The average Gladstone resident's rates will increase just 1.7 per cent this year, in line with the Consumer Price Index.

Gladstone Regional Council delivered their 2021-2022 budget on Tuesday, with funding allocated for three key strategic projects - the design of the Boyne Tannum Aquatic Recreation

Gladstone Mayor Matt Burnett said the the low general rates increase was 'fantastic news' on the back of a rates freeze last year.

"We also completed our \$65 million Capital Works program in full last year and we'll be continuing capital works spending this year make sure we create those infrastructure jobs," he said.



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Search for stolen Taser

Detectives from Gladstone CIB are investigating after an unloaded police-issued firearm and Taser (similar to the one pictured) were stolen during an overnight break-in at the Miriam Vale Hotel.

Preliminary investigations indicate that sometime between 6.15pm, June 9, and 8.30am June 10, a locked hotel room was broken into and the unloaded Glock and unloaded Taser were stolen, as well as other personal items.

The ammunition and Taser cartridge, stored separately in the room, were not stolen.

The firearm was located later that day following another detailed search of the hotel premises. The unloaded police Taser has not been located.

Minister for Regional Development and Manufacturing and Member for Gladstone Glenn Butcher said The Skilling Queenslanders for Work program had helped more than 1000 Gladstone locals to gain skills, qualifications and experience to enter and stay in the workforce.

"As a proud mechanical fitter and turner who did my apprenticeship with the Gladstone Power Station, I know how important it is to get a pathway to meaningful employment," Mr Butcher said.

"I'm pleased to report that the program has helped 570 Gladstone locals to gain employment, with a further 173 in further training.

"Queensland's plan for economic recovery, at its heart, is centred around jobs, and this program has a track record in helping people find work.

"A key part of the plan is to continue to invest in training, so Queenslanders have the skills for more jobs in more industries."

The program focusses on young people (including those in and transitioned from out-of-home care), Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, people with disability, mature-age jobseekers, women re-entering the workforce, veterans and ex-service personnel, and people from culturally and lin-

Safety upgrade for a troublesome road

Gladstone Regional Council and the Queensland government are jointly funding a \$500,000 project for safety improvements to Turkey Beach Road.

Turkey Beach Road is a two-way road extending from the intersection with the Bruce Highway (western end) to the boundary of Turkey Beach township (eastern end).

The works have commenced and are expected to be completed by late June.

The project site is located about 1km to the east of Sandy Creek, with approximately 300 metres of existing road set to be widened and resealed, improving the safety performance of this section of Turkey Beach Road.

Gladstone Mayor Matt Burnett said council had previously appointed a design consultant

to undertake a road safety audit for all 21 kilometres of Turkey Beach Road, providing council the data and design information needed to forecast funding for staged works over several years.

"The stretch of road audited was 21km and the safety performance of the existing road varies considerably over this distance," Cr Burnett said.

"These works target a troublesome section of road just to the east of Sandy Creek. Once complete, motorists will notice a new 1m road shoulder either side of the existing road and a full-width reseal of the 300-metre section.

"Wider traffic lanes and shoulders provide motorists with increased opportunity for safe recovery when their vehicles veer off the road,

while also providing improved sight distance at horizontal curves."

Transport and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey said the Queensland Government's Transport Infrastructure Development Scheme provided an important source of funding to support local road projects.

"This scheme provides \$70 million a year to councils across the state and allows us to partner with local governments to deliver important road upgrades for local communities," Mr Bailey said.

"Hundreds of road upgrades and safety improvements have been delivered under this partnership model, so I'm pleased the Turkey Beach community is among the next in Queensland to benefit from this funding."

Bonanza budget delivered

Capital works and key strategic projects are a key part of Gladstone Regional Council's 2021-2022 budget, delivered this week.

Gladstone Mayor Matt Burnett said this year's budget was focused on community needs and economic stability.

He said the average ratepayer's general rates would increase in line with the current Consumer Price Index (CPI, Brisbane) of 1.7 per cent.

"This is fantastic news considering that's on the back of a rates freeze last year," he said.

"We also completed our \$65 million Capital Works program in full last year and we'll be continuing capital works spending this year make sure we create those infrastructure jobs.

"This budget will fund capital projects at a total of \$73.4 million, with pleasing support of both state and federal governments to the value of \$16.7m

"This demonstrates the effectiveness of council's strategy to seek specific funding for our capital projects, so we can continue to improve our region's infrastructure through external funding, not ratepayer dollars."

Key capital projects to be funded this financial year include:

- \$2m Sewerage Mains replacement to Gladstone Waste Water Treatment Plant
- \$1.4m Bridge Replacements Gorge Road and John Clifford Way near Lowmead
- \$1.12m Benaraby Landfill Cell 2 capping
- \$1m Toolooa Street Pavement and Footpath Renewal

• \$900,000 - For road improvements along Coast Road, Baffle Creek.

These projects will have funding input via the state government Works for Queensland program.

Some of our capital works will be tendered out and that will create jobs in the community and I've got a great team of councillors that try to support our local businesses wherever they possibly can," Cr Burnett said.

"Locals know they have a pretty good chance of getting a tender, although a lot of the works will be done in house by our staff, which is fantastic as well.

"Gladstone regional council has \$2.5 billion dollars in assets, that's infrastructure in the ground, but the biggest asset we have is our staff.'

Funds have also been allocated to continue with three other key strategic projects - the design of the Boyne Tannum Aquatic Recreation Centre, the Gladstone Coal Exporters Sports Complex (Marley Brown Oval) and the Bovne Burnett Inland Rail Trail.

"About \$400,000 has been allocated to continue development of the Boyne Tannum Aquatic Recreation Centre project. With a site chosen in Coronation Drive, the next stage is to go into detailed design.

'This project really needs financial support from the state or federal government to happen, but we're going ahead with it regardless."

Cr Burnett said the council would continue to focus on planning and advocating for the future.

"To do this, we will fund three key strategic

activities to position our region to capitalise on the emerging energy sectors, and make sure we continue to leverage our connection to the world through the Gladstone Port," he said.

'We know we're the energy capital of Australia, we've got coal fired power stations, we've got LNG, biofuels and we're moving into renewables.

"There's funding in there to work with our partners for a hydrogen ecosystem here in Gladstone, we're going to build that hydrogen ecosystem with our partners, as well as traditional owners and the university.

"Everyone has a seat at the table when it comes comes to bringing the massive industry of renewables and hydrogen to Central Oueensland.

The Premier announced a \$2 billion fund for renewables, hydrogen and manufacturing in Townsville last week and we're going to get a piece of that pie.

He said the holistic planning of the region's road networks would help connect beef producers to the world and assist with advocating and planning to link council's road network to support other transport enhancements such as the Melbourne to Gladstone Inland Rail.

Cr Burnett said 6000 properties would actually receive a rates decrease this year.

