives at risk and we should do all we can to live by the slogan that all lives matter, including the unborn.



Extra \$53m in contracts

CQ will benefit from more than \$53 million in additional contracts awarded as part of construction works for the Shoalwater Bay Training Area.

The additional contracts, including two to businesses from Rockhampton, have been awarded for major construction works to be completed under the Australia-Singapore Military Training Initiative (ASMTI) Shoalwater Bay Training Area Facilities Project.

Defence Minister Peter Dutton said the ASMTI would deliver advanced military training areas in Central and North Queensland, while meeting the future needs of the Australian Defence Force.

"The Shoalwater Bay Training Area is one of Australia's most important training areas. Its expansion will not only deepen our Defence partnership with Singapore, but also support economic growth in the region as the economy recovers from the impacts of Covid-19," he said.

"This government is committed to maximising economic benefits for communities and enhancing opportunities for local industry in North and Central Queensland across the life of the ASMTI."

These latest contracts bring the total number of works packages already awarded through the SWBTA Facilities Project to 65, with a combined value of more than \$211 million.

"Major construction works to expand the Shoalwater Bay Training Area continue to provide a welcome economic boost to the region, with no shortage of opportunities to come.

"Local subcontractors have already shared in \$157 million of contracts, with about 108 packages still to be awarded over the next three years.

"Clearly this level of investment from the Morrison government is a significant win for local businesses and will support local jobs."

Member for Capricornia Michelle Landry said the Shoalwater Bay Training Area provided a welcome boost to the Central Queensland economy.

"Local businesses are already benefiting from this investment which will only continue with the project's construction workforce ex-

pected to peak at 450 workers," she said.

"I encourage any interested local businesses in the region to access the ASMTI's online modules and put their best foot forward to compete for upcoming opportunities."

The project works include the construction of urban operations training facilities, information and communication technology infrastructure, waste management and medical facilities across the expanded SWBTA.

Four subcontracts have gone to companies

either located in Central Queensland, or who will deliver the majority of their work from Central Queensland including:

- \$24 million awarded to locally owned and family run earthmoving and civil contracting company, Bellequip Pty Ltd for construction works:
- \$81,000 awarded to Tunuba Pty Ltd a joint venture between the Darumbal people and CQG Consulting water-filled barriers works;
- \$19 million awarded to a joint venture be-

tween Allroads Pty Ltd and Amcor Quarries Pty Ltd for the completion of civil pavements and in-ground services; and

• \$10.33 million awarded to Waanyi Shamrock United Pty Ltd - a partnership involving Shamrock Civil Engineering and the Waanyi Indigenous company based in North Queensland for civil works.

New Royal Flying Doctor Service base is taking off

A new \$3.2 million aeromedical base for regional, rural and remote Queensland is taking flight.

As part of a statewide infrastructure plan, the Royal Flying Doctor Service is planning for the built-for-purpose base to be established in Mount Isa where it will replace their existing 60-year-old facility.

They expect the construction of their new base to create 43 full-time jobs and provide about \$3.7 million in wages and salaries, while the centre will allow flying doctor crews to deliver more advanced levels of patient care

Chief Executive Officer Meredith Staib said they'd called on the assistance of their loyal supporters to support the new build.

"The new facility will feature improved transfer facilities for patients, new break rooms for on-call clinical staff and additional car parking for staff and emergency vehicles" she said

It would allow their crews to shift patients from the flying doctor aircraft onto the Queensland Ambulance Service vehicles "out of the elements in a comfortable, clinical environment"

Ms Staib said the new facility would bring much more than greater levels of healthcare.

"In Mount Isa, we generate \$16.3 million of economic activity per year and support 119 full-time equivalent jobs," she said.

"We will be seeking further funding for the new base through the federal government's Building Better Regions Fund, with the remainder of the cost of the build being sourced through philanthropic support."

Each year, the flying doctor's Mount Isa crews take about 950 patients to emergency

and specialist care facilities.

Meanwhile, they deliver primary health care services to more than 5400 patients each year between Burketown and Bedourie.