While the total average general rate will increase by CPI, the impact on each ratepayer will be different, depending on many factors, one of which is the land valuations issued by the Valuer General in March this year," he said.

"An increase or reduction in your land valuation does not necessarily result in an increase or reduction in the cost to providing our services.

"The maximum any ratepayer's rates will go up is 10 per cent, that's why we have the cap there, so there's no shock to the system. So even if your valuation went up significantly and your neighbour's went down significantly it won't go up more than 10 per cent.

Cr Burnett said rates concessions were available, including for pensioners and for homeowners with a concealed water leak.

"Hardship arrangements are available if you're having difficulty, just speak to our finance team and they can help. There are options to pay in advance and arrears - daily, weekly, monthly, quarterly, the option is up to the ratepayer," he said.

'But if you want to get into a payment plan, you need to do that before the cut-off period, which is 60 days."

'You can see big changes in a child's reading abilities, hopefully I can encourage others to help their community," she said.



Northern agenda report

An extensive cross-party report into the federal government's Northern Australia (NA) agenda has concluded that its record of achievement over the last six years is mixed.

The general aim of the agenda, established with the release of the 'Our North, Our Future White Paper on Developing Northern Australia' in June 2015, is to uplift the economic and social development of the northern half of the continent through strategic investments in infrastructure and developing a more welcoming investment climate.

Though a set of desired outcomes, for example fostering business links with Indonesia, Papua New Guinea and Timor-Leste and bolstering tropical health research capacity, have been delivered since 2015, the report states: "the delivery of many elements of the White Paper - particularly regarding the improvement of infrastructure - is based on the announcement of improvement and commitment of funding, as opposed to the actual works being complete and resulting in tangible outcomes."

The centrepiece of the agenda is the Northern Australia Infrastructure Facility (NAIF), a \$5 billion dollar financing body geared towards stimulating investment and economic development across NA. The boundary zone of the NAIF includes Rockhampton and Gladstone at its southern and eastern tip.

A key critique of the NAIF's effectiveness has been the slow rollout of loans.

Queensland Labor Senator Murray Watt, the chair of the Senate select committee that produced the report, said the NAIF hadn't met expectations in the first five years of its existence.

"The government announced the NAIF would rollout \$5 billion in five years - it only delivered 6 per cent. Frankly, that doesn't cut it," Senator Watt said in a statement released to CQ Today.

Senator Watt's 6 per cent claim emanates from a particular interpretation of the distribution process of funding and the definitional terms surrounding this process.

Though only \$314 million has been drawn directly, or some 6 per cent of \$5 billion, a recent Senate estimates hearing with NAIF CEO Chris Wade revealed that \$2.8 billion in financing commitments have been made to various projects across the NAIF zone.

From that \$2.8 billion, some \$1.3 billion in contracts have been closed. According to Mr Wade, contractual close is a key point of economic enablement in which design and construction happens and jobs are created.

Within Central Queensland, the NAIF has

helped to finance a beef-processing facility in Clermont and provided a \$76 million loan to Central Queensland University.

Nonetheless, the government has acknowledged that the NAIF has been excessively slow and risk-averse in its lending arrangements and has introduced reforms to expand eligibility and speed-up funding distribution.

The NAIF has also been extended for another five years.

"The government assures us that these changes are what needs to happen, and we'll be watching like a hawk to make sure they finally deliver to our north," Senator Watt said.

In addition to addressing problems connected to the NAIF, the report details the wide range of social, health and economic issues confronting communities across NA and offers a series of recommendations to guide development moving forward.

An issue of concern engulfing the Rockhampton region is the severe lack of housing stock and the negative flow-on effects that come from this.

Recommendation 16 from the report addresses the issue directly, reading:

"The committee recommends that the Australian, State and Territory Governments increase investment in social housing in Northern Australia, in recognition of the lack of housing affordability in the region, its impact on social disadvantage and its effect on the recruitment and retention of skilled workers in the region."

Cheryl Russell, the Coordinator for Central Queensland Housing and Homelessness with the St Vincent de Paul Society, told CQ Today in April that the region's rental crisis was now the chief factor propelling people into homelessness.

"Before this, it would have been probably mental health and drug and alcohol abuse. But now, it is the rental crisis. We're having a lot of transient people, who drive their cars from one place to another and then find themselves in a spot and they've got nowhere to go. That has been a definite increase since at least September or October last year," she said.

The issue of housing affordability isn't limited to Rockhampton.

"The Senate inquiry heard serious concerns about housing affordability and availability from across the region," Senator Watt said.

"That's why the final report recommended increased investment in social housing in Northern Australia by the federal, state and territory governments. Locals are being priced out and skilled workers can't relocate to Central Queensland if there's no houses to live in. Social housing has been neglected for many years by the federal government and that has got to stop."

The Gladstone woman joined the PCYC initiative three and a half years ago, where she is involved in various aspects of the course including onboarding, volunteering, scheduling, social work and job search efforts.

A very important part of their adolescent

Students are encouraged to have driven about 10 hours on the road before taking part in the course, while volunteers are trained before leading them in their skill development.

"I want the program to grow as much as it can, I want to help as many people as I can," she said.

What started as a job preparation program in Toowoomba under 10 years ago, it originally aimed to upskill the younger generation for their future job endeavours before it spread its presence to Gladstone.

The program currently helps over two dozen participants while over 30 people remain on the waiting list.

Hearse gets to a century

Mount Morgan Historical Museum volunteers celebrated the birthday of one of their star attractions on the weekend, with the museum's famous hearse turning 100.

The cake cutting ceremony on Saturday was attended by Rockhampton councillor El-len Smith and Paul Tucker from Tucker & Nankivell Funeral Directors

Volunteer Robyn Marshall said the 1921 Buick - the first motor hearse in Mount Morgan - was donated to the museum in the 1960s by the Tucker family.

(Museum coordinator and treasurer) Gwenny Scott's grandmother was the last person to use the hearse in 1961," Robyn said.

"Everyone who visits the museum seems impressed by it - they're amazed by its age and its beautiful etched glass. The hearse actually still runs, at age 100.

Robyn said Mount Morgan residents and visitors could support the museum through donations, word of mouth and simply by visiting.

"I've never heard a bad comment from any of the victors here, most of them write in the guest book and it's always nice comments.

"This is the building that houses the town's memories. We can get about 50 visitors on a good day and are open seven days a week, almost 365 days of the year."

Displays the museum include mining equipment, historic household and business objects, and an extensive photographic display, as well as collection of horse-drawn buggies and wagons, including the hearse and a 1942 International Fire Engine.

The museum has been housed at the same location in Morgan St since 1984, although its original location was around the corner in East St.

Admission is adults \$6, students and pensioners \$4 and children \$2.

It's believed the two men knew each other.


Church Park shade shelter is sure to prove popular

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Professor's AM honour

Emeritus Professor Debbie Clayton can add another accomplishment to her long list of achievements, having made this year's Queen's birthday Honours List.