Former Burketown resident, Ebony Robinson was one of their patients who received primary health care from her local clinic

throughout her first pregnancy.

However, it was when her son was born with two separate heart conditions which greatened her understanding of the impact made by the RDFS.

"Without the support of the flying doctor in Mount Isa, Ollie's story may have been very

different," Mrs Robinson said.

"But as much as we rely on the RFDS, they also rely on us; if anyone is thinking of donating to the RFDS, I would highly encourage it. They saved my son's life."

Time to hold your horses

At work, we're forever talking about how to help young people get established financially, but it was listening to Daryl Braithwaite singing The Horses at Great Keppel which inspired this article.

I've never thought much of it as a song, but seduced by the crowd participation, the theatre and a few beers, I drift into considering the lyrics:

"That's the way it's gonna be, little darlin' We'll be riding on the horses, yeah Way up in the sky, little darlin'

And if you fall I'll pick you up, pick you up". While it seems that the song was originally written as a promise to a dying daughter, it could just as easily be interpreted as a promise

Well-meaning obviously, but naïve, and because I have no heart my message is to first avoid the fall, and second, pick yourself up. Here's how:

of fairy tale love.

Take an interest in your superannuation. Login at least twice a year, and check that your employer has been contributing the correct amount (it is illegal not to do so). Have a look at the investment returns, your investment profile, and also whether the arrangement includes life and/or income protection insurance. With this information, you can start doing some sleuthing of your own, or at least be able to talk to someone knowledgeable about such matters.

Investing in shares is a great way to start accumulating wealth. Using an online broker, the costs are very low and you can start small and gradually build. Unlike property, you can sell off a small portion of a portfolio if you need the money. Buying and taking an interest in even a few shares will open your mind to market volatility, dividends, franking credits, dividend reinvestment and takeovers to annual general meetings, all sorts of knowledge about large companies and the environment they operate in.

Property is the word on everyone's lips right now. Following the real estate advertisements in the printed press is a good way to get a handle on what's going on. There's also any number of websites with price histories of individual properties, and also lots of background data including the land area, easements and other information relevant to value. Banks will provide lots of information regarding lending



parameters. You can look up the way stamp duty is applied on the Office of State Revenue website

Insurance is a wide ranging and complex area. First up and regarding motor vehicles, young people need to understand the difference between CTP, third party property and comprehensive insurance.

Second, life insurance is often a focus, but trauma, total and permanent disability and income protection are generally more important when you are young. Super funds are no longer allowed to automatically insure people under 25 so you need to check if you are covered by your super fund.

If you are not, it might be your parents who pick up the tab for injury caused by falling off your bike, diving into the surf or any number of totally normal things that young people do every day. Structured properly, insurance might not be as expensive as you think.

Understanding income tax will save you money. Read up on how the tax system works. Don't fall for the idea that if you'll lose half your pay in tax if you work overtime.

That would only happen if you are at or close to being on the top marginal rate anyway. You might pay more tax in one particular pay, but it's all squared up when you submit your tax return.

Do you know that the government will often pick up part of the tab for things that benefit you, especially as regards generating additional income and wealth?

Interest on money borrowed for investment purposes is one example, but generally speaking work related education and training are tax deductible and you can use that to increase your earning power. Say you are a bookkeeper, why not undertake a diploma in accounting to step up a couple of notches?

What about a labourer? A forklift, heavy vehicle or other tickets will make you very em-

ployable, and also help protect your ability to earn income as you get older.

There are also overseas conferences on just about everything so go and learn something, make contacts and get a tax deduction for it.

And now we're back to The Horses.

Marriage is the biggest investment anyone will ever make. Many people focus on the risks of shares or superannuation, but they'd be wise to consider the losses associated with a failed marriage. Often deeply emotional, people are

sometimes left so gutted that they never regain their old selves.

No one can promise endless happiness, so look beyond the fairy tale and choose someone who can and will capably share life's challenges with you.

Don't make the investment thinking you'll fix glaring imperfections later. That is a red flag that he/she is not really your type in the first place.

Declaring a mercy flight

This week CQ Today continues looking at cattleman Sir Graham McCamley's recollections from his book, Roads in the Sky.