On Monday, Ms Clayton was named a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) for significant service to tertiary education and to international study programs.

The Yeppoon woman she was "very proud and privileged" to receive the honour and was happy to share the good news after keeping her nomination secret for months.

"I've had a lifelong commitment to the quality of education, both Australian and offshore," she said.

"I've worked in the university sector, including at Central Queensland University, I've worked for government, I've worked for onshore and and offshore governments and I've been a consultant, but the one constant I've found is the power of education and how transformative education can be.³

She said the Queen's Birthday honour wasn't just a reflection of her work alone.

"In my long career and I've found it's not just about you, it's about the teams that you've worked with," she said.

"This is a recognition of the commitment and quality of those teams to deliver that education as well."

An international expert, Ms Clayton is an registered honorary auditor and contributor to government agencies in Oman in the Gulf States, Hong Kong and New Zealand and Papua New Guinea.

"As general manager for Education Queensland International (from 2007), I was involved in study programs both in and out of Australia, but we were also doing projects to capacity build in countries like Qatar," she said.

"For the last 13 to 14 years I've consulted and that's professionally been the richest time in my life, because I've had many university clients in Australia but also with offshore agencies.

Ms Clayton said improved access to education made a big difference to people's lives.

"Education is really transformative no matter where you are, whether you're in Australia or in a developing country.

"In my 14-year association with Oman I've seen first-hand the difference education can make. Before Covid I travelled there each year and in 2009 I lived in country for five months,' she said.

"In the early 1970s, Oman had two primary schools for boys only and no university sector. Now there's something like 52 higher education providers which are quality assured through the government agency that I work for there, and it's been a great privilege.'

In Oman, girls now have access to education - a stark contrast to 50 years earlier.

"Girls from Oman are sent to Australia and England on scholarships and the Minister for Education that I worked with in Oman was a woman. That's very enlightened, very transformative

"Oman is a sultanate and the previous sultan realised that through health and education you can transform people's lives."

Ms Clayton said while international education was 'in the press at the moment' thanks to Covid shutting borders, the media tended to focus on the 'money side of things' rather than the benefits it brought.

international education was Australia's third largest export industry after coal and iron ore," she said.

"But the the importance of international education - and Australia punches above its weight there - is in international diplomacy.

"These people (diplomats) quite often are educated in Australia and have networks and linkages here and will go back to their countries like Malaysia, Fiji and PNG and become leaders where they maintain that relationship with Australia. You cannot underestimate that."

The other benefit from international education is the development of 'cultural competencies' for overseas students and Australian youth.

"I'm involved in the board of trustees at Rockhampton Grammar School and each year until Covid we would send a group to Vietnam where they would become involved in a community project," she said.

Among her many other responsibilities, Ms Clayton recently became a member of the philanthropy board for the Rockhampton Museum of Art and travelled to the Northern Territory where she walked part of the Larapinta Trail.

Ms Clayton said it was important for young women to value education, seize opportunities and be prepared to take some risks.

"In my career I've been very privileged in having great mentors but it's also very important that when an opportunity presents itself that you take it," she said.

"It doesn't mean that you 'elbow your way in', it just means having the confidence to take an opportunity.

"That's a really clear message to young women, and it doesn't mean that you can't be married or have family or that you can't live in a regional area."

Ms Clayton said she enjoyed the great living environment on the Capricorn Coast and had always been passionate about the regions and contributing to her home in CQ.

"Yesterday I was engaging with my colleagues in Brisbane because I chair the accreditation committee that looks after medical accreditation.

Family free but not home

Biloela's Tamil family have been reunited in Perth but Banana Shire Mayor Nev Ferrier says the community won't stop fighting to get them home.

After more than 18 months on Christmas Island, the Murugappan family will move into community detention while they pursue legal action to allow them to stay in the country permanently.

Priya Murugappan has been at the bedside of daughter Tharnicaa, 3, while she recovers from a blood infection, with father Nades and five-year-old sister Kopika joining the pair in the Western Australian capital yesterday.

Cr Ferrier said he was happy to see Priya and Nades and their family released from offshore detention, but would prefer for them to return home.

"I'd like to see them come back to Biloela while this is going on," he said.

"The community won't stop fighting to get them home."

The Murugappan family were forced to leave Biloela in 2018 when their visa claim was rejected and had been in offshore detention ever since.

Protests have been held around the country in recent days condemning the government's treatment of the family, but Immigration Minister Alex Hawke has emphasised the community detention arrangement "does not create a pathway to a visa".

Royal Australian College of General Practi-

tioners president Dr Karen Price has expressed concerns about the mental health of the family.

"Ask any GP and they will tell you that the detention of children and prolonged detention of adults has been shown to cause a range of adverse long-term physical, psychological and developmental effects," she said.

"The welfare of these family members must be front of mind. At the RACGP, we believe that detention of vulnerable groups such as children, pregnant women and survivors of torture and trauma should be avoided, and for others it should be strictly for the minimum time possible."

World Vision Australia CEO Daniel Wordsworth appealed to authorities to show some compassion and let the family return to their home of Biloela while the merits of their case was decided.

"These girls - Australian-born girls - have been denied the chance to be with friends, access to education and the healthy normality of a conventional community," he said.

Mr Wordsworth urged for the situation to be resolved urgently in the best interests of the children's welfare.

"The sooner these girls can experience a normal childhood environment and start to rebuild their lives, the better," he said.

The family will live in government housing in Perth's suburbs where they will be monitored but free to move around while Tharnicaa undergoes treatment.


Two weeks ago, primary industry expert Terrence McCosker received an exciting email which revealed he had been awarded an Order of Australia honour.

In a long list of Queen's Birthday Honours, the Yeppoon man who founded Resource Consulting Services in 1985 has been recognised for his contribution to the agricultural industry over three decades with farmers, Mr McCosker said the real heroes within his field were the property owners who worked on the land to keep it sustainable.

"It's about working as a team for the greater good," he said. Meanwhile, Mr McCosker reflected on his fruitful career which has seen him fulfil plenty of tasks in various capacities.

He served as Beef Australia's president of the management committee in 1997 and

CQ waste company fined

A Central Queensland demolition and waste removal company has been fined \$53,000 in the Rockhampton Magistrates Court for unauthorised disposal of waste on a cattle property at Port Curtis.

Additionally, the company was also ordered to pay legal costs of \$1500 and investigation costs of \$1294.13.

In 2019, the company made an agreement with a man, whose uncle owned a grazing property, to dispose of general waste on the property and, in return, would build a large safety mound for cattle.

Between late April and mid December 2019, the company had taken waste from its business to the aforementioned property where they dug holes and filled them with the waste.

In return, the company built a safety mound for cattle to avoid flooding of lower ground.

Neither the man nor the demolition and waste removal company were given the green light to undertake their activities during this period.