In our 18th excerpt, we look at a mercy flight in September 1980 where Graham's flying was put to good use.

A young man named Terry Rice was working at a service station at Stockyard Creek on the old Bruce Highway. That was Highway One at the time

Terry had spent his teenage years growing up in Dalby. His parents left there and moved to Marlbrough where they ran the Esso Stockyard Creek service station roadhouse, about 165 kilometres north-west of Rockhampton, and 20 kilometres or so up north of Tartrus.

It was one of the larger roadhouses and had the first public telephone after Marlborough.

The roadhouse and the few acres upon which it sat were part of Longacre, owned by Jan McCamley (the wife of Graham's cousin Ron) and her brother Jim Lawrence.

That day, Terry was putting a tube in a big truck tyre for Brian Kay, just down the road.

He recalled: "This was a well worn and ancient truck rim, and it wasn't locked in properly. I remember dropping the hammer on the locking rim.

"The lock rim just exploded. It ripped half my face off and opened up the corner of my mouth from the left hand side, took my nose off and across to the top of my forehead. So my face was just hanging off.

"I didn't get knocked out but I can recall doing a full somersault and landing on my feet,

"I could feel the blood pouring out and I thought; I have done something serious here."

Terry, bleeding heavily, staggered out of the workshop towards the office. Just then Nev Simpson, known as Simmo, arrived with the mail truck. "What on Earth have you done, Terry?"



Simmo faced inside to get Terry's mother. There was no time for subtlety. "You'd better get out here! Your son has ripped his head off!"

Terry's mother took charge, she helped him around the back. She grabbed three things: a cloth, which which she told him to press firmly against the wound, small butterfly clips to pull it all together and a very large glass of Scotch.

"She was pretty switched on. She put the clips on and held them together with some masking tape."

They rang the Marlborough ambulance at once, but it was still two hours away.

In the meantime Simmo had driven a few kilometres up the road to Longacre where Keith Williamson was the manager.

Simmo quickly sketched out what had happened to Terry and Keith immediately rang the service station.

"Graham and Shirley are here with the Comanche and they will fly you straight to town!"

Terry's brother Robert helped Terry into the back of the old ute and he planted his foot, heading for Longacre.

Graham and Shirley had everything in place and were ready to go. Graham was shocked by the injuries.

"Terry had been cut right from the top of the skull to his ear - his head was nearly split in half. You wouldn't think he was still alive."

Terry remembers being helped into the plane.

"I had to sit up to stop the bleeding, Gra-

ham was on the radio to the doctors who told him he had to fly under 2000 feet because a higher altitude could cause all sorts of trouble.

"Graham says to this day he doesn't know what height he was flying but it was 'just over the top of the trees'."

Graham explained further. "I declared a mercy flight. I told them there needed to be a doctor and ambulance waiting because 'it's really serious'.

"I gave them a time I would be arriving in Rocky and they diverted other aircraft that were due to be there at the same time and stopped any new planes taking off in my direction."

That flight saved Terry's life.

"We got to town and the ambulance drove me to hospital. I would not have made the car trip of up to three hours."

A 40-year journey in art

"Sue (CQUniversity Art Collection manager) and I have been working on this since late 2019. It's been an absolute pleasure to work with a professional, who is just as passionate as I am"

"I've been pretty spoiled to have a book, curated by Sue, accompany the exhibition.

"It truly captures my journey and highlights what subjects have been of most interest to me, as well as how I've grown and how I've changed.

"An interesting observation by Sue, is the similarities between the landscapes that surrounded me as a child and those that surround me now.

"I grew up in Zambia, South Africa, which

is known for its copper mines surrounded by pristine bush. Gladstone is similar - surrounded by fairly unspoiled bush."

Margaret said it was difficult to choose just one treasure, given that "as you work, you grow".

"Treasures change over time. However, some of my favourites include the little musclemen sculptures (aluminium), created by my partner, Clive Rouse," she said.

"People have wanted to buy these separately, but I would love to keep them together. In fact, I have chosen to donate these to CQUniversity, to ensure they will always be looked after.

"I am also fond of the Blood on the spoor 1999 (watercolour and mixed media) artwork, which is one of the earlier items in the collection, and the Rose-crowned fruit dove 2006-07 (watercolour and gold foil) artwork."

Margaret said she would now spend some time considering her next series of artwork.

"I've got this choice to either go to the outback or have a closer look at Curtis Island, just off the coast of Gladstone," she said.

"It may be a totally different subject, but I'll use what I've learned to date to produce paintings and digital videos, and aluminium sculptures with Clive Rouse."

The Margaret Worthington: Land, Air, Sand, Sea, Spirit. 40 years in Queensland exhibition will be held at CQUniversity Gladstone Marina Campus until 4 June.

Let's unshackle Phar Lap

My granddad used to own Westwood Pub. He trained a pony to come into the pub to 'roll out the barrel'. As he pushed into place a new beer barrel, the little mare walked beside him, nudging it with a front hoof. He also raced horses at Callaghan Park.

I wanted to be a jockey but grew too big. Then, a jilleroo. But I just got lost while mustering and became a laughable liability. I became a journalist as it at least started with a 'j' and I'd caught the love of sharing great stories. My first published writing was in the Bully. I was eight and it was a poem about Phar Lap. Recently, I've reported on climate and business news. But I'm thinking of Phar Lap again.

For these reasons. Phar Lap was a uniting figure in a turbulent time. Here we are in another time of challenge and change. Change from a fossil fuels-reliant way of life.

Change can make us afraid. A grandmother I know, and respect deeply, has collected articles that suggest Australia doesn't need to rapidly phase out coal, oil, gas and slash aviation and agriculture emissions. She may be feeling afraid.

A young single mum studying engineering at CQU told me she's tried to have conversations about climate solutions with family and friends, but it gets shut down.

If we feel a problem is too big to handle, we may push it away, become afraid, lose confidence. We forget past achievements. We forget who we are and how important every single person is, how your idea or your spark



The fate of the world's climate is in your hands.

can light someone else's spark. How we can achieve amazing things through our bonds. Phar Lap didn't win because he was whipped. He was loved, his strengths understood.

Will we be weak or strong, now? Do we want to be like Donald Trump and reject science, reject knowledge, refuse to be part of a team effort facing up to the challenge to make

a healthy world?

Or do we want to help in the race to a safe, sustainable economy, a race that needs to accelerate. Australia is like the Phar Lap of the new green economy. We all know that. The world needs Australia. Joe Biden can't do this alone. Australia should be right beside the US, helping guide global plans to secure a healthy future.

And big investors are arriving to help. They want to fund only climate-safe jobs. "Times of crises are a shock to any system. As triggers for deep reflection, crises force us to question our values. They offer a unique opportunity to reconsider how we do things. Long-held assumptions go out the window. Change becomes something to embrace, not something to fear," says Aviva Investors' chief responsible investment officer, Steve Waygood.

The Australian Academy of Science says the question for Australia is whether the transition from coal and gas "be managed to protect workers and communities or be delayed until there is a process of disorderly collapse". It says we need utility-scale solar PV and associated transmission infrastructure for communities undergoing a transition from coal.

We can learn from success stories and tap our collective goodwill, skills and knowledge, which is what we relied on in the pandemic crisis.

This is a race we're in, whether we like it or not. We must win it, together.

So, come to CQU on Friday to take part in the CQ Climate Change Symposium. I may be busking there, with my guitar, singing The Wailin' Jennys 'One Voice', Shane Howard 'Don't Say OK'.

Walking event to raise critical life saving awareness

Members of the Inner Wheel Club of Rockhampton Sunset Inc. are preparing to walk around the oval adjacent to the Rocky Sports Club for 2km to raise much needed funds to help medical researchers make life saving discoveries using cord blood.

The Sean's Two for Ten Walk is a fundraiser for Inner Wheel Australia's national project, umbilical cord blood research. The aim is for participating Inner Wheel clubs to raise over \$30,000 nationally.