Both the man and the company were charged with carrying out an environmentally relevant activity without an environmental authority, under the Environmental Protection Act 1994.

In Rockhampton Magistrates Court on April 27 this year, the man was fined \$10,000 and ordered to pay legal costs of \$1500 and investigation costs of \$1453. However, no conviction was recorded.

With 4700m² floor area on three stories, the Rockhampton Museum of Art should have room for everyone.

But one Rockhampton arts group fears they've been left out.

Replacing the current Rockhampton Art Gallery next to the Pilbeam Theatre, the new museum being constructed at 212 and 214 Quay Street is intended to make the region's art collection more accessible to the community through expanded gallery spaces.

It will also provide opportunities to show touring exhibitions, and offer spaces for education and community engagement.

Australian Decorative and Fine Arts Society president Bernadette Hunt said while the new museum was 'absolutely' good news for local art lovers, she hoped it would include a space where lectures could be held.

"ADFAS's guest lecturer last month was Sally Butler who came up from Sydney to give a lecture on indigenous art," she said.

"Ms Hunt asked if the new gallery - because it's being built with public money - would include a space, properly equipped, where lectures could be held.

"Not just for us but groups like Alliance Francaise. I'm sure there are groups in Rockhampton and the nearby region that could certainly use such premises

"This is a woman that's travelled widely around Australia and she said people tend to forget that museums and art galleries are public spaces.

"If they have a room sufficiently big enough with audio equipment included that people could tap into, why not use these as it'll bring people into the gallery and museum?" Ms Hunt said.

Rockhampton Mayor Tony Williams said the new gallery's education wing would be

multipurpose with one room converting into three spaces.

"Each space has its own AV projector and seating to suit between 20 to 23 people, with a total capacity of 65," he said.

"The space is designed to be used for a range of different activities, everything from

messy painting classes to board meetings and presentations.

"We hope that we can facilitate all sorts of enquiries once the Rockhampton Museum of Art opens."

The official opening of the museum is expected to be in 2022.

Keppel schools are in a \$29m class of their own

Schools in the Keppel electorate are enjoying world-class facilities thanks to a \$29 million injection of state government funds over the past five years.

The Member for Keppel and Assistant Education Minister Brittany Lauga said since she was elected in 2015 Keppel schools had been given new classrooms, halls, covered student areas, tuckshops, manual arts blocks, road safety access areas and, in Parkhurst, a new \$8.57 million block of classrooms.

Biloela family case needs to weigh up what's equitable

When Shakespeare wrote the Merchant of Venice, England had separate courts for the administration of the law and equity. The

court of law judged matters on the basis of the 'common law' or precedent of England. The Court of Equity (or Chancery) made decisions when the strict application of the common law would lead to harshness or inequity.

Shylock, a moneylender in the Merchant of Venice, demanded the strict application of the law, "to have the due and forfeit of my bond", in his demand for a pound of flesh, when Antonio couldn't repay a loan. Antonio's wife, Portia, pleaded for mercy against the strict application of the law, saying in a famous speech, that mercy "blesseth him that gives and him that takes".

The tension between the law and mercy lies at the heart of different views on how to respond to the Murugappan family. The father and mother of the family arrived illegally in Australia by boat from Sri Lanka in 2012 and 2013 respectively. While on temporary visas,

The law on their case is clear. The father has had four cases heard in our courts and the mother three. Every one of these cases has upheld the decision, originally made by the former Labor Government, that the Murugappans are not refugees. Under Australian law those that arrive here illegally by boat, and are not refugees, are returned to their home country.

The Australian government has returned over 1000 Sri Lankans who arrived here by boat while the former Labor Government lost control of our borders.

There are no reports of persecution of those who have returned. While there were reports of human rights abuses against Tamils - a Sri Lankan ethnic group - during a civil war, that war ended in 2009. While Nades Murugappan claimed to have links to the opposition group

from overseas, and had been able to pass through security at the airport on each occasion. In regards to the family as a whole, the IAA ruled that "given the passage of time and change in country circumstances, the applicant would not ... be of interest to the Sri Lankan authorities".

Notwithstanding the clear legal facts, there are some who suggest we should show mercy and let this family return to Biloela. That is an understandable view given the nearly 10 years this case has dragged on, and the two children who have been born in Australia. It is reasonable to weigh up these 'equity' issues rather than just rely on a strict interpretation of the law.

However, on an equity basis it is hard to see how allowing this family to stay would be equitable to the over 1000 Sri Lankans who have been sent home. Those people probably would necessitate special treatment?

The only thing that is different is their willingness to engage in lengthy legal action, and the resulting media scrutiny around that. Media hype seems a flimsy reason to make a special arrangement for this family compared to others. Worse it would encourage others to engage in protracted lawfare that puts their families in limbo, and only enriches those in our legal system.

The court rules in favour of Shylock in the Merchant of Venice at first but he then fails to extract his pound of flesh because he can only do so if he takes it without a "jot of blood". It is right that we uphold our English legal tradition of weighing up what is equitable, not just what is legal. In this case though equal treatment would mean the return of the Murragappan family to Sri Lanka just as many others have been required to do so.

Last week, Senator Matt Canavan and I joined with representatives from Rockhampton Regional Council, Livingstone Shire Council, Advance Rockhampton, Regional Development Australia Central and Western Queensland, Capricorn Enterprise, and Capricornia Chamber of Commerce as part of a working group to prepare a proposal to move the Enoggera Armoured Cavalry Unit to Rockhampton.

The meeting was the first of its kind, bringing together local stakeholders to prepare a pitch to the Department of Defence to bring the armoured cavalry to Rockhampton. At the moment, it costs \$6 million a year to transport armoured cavalry units from Enoggera in Brisbane to Rockhampton for training exercises every year.

Through Senator Canavan's questioning in Senate Estimates, Defence has indicated they are open to relocating the unit if proposals stack up.

We have no permanent military presence in Central Queensland despite having Shoalwater Bay Training Area in the region - arguably one of the best training areas in the southern hemisphere.

Before Covid-19, the region typically welcomed the United States military and the Singaporean Armed Forces every year. With the virus causing domestic and international borders to slam shut, the local region is not seeing the economic boost that comes with international visitors.

The training area expansion is going full

steam ahead and local businesses have benefitted greatly from winning work packages. Just last month, myself and Minister for Defence Peter Dutton announced a further \$53 million in additional contracts which were awarded to local businesses.

These latest contracts bring the total number of works packages already awarded through the SWBTA Facilities Project to 65, with a combined value of more than \$211 million. Local subcontractors have already shared in \$157 million of contracts, with about 108 packages still to be awarded over the next three years. Clearly this level of investment from the Morrison government is a significant win for local businesses and will support local jobs.

I encourage any interested local businesses in the region to access the ASMTI's online modules and put their best foot forward to compete for upcoming opportunities.