Each year on the advice of medical specialists, Inner Wheel Australia distributes research grants to selected scientists who work with this previously considered 'throwaway' item, cord blood which is now recognised as a very valuable source of stem cells. This blood is being researched for use to treat many health problems including leukaemia, autoimmune disease, cystic fibrosis, spinal cord injury to name a few.

Research grants are also used to investigate the influence of different preparation methods, the optimum condition for volume reduction, transport conditions on stem cells in unprocessed cord blood and more sensitive discriminating of live cells from dead ones of the cord blood,

Recently, a research group at Monash University investigated safely infusing patients hospitalised with Covid-19 with umbilical cord blood derived cells as a potential treatment for severe pneumonia developed from Covid-19.

To date, members of clubs affiliated with Inner Wheel Australia have raised over \$3 million nationally to support umbilical cord

The face of the campaign is Sean, a young Australian boy who at one-year-old was diagnosed with a rare genetic disease called 'Severe Combined Immunodeficiency' and given little chance of survival. It is thanks to stem cells derived from cord blood that he is here today.

Sean entered hospital on March 19, 2012, and underwent a week of aggressive chemotherapy to condition his body for the transplant. On March 27, at 11.26am, he was injected with 30ml of cord blood collected from the umbilical cord of a baby girl born over 15,000 kmsaway. This saved his life. Four

nurses, $10\ \mathrm{minutes}$ and $30\mathrm{ml}$.

Sean is now a healthy, thriving young boy who leads a full and interesting life enjoying swimming, riding his bike and playing chess.



What are those trees?

Last week, I had numerous enquiries about two very different trees growing on footpaths in Rockhampton.

Each tree attractive in its unique way - one with large yellow flower heads and glossy green leaves. And the other has large sausageshaped woody seed pods that hang from the

If you have driven along Wandal Road recently you may have noticed a tree that could be described as one of nature's wonders.

The tree is Kigelia pinnata or the Sausage Tree. This part of the street has an attractive street planting of these trees, which are fruiting at the moment.


The Sausage Tree would be one of the most underutilised canopy shade trees in Central Queensland. A native of Central and Southern Africa grows into one of the more attractive canopy trees, with an expected height in ideal conditions of up to 17 metres, with a straight trunk and a large spreading crown of foliage.

After rain, you can expect one of the most unusual flowers of any of the world's trees.

The flowers appear like hanging clusters of orchid flowers, sometimes 60cm in length. Each individual flower is approximately 10cm across and dark maroon in colour and has a velvety texture.

Unfortunately, they do not have the sweetest of perfume, but they will still attract a lot of birds to the tree. After flowering, large sausageshaped woody fruit develop, and these hanging from long flower stems can give the tree an odd appearance at this time.

The unripe fruit are poisonous, but it has been said that in Africa they have been used as a treatment for rheumatism and as a dressing for tropical ulcers.

It has also been reported that roasted and ground ripe fruit has been used to make a crude beer, although I would not recommend this to any potential homebrewers!

One other interesting fact about this tree is that, due to its fibrous bark, it is a very good host plant for orchids and other epiphytes. In some countries, it has been grown solely for this purpose.

Then around the showgrounds there is a tree with large yellow flower heads and glossy green leaves.

The tree in question is the Xanthostemon chrysanthus or Golden Penda, which is a native rainforest plant of North Queensland.

Xanthostemon is a member of the same family as the Bottlebrushes, Tea Trees and Eucalypts, and seems to grow throughout Central Queensland, with the exception of those places that experience heavy frost.

Xanthostemon chrysanthus is available to the gardening public in several forms.

The tallest specimen is the parent plant, and the original species that has been cultivated in Rockhampton for nearly 20 years.


This form of Golden Penda is proving to be ideal for street planting, especially as it is in full bloom at a time when there is very little colour in the gardens.

A medium growing form known as Expo

Gold was promoted as the theme plant for the 1988 World Expo in Brisbane. It has been successfully grown in Rockhampton since its release and there are a number of attractive specimens in Rockhampton gardens.

A smaller form has been available for the last few years, known as Fairhill Gold. This one is, in my opinion, the best form of the species currently available, as it is suitable for most small gardens and still provides the prolific golden heads of flowers similar to the larger specimens.

If you have a chance this weekend go for a drive and view these trees, and maybe take the time to stop and support some of the local businesses in the area.

Fence funding up

If you can only count on a fair-weather friend during the good times and they run for the hills when things get tough then, I have to admit, we might just be on to something more meaningful with this state government.

Last week, while visiting Barcaldine and Longreach, Premier Palaszczuk delivered on a \$5 million promise made back in June 2020, by announcing that five western regional councils and the Remote Area Planning and Development Board (RAPAD) would share in the funding to build more cluster fencing to keep out wild dogs.

Since 2015, the state government has contributed almost \$25 million through the Queensland Feral Pest Initiative to assist regional communities across Queensland to

construct cluster fences in key sheep growing areas

Nothing 'fair-weather' about that.

In fact, the first stages of that funding became available for fencing at a time the sheep and wool industries were well and truly on their knees.

Between 1991 and 2018, sheep numbers in western Queensland had declined more than 75 per cent from two million to less than 400,000 head.

But the introduction of cluster fencing, in my opinion one of the smartest things I've seen happen in any form of agriculture, has led to the construction of more than 21,000 kilometres of fencing, enclosing roughly 10 million hectares, which when fully stocked will carry up to 8 million sheep.

Such is the industry's and AgForce's confidence that, given favourable seasonal condi-

tions, our aim is to increase sheep numbers to 4 million by 2025.

The benefits of this to regional Queensland will be enormous, including creating additional rural jobs for contract mustering teams, wool shed staff for shearing and crutching, and opportunities to help with on-property sheep husbandry processing and general property maintenance.

It shouldn't go unmentioned that the federal government has also contributed \$14 million towards cluster fencing to keep wild dogs out of sheep growing areas of Queensland.

But it has been the state government's improved commitment to agriculture since the 2020 election, along with its increased willingness to sit down with AgForce and listen to the views of our membership, that has me and many others in industry hopeful that when it comes to working together the sky's the limit.

Produce protection

Queensland apple and pear growers will be able to access \$1.5 million in grants to purchase protective netting.

The funding was announced on May 7 by Minister for Agriculture, Drought and Emergency Management David Littleproud and Queensland Minister for Agricultural Industry Development and Fisheries and Minister for Rural Communities Mark Furner.

"We know that cost is a significant barrier for many horticulturalists to accessing protective netting, even though it can significantly reduce the impact of weather events and pests," Mr Littleproud said.

"These grants will allow apple and pear growers to access 50 per cent of the cost of purchasing and installing protective netting, up to \$150,000."

Minister Furner said that the funding was a welcome investment in Queensland's horticulture industry.

"Around 10 per cent of Australia's apples are produced in Queensland, and the state is home to a diverse horticultural industry," Mr Furner said.

"This funding recognises the importance of horticulture to Queensland's broader agricultural industry.

"I look forward to working with the Australian government and hope we can continue to work together to deliver positive outcomes for Queensland."

Netting delivers productivity boosts by protecting crops from extreme weather and pests.

The program will be implemented by the Queensland Department of Agriculture and Fisheries.

The agreement with Queensland is a part of the 'Horticultural Netting Program - trial' included in the 2019 MY-EFO.

Eligible growers will receive 50 per cent of the cost of purchasing and installing protective netting, up to a maximum of \$150,000.

Queensland produced 10 per cent of Australia's apples and 12 per cent of overall horticultural exports in 2019-2020.

The scheme will begin from May 24 2021 and operate until June 30 2023 or until funds are fully committed. For more information, visit daf.qld.gov.au or phone 13 25 23. Applications will be assessed strictly in order of receipt from May 24 2021

Fog followed by a storm

It is late autumn going into winter, and a minimum of 20.7C in Rocky on Wednesday made it feel like a humid summer morning. There were reports of humidity up to 95 per cent, with visibility ranging from 2000 metres to 5000 metres during the early morning till about 8am. The grass across the region was covered with


The humidity recorded at Williamson was 99 per cent and it lasted till 9am. This meant that the planned burn-off was a slow one during the morning.