The expansion of Shoalwater Bay Training Area is expected to conclude in 2024. We need to look ahead, plan for the future and explore opportunities to set up the region for future growth.

The meeting was a very productive and constructive session and this working group of key local stakeholders are all on the same page of what we want to achieve for the region.

Rest assured, we will be working very hard to put our best foot forward and prove the region's suitability for a permanent military presence.

Tariff savings aren't worth it

I see where the electricity costs for Ergon Energy's regional Queenslanders effective from July 1, 2021, were released on Friday June 11 by the QCA after being approved by the Palaszc-zuk government.

For residential customers on tariff 11 with median usage of 4200 kWh's (kilowatt hours) a year, they will save about \$101 a year or a lowly 28 cents a day.

And Ergon's customers on tariff 31 and 33 will have their hot water costs reduced by approximately \$26 and \$21 a year respectively, or about a miserable 7 cents and 6 cents a day.

Now on a daily cost saving basis for Ergon's customers, one would have to agree that these electricity cost savings are quite low, and we are told that the savings are mainly a result of a projected reduction in wholesale energy purchases.

We must also take into account the UTP (Uniform Tariff Policy) and the CSO (Community Service Obligation) subsidy where the Queensland government contributes around 'half a billion dollars' each year of taxpayers money to Ergon Energy so as to make these electricity charges possible and in line with customer charges in South East Queensland.

Once again this year we are reminded that the electricity costs we are billed, are in many instances actually less than the cost of supplying electricity to customers. And we are told that this is mainly due to our low density customer base as well as our lengthy distribution network here in regional Queensland.

I should mention that our many struggling small businesses on tariff 20 with median usage of around 6440 kWh a year will save about \$79 a year or a hardly worth a mention of a lousy 22 cents a day!

Wide variety of Cuckoos to discover

One of the birds that has always been a mystery to many people is the Cuckoo. Only recently, the name 'Cuckoo' came up in a conversation.

One comment I heard was, 'Isn't that the one that lays its egg in another bird's nest?'

This may have been a miscomprehension, where the person thinks that the cuckoo is just one bird, whereas there are many different cuckoos in that family. Around the world there would be over 100 different types of Cuckoos while in Australia, including the Koels and Coucal, there are 13.

Apart from the Coucal, which builds its own nest and lays its own eggs, all the other members seek out the nest of other species, lay their egg in that nest then leave the unsus-



pecting host to raise the hatchling.

The Little Bronze Cuckoo (pictured) is found along the northern and east coast into NSW. Being roughly the smallest in size at about 16cm in length, it resembles about six of the other Cuckoos, most having bars across the chest. However, a feature that distinguishes the male from the others is that he is the only one with the red ring around the eye.

This little fellow was foraging in some nearby trees and shrubs when some movement caught my attention. We were sitting having morning tea outside on a verandah with friends.

Although we were chatting and not really observing the surroundings, he showed no sign of being concerned at us being so close which gave me time to take my camera out of the bag, focus and follow him through the lens.

The Little Bronze Cuckoo is roughly the smallest Cuckoo in size at about 16cm in length.





St Peter's becomes newest 'Recycling Hero' school

St Peter's Catholic Primary School has become the newest member of the region's growing legion of Recycling Hero schools fighting for a zero waste future.

Rockhampton Regional Council's waste and recycling Councillor Shane Latcham said it was a privilege to congratulate the school on their hero status at assembly on Tuesday.

"I can see the hard work that students and staff have been putting in over the past few months and the results have been phenomenal," Cr Latcham said.

"Since March the school has introduced a number of fantastic initiatives, from student monitored bin stations at lunch time and collection points for soft plastics and 10c containers to composting and mulching.

"Recently we worked with the students to do a waste audit and check in on their process, and found that the school had been incredibly successful in diverting recyclables and other resources from general waste. Their total general waste generated over a three-day period has reduced from 80kg to 16.4kg which is an incredible effort.



"Students have been hands on at every stage of the process. They have driven the change and they can prove the difference it has made.'

St Peter's Principal Anthony Greene said it was great to see how enthusiastic the students are in implementing change.

"This is a fantastic program to be part of and I am very proud of what we've achieved since we introduced it earlier this year," Mr Greene said.

"Not only is this a valuable investment in our school, because it saves us money in Kelly Smith, Councillor Shane Latcham, Cassy Tsoultzias, and Councillor Drew Wickerson pictured with the students. waste services, it's also an incredible investment in our environment and in our students.

"It's wonderful for the students to learn that they can really make a difference."

Cr Latcham said there were six schools across the region working with Rockhampton Region Waste & Recycling (RRWR) to achieve hero status.

"The Recycling Hero School model was

created by officers at RRWR, and is unique to our region," said Cr Latcham.

"This isn't just a one-off session, it's a title that a school earns through the delivery of a full education program involving a series of lessons and hands-on activities that can be linked to the national curriculum for a number of subjects and year levels.

"The school will demonstrate ongoing education and perform regular audits to keep their title - which means we can really measure the long term impact the program is having.

"This initiative is part of council's broader Waste Strategy, which outlines our plan to achieve zero waste by 2050, one important element of this strategy is to ensure our kids are approaching waste responsibly now, and taking those good habits home to their families."

From the 1st place photos, the judges then chose the Champion photos for the Sub-Junior, Junior and Public sections:





Shooters spooked by 'UFO' sighting at Royles in 1980s

This week CQ Today continues looking at cattleman Sir Graham McCamley's recollections from his book, Roads in the Sky.

In our 23rd excerpt, we look back at a case of mistaken identity at Royles.

Frank Titmus was one of Graham's head stockmen. He was there from 1986 through 1989 at Tartus. He recalled an unusual night in 1987.

"Graham and I were coming back from Ron Moon's property Fairview, near Dingo, in the helicopter in 1987. We'd had to load several decks of cattle and did not leave Fairview until after dark - about 7pm.

"As there was no GPS in those days, Graham was navigating on a course to intercept the river 10 miles south of Tartrus, then follow the river home.

"As we got to Royles, just south of Tartrus, we saw car lights in a 3000-acre cultivation area; they were following a fence on the northern side of the cultivation.

"The previous evening Graham had received a phone call from a pig shooter wanting permission to use a private road through Tartrus and Royals. Graham had told him he didn't want any pig shooters driving through his country.

"Graham had assumed the trespassers were pig shooters, so he cut off all the lights on the helicopter except for the dim light over the instruments and flew in behind the travelling vehicle.



"Then, as we came in to land in front of the vehicle, Graham switched all the lights back on, including the red rotating beacon, the landing light and the red light on the port side and the yellow one on the starboard side. As we landed, a great cloud of dust came up.

"While Graham secured the helicopter, I hopped out to go over to the driver of the vehicle, who was in shock. Graham followed closely behind.

"As the helicopter was still idling, the dust was still rising and the shooters were convinced we were a UFO. It was only after we started to talk to them that they realised we were human.

"Graham told them never to come through his properties again and was assured they would not be back. Obviously the story was well spread through the pig shooting community, as we didn't have any further trouble for quite some time."

Property settlement in family law cases explained

An application for property settlement can be made immediately following separation and it is not necessary to wait until divorce.

However, once a divorce has been obtained the application for property must be made within 12 months of the date of the decree absolute (a month after the divorce hearing). If the application is not lodged within that time, a person must prove to the court that there are special circumstances which allow the application to be made late.

When a marriage or de facto relationship breaks down, superannuation can be divided between the parties.

For the purposes of a family law property settlement, super is considered to be property and can be transferred between spouses' funds as part of a property settlement.

One of the first steps taken in property settlements is to identify the property of both parties available for division. Naturally, this includes the parties' current assets and liabilities, but also includes any super that they may have.

As you are probably aware, you cannot usually access your super until you reach retirement age.

In the context of a family law property settlement, super can be transferred between spouses as part of a property settlement, which has been formalised in a way that the court recognises. This is referred to as a super split.

However, a super split to a former spouse or de-facto partner does not mean that the party receiving the benefit of a super split will receive that transfer as immediate cash. It will simply be transferred as super into their nominated fund.



the funds will be identical to the rights they had before the super split.

In order for super to be divided between spouses, there a few requirements that need to be met. These steps put simply, are:

1. You will need to obtain a valuation of the person's super interest you intend to divide.

- 2. You will need to document the proposed division. Super can be divided by way of an Order of the Family Law Courts (including orders made by consent) or by way of a Superannuation Agreement. A Superannuation Agreement cannot be entered into without both parties having first received independent legal advice.
- 3. Once the proposed Order or Agreement has been drafted, a copy of the document will need to be sent to the relevant super fund. The super fund can require changes to the wording to ensure that the division is able to occur, pursuant to the particular rules governing the relevant fund.

4. Once the order has been approved or made by the court, or in the case of a Superannuation Agreement signed by the parties and their legal representatives, a copy of the Order or Agreement will then need to be served on the fund or the fund administrator so that the administrative process of a super division can occur.

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



Zygo shines at our shows

Did you have a chance to visit the horticultural pavilions at our one of Central Queensland's agricultural shows?

Of all the plants that were on display this year, one that caught the eye of many of the visitors to the pavilion was the Zygocactus.

Most of our region's shows this year had many healthy flowering specimens of this plant in full bloom.

The Zygocactus, or as it should be correctly known as Schlumbergera, has been a popular bush house plant in Central Queensland for more than 60 years.

A visit to any of our regional shows this year revealed many healthy flowering specimens in the horticultural pavilions.

The Zygocactus is also known by the common names, Christmas Cactus or Crab Cactus.

The shorter days and longer nights during June and July act as a trigger for Zygocactus to flower.

The blooms of this cascading plant can brighten ever the dullest winter day.

When it comes to flower colour, Zygocactuses are available in just about every shade imaginable, from the traditional pale lilacs and pinks, to bright shades of oranges and reds, and just about every colour in between, including bicoloured varieties.

Many of the new hybrid varieties now available will flower all year round.

Just after these plants stop flowering, there is a resting period for a few weeks, where it is extremely important that the plant does not receive too much water.

By the time spring arrives, the plant will start to regrow, and this is the best time to fertilise and repot.

During summer, they should be watered regularly and protected from direct sunlight. At the end of summer, the plant should be positioned in an area of good light, to guarantee plenty of well-shaped blooms during the winter season. For plants in hanging baskets, it is also important to occasionally turn the baskets around to enable even growth around the basket.

The Zygocactus originates from Brazil, where they grow as epiphytes, the horticultural equivalent of an animal tick, on many of the rainforest trees, or even on stony ledges found in an area of the Organ Mountains, surrounding Rio De Janeiro. First commercially cultivated in Europe, their winter flowering gave them one of their common names. That name was the Christmas Cactus, due to their heavy flowering during the Christmas season. The other common name of Crab Cactus refers to the flattened, jointed stems that resemble a crabs claw.

Zygocactus are generally easy to grow, and make an ideal basket plant, with its arching pendent stems cascading over the edge of the

hanging basket, and a multitude of flowers, each appearing on the ends of the stems. Many enthusiasts will suggest that the more rootbound the plant is, the better the flowering, but it is also important to ensure the roots don't block any of the drainage hole in the container as this will cause the pot to fill up with water and drowning the plant. A tell-tale sign is the plant appearing limp and discoloured.

PLANT NOW

Winter is not an ideal time for planting but

there is still a range of annuals, vegetables and herbs that can be planted now, thanks to our mild winters:

- Annuals Alyssum, Amaranthus, Begonia, Cosmos, Celosia, Dianthus, Gomphrena, Marigold, Petunia, Phlox, Portulaca, Salvia, Statice, Sunflower, Torenia & Zinnia
- Vegetables and Herbs: Beetroot, broccoli, cabbage, carrot, cauliflower, french beans, garlic, kohl rabi, leeks, lettuce, onions, peas, pumpkin, radish, shallots, spring onion, sil-

ver beet, squash, sweet potato, tomatoes and all herbs (if frost-free).

Be guided by your local nursery regarding other varieties that may be able to be planted now.

WINTER REMINDER

Now that the cold weather has arrived, avoid heavy watering in shady spots on your lawn as this will increase the prevalence of a fungus attack like Dollar Spot in your grass.

Time to spray water bias

I never thought I would use the words 'water' and 'discrimination' in the same sentence.

Yet here I am, stating - not suggesting - stating, that discrimination is alive and well when it comes to water use for farmers.

Water is obviously critical to agriculture. You could argue nothing is more vital to its success, no matter whether you produce livestock, grains or veggies.

Yet the state government, through its policies, has established what is essentially a first and second-class system for water use for farmers

If you're a Burdekin cane farmer, for example, you receive a 15 per cent rebate on the water you use for irrigation, as does every producer who belongs to a regional water supply scheme.

But if you grow fruit, vegetables, or nuts, 15 suddenly becomes 50.

That's because horticulture farmers in Queensland receive a whopping additional 35 per cent rebate, an incentive the government tells us "helps that industry secure skilled and willing workers".

But isn't this an example of blatant bias?

Wouldn't ALL producers benefit from a 50 per cent reduction in their water prices - not only those who grow fruit, veggies, and nuts?

AgForce recognises the government's efforts to put downward pressure on the price of water - a promise they ran on in the 2020 state election - but try telling cane farmers in the Burdekin they don't need the same assistance from this government as horticulture farmers.

And try telling grain and cane producers who have suffered through years of drought they would get more support if they grew bananas!

AgForce has and will continue lobbving the Minister for Water Glenn Butcher directly for the removal of a two-tiered system in favour of one that benefits all water users to the tune of 50 per cent because they all contribute to positive employment and better economic outcomes for rural and regional Queensland.