Coming back, Fons spotted a cyclist riding the sand dunes (a tough feat) and then went into Bunnings after 1pm. The cumulus cloud was building with rapid vertical assent and a

Alan, near the Berserkers, said he heard "one peel then down she came". After an hour he measured 18mm of rain. Can we call it a 4x2 storm over the area and nothing anywhere else? I asked him why he was keeping it over there. We desperately need rain as our lawns are very dry. The nearest other storm was near Miriam Vale. FORECAST

While the trough remains and if we get 32C Wednesday; then we are a chance of another 4x2 late Wednesday - maybe a couple. Possibly, there will be a line of thundery activity from Kroombit Tops north to Gogango/

Westwood, then north west to Mt Stuart, and maybe Tieri to Emerald/Blackwater along the Drummonds and Springsure.

Looking at the synoptic chart, a front in the western bight heralds a cold southerly. The colder air should reach south western Queensland early Thursday. If this holds back and moisture from any rainfall lingers, we are in for a fog triangle: Ogmore-Rockhampton -Dingo early Thursday. Then the cooler air arrives Friday morning. You can switch the aircon off on Friday with cooler minimums about 8C at Bilo and 12-14C closer to the coast. There are pleasant drier and sunny days to follow. Minimums should get lower around 4-5C out west and sub 10C around the River City and then maybe the coast Sunday. Maximums

will be a comfortable the 25-26C with an AT about 2 degrees cooler. Boaties - there will be light to occasionally moderate winds for the later part of the week that should stay till Saturday. Then by Sunday, the South East Trades hit with 15-20 knot winds and gusts over 25 knots (45-50kmh) with seas over 2 metres. Sea Surface Temperatures have dropped to 23.5C about the Keppels - the coolest so far this year. Isolated squally light coastal showers should develop along the Capricorn Coast Monday and tease the Berserkers. The relatively cooler conditions should continue for most of the week. Longer range, a cloud band develops in the Kimberleys and may affect CO the following weekend.



Naturally all at the Rockhampton Jockey Club were gutted by the abandonment of last Saturday's program after the running of the opening race.

It has been widely reported, but the essence was that a wet patch was discovered at about the 250-metre point in the straight which the stewards ruled as a safety risk.

Regrettably this was not discovered when the track was inspected before the running of the opening race which was run.

It appeared that the wet ground was caused by an irrigation sprinkler fault and when this column was being written the actual cause had not been fully determined.

Experts with the latest technology examined the track section in question on Tuesday and Wednesday.

X-Ray equipment confirmed there were no broken irrigation pipes underneath the



ground in question.

We explored this avenue as it still hadn't dried out fully on Monday so the sprinkler water trail hitting the running rail and then laying on the track became questionable.

Hi-tech camera gear was going to be used to determine if there was a blockage in the underground drainage pipes which could have created the problem.

I'll report back with the outcome in next week's column.

The club conducted barrier trials last Monday with marker hats out so as horses would not gallop anywhere near the problem area in the straight.

These are allowable for trials but definitely not so for races.

Rest assured everything possible is being done to determine the problem.

As a safeguard, I have arranged for the false moveable running rails to be out for the entire distance of the straight for the Rocky Amateurs which will skirt the problem area.

It will not impact field sizes but will act as an insurance policy so as what regrettably occurred last Saturday cannot be repeated.

How good was it to watch Rockhampton's Marway blitz the field in the \$200,000 Wagga Town Plate (1200m) last week?

He absolute brained them and now trainer Mark Newnham has earmarked a possible

return for the Moreton Cup (1200m) at Eagle Farm early next month as the possible next start for Marway.

Marway was our RJC 2019 Horse of the Year and since moving to Newnham's Randwick establishment has won three races in Sydney this year as well as the Wagga Town Plate.

Marway is certainly a great advertisement for Rocky racing.

Barrier trials were conducted at Callaghan Park last Monday and Rocky trainer Jamie Mc-Conachy and, if I may say, my daughter Tahlia certainly had a good morning.