Season ripe for avalance of excellent value avocadoes

Most of the supply is coming from Queensland from production regions on the Atherton Tablelands west of Cairns and around Bundaberg.

"We expect the strong supply to continue throughout the year as southern regions progressively start their harvest," Mr Tyas said.

"In Australia, we have Australian-grown avocados on the shelves all year round, because of the climates of our various growing regions.

"The year starts in January with the last of the Western Australian summer avocados and moves to North Queensland, then down to Central Queensland, through the southern areas of Queensland and into northern and central New South Wales.

"From there, the harvest moves to our Victorian and South Australian growing regions before finishing the year back over in Western Australia.'

And Mr Tyas said all the growers in all regions would be focussed on delivering the best avocados they could this year.

"Given the abundance of avocados in 2021, there's never been a better time to add an avo to your shopping basket, and treat yourself to a regular, healthy indulgence," he said.

Energy rebates to support regional Queensland farmers

About 1700 farmers, businesses and manufacturers will be supported to maintain and grow recently-announced Queensland Jobs Fund, jobs in regional Queensland with a \$52.3 million in electricity rebates as part of the 2021-22 state budget. Energy, Renewables and Hydrogen Minister Mick de Brenni said under the Electricity Tariff Adjustment Scheme (ETAS), new rebates would be automatically applied to eligible energy accounts from 1 July.

taking its total investment to \$3.39 billion to support Queensland jobs.

Mr de Brenni said the initiative added to the to nine years as power prices continue to fall. "Ergon Energy Retail will analyse existing said the rebates would keep the furnaces firing bill data of around 20,000 regional farmers and businesses that are currently still on obsolete tariffs to identify eligible customers," he said. "From July 2021, Ergon will start implementing the rebates and contact eligible customers to provide them with details about the scheme. Customers don't need to do anything until then."

"Many customers have and will continue to see savings by changing to standard tariffs," Mr de Brenni said.

'But we understand the change may be challenging for some, which is why we're investing up to \$52.3 million over nine years to help ease any financial pressures while businesses adapt to protect regional jobs.

"The rebates will be applied for regional farmers, businesses and manufacturers whose annual power bills are impacted when switching to a standard tariff."

"ETAS will support employers by ensuring their viability, by helping them to grow and create jobs, with figures showing the scheme will support 1692 regional Queensland businesses and farmers."

All obsolete tariffs (except tariffs 47 and 48) will cease on 30 June, and customers on these tariffs will automatically switch to a standard business tariff from 1 July.

Since 2016, about 12,000 regional businesses and farmers have been offered a better deal by switching to a standard tariff, and many more will also be better off when everyone is automatically switched over.

Mr de Brenni said the new rebate would be calculated based on each individual customer's bill impact and be tiered to initially cover most of the impact and then taper off over up

Cotton Australia's Michael Murray said the scheme would support growers and irrigators across regional Queensland.

"Oueensland is one of Australia's largest producers of cotton, supporting thousands of jobs in regional Queensland," Mr Murray said.

"Affordable and reliable energy supply is critical for our members to export their worldclass products across the globe, so these rebates are a welcomed relief.

Coldest morning in years

After the temperature dipped to 3.7C last Thursday and then 3.9C on Friday morning, the mercury in Rockhampton plummeted to 1.8C about 6am on Saturday. It was the coldest morning in 36 years.

Mt Morgan got to minus 2 with people waking to ice on cars and a white carpet of frost across the mount. Then the upper cloud that started in the Kimberley arrived late Sunday.


A faint thundery roll about 1.30am Monday heralded the arrival of some thundery rain for Capricornia and Central Queensland. Hail was reported near Mt Larcom. The best rainfall totals (mm) for Monday/Tuesday were: Wowan 55, Craiglands 46, Upper Dee 37, Jambin 35, Mt Spencer 34, Bedford Weir 29, The Gap 28, Mt Morgan 23, Clermont 21, Springsure 16, Westwood 15, Biloela 14, Duaringa 14, Theodore 8, Emerald 6.

In Capricornia the best rainfall totals (mm) for that period were: Byfield 65, Gladstone Radar 59, Raglan 45, Awoonga 44, Mt Larcom 43, Iveragh 32, Dululu 32, Benaraby 23, Boyne Island 20, Riverslea 18, Gracemere (Rhomberg Rail) 15.5, Yeppoon 13, Yaamba 9, Marlborough 6, Hedlow 5. In Rockhampton city, the best falls (mm) were: Gracemere 25, Jessie Street 20, Ward Street 18, Airport 12, Briggs Street 9.

A green pick began to show through the brown hay across the pasture lands. Boaties loved the inshore relatively flat waters over the weekend which extended to Tuesday. But temperatures remained rather cool. Maximum air temperatures did not reach 21C till Tuesday.

Cloud broke on Tuesday, allowing a thick fog starting about 2am to engulf the River City. Visibility got down to a low of 150 metres about 2am and then fluctuated from 300 metres to 1000 metres before clearing to an overcast morning after 8.30am.

The fog extended to Bundaberg and Grafton in NSW, covering an amazing distance of



about 1200km. Brisbane recorded a very low visibility of 50 metres, delaying numerous aircraft which affected Rockhampton. The first planes arrived after 11am, making for some not very happy" passengers.

As Covid caused drama in Victoria, a significant low brought more problems with major floods in the Gippsland region. Rivers jumped 3-5 metres last weekend, flooding over 300 buildings and cutting all major roads.

In contrast, the US summer 'heatwave' is indicating a massive fire season. Last year there were about 20,000 fires for the early part of the fire season to June. This year there's about 27,000, making authorities fear the worst. FORECAST

The Infrared Greyscale Satellite image shows

cloud from the Tropics moving into the Pilbara (WA). The upstream part of the jetstream is causing cloud covering Capricornia. The cloud thickens over most of northern Capricornia Wednesday with heavy rain to the north east. Light rain around midday should increase with a 'chance' of a thundery shower around midnight, extending into Thursday morning with light rain.

A low over SA is causing thundery showers with snow about to develop over the alps. Heavy falls for East Gippsland may cause more flooding. As the low moves into the Tasman it will drive cold air from the south into CQ. Get the blankets and jackets ready! This will bring the 17C minimum on Thursday, with the temperature crashing down to around 10C or less on Friday morning.

The cold SW/SSW winds will make the maximums struggle to get to 20-21C over the weekend.

The toughest prediction is what will the minimums get to. A minimum of 8C is likely, but a low of 5C or 6C over the weekend is not out of the question! Then there will be a couple of more days of single figure minimums if the southeasterly is slow in returning the moisture. Maximums should rise slowly to 23-24C by next Wednesdav.

The South East Trades Winds (SETW) should develop offshore showers north of Yeppoon late Monday. If the trajectory holds, then a light brief shower should reach the coast Tuesday into Wednesday and maybe the Berserkers some time on Wednesday. Boaties the weekend is a chance!



Spanish as good as it gets

G'day, and welcome to my mackerel fishing column.

This week we focus on the winter season fish species - the Spanish mackerel. To date we've had some extra large Spanish weighed into the ALLSTARS INSALT online fishing competition and we expect more across the next three months.

As the cooler months arrive in Central Queensland, so to do the offshore breezes offering inshore coastal protection and glass out afternoon sessions allowing smaller vessels to venture up the protected coastlines in search of Spanish mackerel as they migrate along the East coast. School fish in the eight to 15kg size sit in big numbers and can easily be targeted. Larger fish, 20kgs and over, aren't as prevalent as they don't seem to gather in as larger schools as the smaller fish.

There's a heap of techniques to catch Mackerel, from live bait, dead bait and a multitude of lure selections from high speed hard bodies, slugs, stick baits, poppers, plastics, vibes and the list goes on. Spanish are always enticed by speed, and as high speed reels made their way onto the market word soon got around and most serious fishermen including an outfit with a slug attached ready to go.

Now days there's hard-body lures that troll at ridiculous speeds to entice the bite making for an exciting experience. Let's face it, a Spanish bite is about as exciting as it gets.

Everyone's seen YouTube footage of silver missiles leaping miles into the air and the blistering line peeling from the speed generated in their first run.

My recommendation is to experiment with a bit of tie wire. A quick search on YouTube on headlands and islands. Look for clear water, fish on ice. If you're unfamiliar how to fillet a

all techniques, it's a lot of fun and you're guaranteed of learning something different with every technique and at the same time putting together a little more of the complex Spanish puzzle just like learning the art of Barramundi fishing

There's not much a Spanish won't eat.

If I was to list the species they consume I'd run out of words for this column. If you're in Spanish country and float out a 'livey' of pretty much any species you're a good chance. However, my favourite style is dead bait trolling. Larger fish are more likely to be caught using a natural bait as opposed to artificial lures, especially in the heavily fished waters simply because fish have evolved and become smarter after seeing or feeling imitation lures over time.

I've trolled many dead bait species with success, so give it a go, it will amaze you what they eat. All that's required is a set of gang hooks with a weighted chin, a wire trace and

how to troll dead baits and you'll find an awesome tutorial by a pro Spanish fisherman by the name of Peter Stephens. A must view.

Spinning baits aren't effective. So if you've learnt from the tutorial the baits will swim okay with a bit of fine tuning, and your outfit is 50lb or bigger with at least 300 metres of line.

A few of the go-to dead baits are garfish, wolf herring, bonito, school and spotted mackerel. The best part about these species is they are mega fun to catch and kids absolutely love this active style of fishing. It is a great way to involve the whole family in fishing so I'll talk more about catching bait next column.

After a full day on the water collecting troll baits with the family, you'll have enough baits in the freezer (nicely wrapped in glad wrap to prevent freezer burn and drying out) ready for a Spanish session. Pick your local tackle shop's brains for known Spanish hot spots in your area or target the exposed coastline rocky

bommies and current lines. A quality sounder properly tuned in will not only show Spanish but bait gatherings as well.

Slow trolling is the key. Spanish bite the tail off their prey first and come back for the rest of the immobilised fish. Watch your rod tip constantly and up the revs when the rod buckles on the first bite. Once hooked the first run will be the longest run.

Maintain constant pressure and fight the fish 45 degrees to the stern. You'll be doing a few circles to keep the fish in this position. Take your time to tire the fish because you don't want a green fish thrashing around on your gaff or in your boat. Gaff the fish in the head area and ensure everybody's out of the way of the razor sharp teeth when the fish hits the deck.

A fish donga or brain spiking tool is next to quickly kill the fish. Be careful of the sharp teeth removing the hooks with pliers. Bleed the fish by cutting around the gill area and put the

Spanish once again jump on YouTube for a tutorial, there's plenty of information there.

Hopefully I've shared enough of my tips to entice you to chase the fast-paced Spanish.

Time on the water is the key to success. Also please remember Queensland Fisheries Department size and bag limits. If you find these rules difficult to locate; then just jump on our ALLSTARS website; because we have quick links by fish species for you to click on and get the information fast.

Next column I'm going to talk about how to catch the bait fish to attract a Spanish and some cooking suggestions.

Ridden by Ashley Butler in a 900-metres Open Class heat, Bollente joined in on the outside at the 100 metres point and won effortlessly.

Bollente as I said beat her effortlessly.

Walsh took over the training of Bollente in May when sent down from the Hermann family in Winton.

Ray Hermann had trained Bollente from there for 12 wins in the North and Central West as well as a Townsville success.

Walsh won immediately with Bollente at Emerald on May 22 in a heat of the Battle of the Bush.

On that occasion the son of Sizzling carried 60.5 kg.

At his previous start at Barcaldine, under Ray Hermann, he was handicapped on 68kg.

It was a very sensible decision to transfer this ultra talented galloper to Walsh to fine tune his final prep for the big Brisbane race. From what I saw last Monday it is reason-

able to assume that Bollente will be very hard to beat in Brisbane.

Ashley Butler is a first class jockey who when based on the capital had considerable success there.

Now that he knows the ins and outs of Bollente look out on June 26.

Incidentally Bollente was originally trained in Sydney by John O'Shea where he won a Randwick barrier trial and was placed at Newcastle and Goulburn during the 2018-19 season.

His record stands at 14 wins and 10 placing from 36 starts.

Trainer Clinton Taylor produced two of his star gallopers at Monday's trials.

I am referring to Bustedup and Attackabeel. Bustedup wasn't overly extended when finishing second behind Done It Again in the sec-

ond of the 900 metres trials. Jockey Ashley Butler was rather kind to

Bustedup and that was understandable given he hasn't raced for some months.

Bustedup is a very lightly raced son of Dusty Moon and the Falvelon mare Crystal Doll.

The 4YO has raced just six times for three wins and a third. The wins have been in most stylish fashion at Rockhampton and Mackay.

The third was on January 28 when as an odds on favourite Bustedup ran third to a very good city horse in Georgie's Prides at Eagle Farm.

Taylor spelled his charge after his next start

when winning at Callaghan Park on February 13.

To my mind the astute Taylor has a Winter Carnival campaign already planned for Bustedup.

He is extra talented and don't say you weren't given the tip.

Similarly the Counterattack 2YO filly Attackabeel is also a gifted young lass.

From just two starts she recorded a Callaghan Park win on January 23 as well as a subsequent third at Townsville on February 5 before being sent for a break.

Attackabeel easily won her 900 metres trial last Monday and also should be followed closely.

We conducted our 2021 Winter Racing Carnival Launch and Club 150 draw last Thursday evening following the races, with a good roll up of 140 people who all enjoyed the evening.
